Beautiful weather. Straw hats show up. The Columbia is booming. Everyone is busy cleaning house. Storekeepers are putting up summer awnings. Like old times to see the streets crowded with people. To-night Prof. Anguire will deliver a private lecture to gentlemen only. H. Wise directs attention to the matter of straw hats, in another column.

The State on Sunday took 281 cases salmon: Seaside, 100; Occident, 1; G. W. Hume, 180.

Geo. Woodford goes to The Dalles to-morrow to be present at the state convention of the W. C. T. U.

Overland shipments of salmon average two car loads a day. They go to all the principal eastern cities.

The ladies of the M. E. church will give a social at the residence of Mrs. Samuel Elmore this Tuesday evening.

Beginning to-day, the O. R. & N. Co.'s river boats will sell excursion tickets good to Portland and return, for \$2.50.

The grand lodge of Oregon, I. O. O. F., meets in East Portland to-day. Beaver Lodge No. 35, is represented by G. Reed, A. J. Megler, J. W. Welch and C. A. May.

The 17th of May will not be allowed to pass unnoticed, Scandinavian residents celebrating the anniversary of the union between Sweden and Norway by a ball at Peter Mattson's this Tuesday evening.

For the first time for many months it was yesterday unnecessary to have an office or room fire to keep comfortably warm. An east wind and a bright sun made the shady side of the street pleasant, and ice cream, fans and summer clothes were in demand. As for the grass and flowers, one can almost hear them grow.

For a city of 7,500 people, Astoria lays claim to the front rank in the list of manufacturing cities of the Union, proportionately to her population. Where is the other city of no greater population that has over 30 large manufacturing establishments, each giving employment to from twenty to 150 employees?

Col. Woodford addressed a large union temperance meeting at the opera house last Sunday evening and again at Liberty Hall, yesterday evening, at which place the meetings will close this evening. He is an eloquent speaker and has aroused considerable interest by his addresses, over 400 having signed the temperance pledge since he began here, ten days ago.

"Why, they told me it was always raining in Oregon!" said a delighted lady passenger on the Oregon Sunday morning after giving the writer a graphic and glowing description of the lower bay and the magnificent sight presented by the sunlit waters of the Columbia as seen by her for the first time. She said the view was worth crossing the continent to see, and she was right.

Some of the leading cannery men on the river have contributed ten dollars apiece as a fund for Wm. Arnold, the celebrated hunter, and to-day he goes to the mouth of Elk creek, about nine miles from the Seaside, where, with his trusty rifle, he expects to wage a war of extermination against the seals and sea lions that are such a destructive nuisance to the salmon interests of the Columbia.

City assessor Dickinson has about completed the city assessment roll for the current year. It is a tedious job, and one that requires perseverance and patience to successfully accomplish. For instance, A. gives in lot 24, blk 7, 265, and it is assessed to him; presently comes B, who gives in the same lot, forgetting that it was sold for delinquent county taxes; then C, appears with a claim to proprietorship of the same lot, founded on a tax title from the city at a former sale. Each one intends to do right, but who to justly assess the lot to, and to get the lot assessed to some one is the question. The assessor is, however, equal to the task and has succeeded in getting the matter in plain shape.

FROM ACROSS THE ATLANTIC.

News From Various European Capitals.

WASHINGTON, May 16.—The United States supreme court assembled at noon to-day, and the chief justice announced the death of Justice Woods, whose chair was draped in black, and said that as a mark of respect to the memory of the deceased jurist the court would adjourn until Monday next, when motions would be heard and, later, a date fixed for the court's final adjournment. The most of the justices will go to Ohio to attend Justice Wood's funeral. This afternoon they will draw up appropriate resolutions with reference to his death.

SENTENCE SUSPENDED. BUFFALO, N. Y., May 16.—In the oil conspiracy case this morning the attorney for the defense stated he wished to make a motion for a new trial and was granted twenty days to prepare a bill of exceptions. Sentence was suspended until after hearing the motion.

THE STRIKE ENDED. HALIFAX, N. S., May 16.—The long strike at the Pictou coal mines is reported ended. The Albion colliery men have accepted the reduction of wages and the Acadia men have signed an agreement repudiating any desire to dictate as to who shall be employed.

ELECTED TO PARLIAMENT. DUBLIN, May 16.—Wm. O'Brien, editor of United Ireland, has been elected without opposition to a seat in the house of commons for the northeast division of Cork, made vacant by the resignation of Edmund Leaney.

FRENCH MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS. PARIS, May 16.—The elections of members of the municipal council have been completed. The revolutionists have ten seats in the council, an increase of six seats. The liberals will have fourteen, a loss of eight seats.

BOYCOTTING IN LOUGHERA. LOUGHERA, May 16.—Boycotting of Mr. Tener, agent of the estates of Lord Claricarde in the county of Galway, has commenced. Several tradesmen have refused to supply him with goods.

FRANCE AND GERMANY. BERLIN, May 16.—Gen. Boulanger's plan for experimental mobilization of the French army next October is distrusted here. If France mobilizes Germany will mobilize also.

WILL EXTEND THE FORTIFIED AREA. BERLIN, May 16.—Prince Bismarck has given official notice to the house and land owners concerned that the German government contemplates extension of the fortified area around Strasburg, Metz and Posen.

OFF FOR THE COSSACK CAPITAL. ST. PETERSBURG, May 16.—The czar and czarina started this morning for Vova Teheikask, the capital of the Cossack's country.

Broke Jail Last Night. About eleven o'clock last night Albert Thompson broke jail and escaped. He had been in confinement since April 19th, awaiting the action of the grand jury on a charge of theft of clothing from the Anglo American Packing company's premises. A visit to the jail showed that he had wrenched the bar from the door of his cell and gone to the northwestern corner of the jail; here he made a hole through the planking and pried out some of the upper course of the stone foundation, making a small hole for a large man to get through, but sufficient for egress. The officers were immediately notified of the escape.

Considerably Lessened Receipts. An unexpected result of the interstate commerce law is the immediate and serious reduction of the receipts of the Pullman company. Almost all the people who traveled on railroad passes paid tribute to the Pullman sleepers. They could afford to make themselves comfortable as long as they had no railroad tickets to buy. Now by far the larger part of the great army of dead-heads stay at home and many of those who are forced by business necessity to travel manage to get along for a single night in the day coaches. An old Pullman conductor on the N. P. told me lately that the estimated loss to the Pullman company by the abolition of the pass system was thirty per cent. of its gross earnings. On the N. P. he thought it would be fifty per cent. —E. V. Smalley in Northwest.

EAST AND WEST WIRINGS.

Astorian Specials From Various Points.

FRESNO, Cal., May 16.—A fire about 11 o'clock last night, destroyed about \$50,000 worth of property in Chinatown of this city. The fire broke out in a dance house owned by Mollie Livingston. It was caused by the upsetting of a lamp. A high wind was blowing, and no water supply being at hand, the flames spread with great rapidity. In all, about thirty buildings were burned.

TWO TO BE HANGED. SANTA FE, N. M., May 16.—To-day Gov. Ross forwarded the death warrant of J. O'Donnell, who will be executed at Silver City next Friday. Jasper Thompson will be hung at Socorro on the same day.

NEW YORK NOTES. NEW YORK, May 16.—Mayor Hewitt called upon Queen Kapolina this morning. The trial of Jacob Sharp began at 10 a. m. to-day. The following is a statement of the visible supply of grains in the United States: Wheat, 44,458,000 bushels; corn, 13,776,000 bushels; oats, 3,805,000 bushels.

FIRE AT DENVER. DENVER, Col., May 16.—The loss by the burning of Laersten & Peters' warehouse early this morning, is estimated at \$3,000; insured for nearly that amount. The cause of the fire is not known.

ARRIVED AT NEW YORK. NEW YORK, May 16.—The steamer Arizona with the remains of Vicar General Quinn, who died while on a visit abroad, has arrived.

SERIOUSLY INJURED. PORTLAND, Or., May 16.—Wm. Helleman, a farmer living near Oswego, was dragged to-day by a runaway team, and fears are entertained of fatal injuries.

Petition for county road in district No. 11 allowed; Jos. Smith, S. I. Sampson, J. W. M. Lane, appointed viewers to meet at Westport at 10 a. m., May 27. In the matter of the Seaside road, motion argued and decided in favor of petitioner.

Petition for county road, district No. 7, read and allowed; A. H. Sale, M. Lawler, R. R. Marion appointed viewers to meet at Olney at two p. m., May 23, J. E. Logan to serve the notices. In the matter of damages of Seaside road, G. Wingate, James Taylor and G. C. Fulton appointed viewers to meet at Seaside P. O., May 24.

In the matter of the estate of Jno. Davis, deceased, final account allowed. In the matter of road No. One, report read first time. In the matter of road No. Two, report read first time and laid over. Ordered that petitioners file bonds in the three roads now pending, and that the order be entered, nunc pro tunc. Adjourned to 9:30 this a. m.
