 Rev. M. C. Wire, of Salem, will officiate at the M. E. church, to-morrow.
 Next in order comes the appropriate celebration of Decoration Day—the 30th inst.
 Canby Post, No. 27, G. A. R., will give a ball at the hall at Ilwaco, on the 26th inst.
 The first excursion of the season will be here from Portland on the *R. R. Thompson* on June 5th.
 A 425 foot track is being laid out in the court house yard for One's horse team to practise on for the coming tournament.
 The infant daughter of C. T. Albright and wife died yesterday morning. The funeral will take place from the parents' residence at eleven this morning.
 Chief Parrish, in Portland, has closed up some of the gambling games in that city, and some of the games have gone ahead; some afloat; some down this way.
 Capt. A. W. Berry has chartered the British bark *Sir Henry Lawrence*, to load lumber at the Clatsop Mill Co., for Rio Janeiro. She will follow the *Scottish Knight* on berth and will take about 900 M.

Chief Morgan of Portland, this week received a letter from Cathlamet informing him that Hugh Mahon was drowned in the early part of the week, while fishing, and asking him to notify Mahon's friends in California.
 In the justice court yesterday a resident of Nehalem was arraigned charged with violation of the game law by killing elk out of season. The evidence proffered was insufficient to justify holding the prisoner and he was allowed to go.
 In addition to the list of subscribers to the Nausimo disaster fund, at J. T. Ross's, previously mentioned, another list has been opened at the office of Vice-Consul Obery; at either place the charitably disposed can leave their contributions.
 A mass children's meeting will be conducted by Col. Woodford at Ross' opera house Sunday at 3 P. M., and a mass temperance meeting—all the churches uniting—will be held in the opera house to-morrow evening, addressed by Col. Woodford.

"There should be a liberal response to the call for aid for those who suffered so terribly through the great mine disaster in Oregon," says an editorial in the *S. F. Chronicle*. Will these San Francisco newspaper men never learn a little geography?
 The fire department was called out by an alarm at 9:44 yesterday morning; it was reported the West Shore mill was on fire and for that place every one quickly headed; fortunately the employees of the mill had succeeded in almost immediately extinguishing the fire, which had caught from some sparks from the boiler.

The places of nativity of the white men, who perished at Nausimo, were as follows: England, 36; Wales, 8; Sweden, 4; United States, 10; British Columbia, 15; Cape Breton, 4; Scotland, 7; Ireland, 5; Nova Scotia, 2; Italy, 4; and Holland, 1. Forty-five of the unfortunate miners left widows to mourn for them, and 130 children lost their fathers.
 When it comes to a nice, light, easy job, the position of mail carrier between here and Olney, Jewell, Mishawaka, and other Clatsop county settlements during the past winter stands at the head. Delivering THE DAILY ASTORIAN around the city is a pleasant morning's amusement alongside that tramp through the mud and the storm.
 Sunday morning, says the South Bend correspondent of the *Journal*, was the highest tide for several years, and it came so unexpectedly that it caused much damage to stock on the tide land. Mr. Blake, of South Willapa, lost eleven head and Mr. Anderson on Johnson's island, lost four, and G. F. Scott lost some, with others to bear from, as dead cattle are to be seen floating around plentifully.
 Since the legislature lowered the price of state lands to \$1.25 per acre, nearly 400 applications for land have been filed. These average 200 acres apiece, so that as most of the applicants are intending bona fide settlers, nearly 80,000 acres of land have been settled on since February 1. Half of the settlers have secured clear titles, by payment of cash for lands, while the remainder have obtained certificates of sale.
 The meeting at Liberty Hall last evening was attended by a very large audience. With the usual singing, pledge signing, etc., Consul Woodford gave a very interesting account of his personal experience and exhorted those of his hearers who were passing through such experience as he had portrayed to make an effort for temperate life. A young ladies' C. T. U. has been formed, consisting of fifteen members, and Miss Emma Warren elected as president.

The ladies of the M. E. church will give a social at the residence of Mrs. Samuel Elmora next Thursday evening. Persons attending are requested to bring some article not exceeding 10 cents in value, securely wrapped and tied; these articles may be found at Griffin's & Reed book store, and will be used to furnish amusement for the company. The literary and amusement programme will begin at 8:30, and refreshments served at 9 o'clock. Everybody is invited to come and bring their friends.
 E. E. Goff, formerly electrician for the electric light company in this city, now Oregon agent for the Heiser incandescence electric light, has lately sold a 100 30-candle power lamp to W. S. Byers & Co. at Pendleton. Several other towns are favorably considering Mr. Goff's propositions for electric lighting by the Heiser system which offers unequalled advantages in nominal cost of copper conductors, simplicity of wiring, convenience in turning on or off individual lights without affecting others in the circuit, beauty of light and greater quantity per horsepower, while any required length of circuit can be maintained.
 The damage to fishermen by high tides on this side of the bay, says the *Pacific Journal*, is estimated at not less than \$30,000. P. O. McGowan alone losing three new copper wire traps, besides twine gear, boats, drivers, etc., to the amount of \$6,000. The bay on Saturday afternoon presented a lively appearance, a free-for-all race between fish boats, pile drivers, scows and other craft each striving to reach the drift logs before the other. The fishermen who had not put their traps in the water, and were bemoaning the lateness of the season, are now congratulating themselves on their good fortune. Not a trap in the bay escaped injury, many being lost entirely, while a large number were rendered unfit for use.
 Next Friday the militia bill passed by the last legislature will go into effect. All the present officers will be legislated out of office by it. On June 1st the different companies will elect line officers, and on July 1st the company officers will meet and elect regimental or battalion officers, as the case may be; if regimental a colonel, lieutenant-colonel and major will be elected; if battalion, the two latter will be chosen. The military board, composed of the brigadier-general, adjutant-general, judge advocate-general, inspector-general, and surgeon-general, will compile the rules and regulations governing the militia, and in addition divide the state into three regimental districts. Any district containing three companies will be under the command of a major; if over three and under eight, a lieutenant-colonel will be the commanding officer.
 The wheat speculators of Chicago and San Francisco, together with the sailors who do not wish to sail, have together produced a very uncommon situation for this coast, at this season of the year. About 100 vessels are in port at the various Pacific points, a few of which are loaded and can't get out for the lack of seamen, while the others are not chartered, and hence not loading, because the prices are higher than in Liverpool. It is said that the California holders are determined to bull the markets of the world, and force prices to a general advance. They have the assistance and sympathy of the New York and Chicago holders, but it is not likely that they can force prices higher unless a failure in India and Australia should assist. In the mean time, such fine vessels as the *Lady Isabel* and *Dumbartonshire* have to leave the Columbia river in ballast.
