Rescue hose team meets at eight o'clock this evening.

In the justice court yesterday Mrs. Jorgensen was assessed \$5 and costs for assault and battery on the child of a neighbor.

On Thursday, says the Telegram, the Vancouver Transportation company sold their steamer Vancouver to Capt. F. B. Jones, well known on the river. The consideration is said to have been in the neighborhood of \$3,000.

Examination is going on in the several departments of the school in district No. One this week. The term closes on Friday and the intention of Prof. Johnson is to have a school picnic on that day if the weather is favorable.

The Mansanita came in yesterday afternoon from a trip along the southern Oregon coast. Buys were placed at Coos bay, the Umpqua, and Tillamook. The McArthur is in Tillamook bay. The Mansanita goes to Tillamook rock light house to day if the weather proves favorable.

The Alpha crossed out yesterday, the Venture and Kate and Anna following on the route to the sealing grounds. The sealing grounds of the Pacific are extensive this season. The schooner Phoenix from Shanghai, was spoken by one of the trigs last Monday, forty-five miles off the mouth of the river. She had one thousand seal skins aboard.

Astoria will send a big delegation to the tournament at Vancouver. There will be four teams from the department, besides a large crowd of visitors. The Astoria delegation will leave here in the afternoon of Tuesday, the 14th of June on the Telephone and be taken direct to Vancouver. On Friday evening the 17th the Telephone will leave Vancouver with the returning Astorians.

A great question has at last been definitely settled. It is finally conceded that J. W. Watson wrote "The Beautiful Snow." Now if some one will get it settled as to the authorship of "If I Should Die To-night," things would be much easier in the poetic line. The Yamhill Reporter says the latter piece was written in Astoria in 1875. It's a fine piece of poetic pathos wherever it was written.

Regarding the removal of the engine house of Astoria No. One. The Astorian believes that the efficiency of the department would be greatly increased if the house were removed from its present location to a more central and convenient one. It appears that an attempt to place it on the site previously referred to would be impracticable, but the necessity still remains of moving the building to some site nearer the water than at present.

The grand encampment of the I. O. O. F. of Oregon met Monday night at East Portland, D. E. Buchanan, grand patriarch, presiding. Reports of officers were read and approved, and the usual routine business transacted. An election of officers resulted as follows: Grand patriarch, R. M. Day; grand high priest, Timothy Ford; G. S. W. A. A. Gambell; grand scribe, J. M. Bacon; grand representative, Phil Metohar; grand junior warden, R. Alexander.

Mention was made in the Ilwaco correspondence in yesterday's Astorian of the saving by the life crew of one of the men from one of Warren's boats upset in the breakers on Peacock spit last Friday. The name of the man that was saved was Geo. Raymond. The drowned man was named Chris Sanders. He was aged 24 years, and was a native of Germany. That Raymond's life was saved was due to the prompt and efficient action of the look-out and life crew at the cape.

Last Monday Peter Alix, an insane resident of Pacific county, was brought from Oysterville by a deputy sheriff en route to the asylum, and yesterday morning the first thing he did after being allowed to go on board was to hop up on the rail and leap into the water. Being handcuffed, it was feared that the poor fellow would drown, but assistance was prompt, and as soon as possible he was hauled on board. He held up his hands and said: "Why are these things on me; what have I done?" seeming totally oblivious of his wild leap and narrow escape from death.

The catch of salmon here, says a San Francisco dispatch, has been very abundant during the past week, the retail price for whole fish on some days being as low as six cents per pound. The fish are taken at many places along the coast by trolling in salt water, and it has been a subject of remark that so far as known no salmon have been taken in that manner in San Francisco bay. Both spoons and small fish bait have been successful at Monterey and Humboldt bays—trolling from boats, with bait, at from four to six-foot deep, and with a motion through the water of from two to three miles an hour.

ROMANIA FORTIFYING. LONDON, May 17.—A dispatch from Bucharest says that Roumania is fortifying rapidly under the superintendence of German officers.

THE DEATH PENALTY. ST. PETERSBURG, May 17.—The five men who took the most prominent part in the late plot to assassinate the czar, were executed yesterday.

ARRIVED IN DUBLIN. DUBLIN, May 17.—Count Herbert Bismarck arrived in Dublin yesterday. He is the guest of the Lord Lieutenant.

WON'T TAKE IT. LONDON, May 11.—Mr. Barclay has refused Mr. Wright's offer of £20,000 for his race horse Bendigo.

A DIPLOMATIC EMISSION. ROME, May 17.—Monsignor Rotelli, the newly appointed nuncio to France, has received private instructions from the Pope, relative to the course to be pursued in his efforts to bring about a complete removal of the difference between the Vatican and France, and will start immediately for Paris. He bears a letter from the Pope to President Greys.

MARRIAGE IN HIGH LIFE. LONDON, May 17.—The Viscount Cranborne, a son of Lord Salisbury, was married to-day to Lady Cybele Alice Gore, a daughter of the Earl of Arrol. Prince and Princess Christian, the Duke and Duchess of Teck, and a large number of aristocrats witnessed the ceremony.

ASKED TO PROTEST. PARIS, May 17.—A deputation of fishermen from Nooman and Brenton ports called upon the foreign minister Florens yesterday, and asked him to protest against the Newfoundland fishing bill, stopping the sale of bait to fishermen.

TEMPERANCE WORK IN ASTORIA. EDITOR ASTORIAN: ASTORIA, May 17, '87.

Col. George Woodford began a series of temperance meetings here on the 7th inst., which have continued every night since, and have resulted in a great temperance revival. He has spoken nightly to packed audiences, and some four or five hundred have signed the total abstinence pledge, among them many of the prominent citizens of Astoria. Moderate drinkers, and some who are not so moderate in drinking, have abandoned the intoxicating cup and pledged hostility to the liquor traffic in the following words: "I will, God helping me, abstain from all alcoholic beverages, and discourage their use, manufacture and sale."

The most sanguine friends and promoters of the temperance cause are surprised at results so far exceeding their expectations. Col. Woodford's rhetoric and logic are telling and convincing, while his addresses abound in wit, humor and pathos. The results attained in this stronghold of the rum power are the best commendations of this eloquent advocate of temperance; nearly five hundred enrolled for sobriety and the cause of temperance; a W. C. T. U. organized; also a strong temperance league known as the Astoria Rescue Club, composed of all who took the pledge, and a band of hope. The Rescue club will hold temperance meetings weekly at which there will be plenty of music, short addresses and other forms of entertainment. There is much healthy enthusiasm here in the cause of temperance and good work is being done to make men sober, to make homes happier and society cleaner.

FROM THE ATLANTIC COAST.

Labor Troubles in Chicago and Elsewhere. CHICAGO, May 17.—The number of idle men in this city who have either struck or been locked out is rapidly increasing; it was variously estimated yesterday at from 10,000 to 20,000; the number probably does not exceed 13,000, but by the end of the present week it will be largely increased. There are not more than 5,000 bricklayers at work and their occupation will be gone as soon as the stock of material now on hand is exhausted.

AFLOAT AGAIN. NEW YORK, May 17.—The steamer Fulda will be floated this afternoon. She will sail on Saturday.

AN EFFORT AT PARDON. JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., May 17.—Effort will be made soon to have Wm. Haight, one of the Southern Pacific express robbers, released from prison on the ground that the court from which he was sentenced had no jurisdiction.

MEN OUT OF EMPLOYMENT. HAVENHILL, Mass., May 17.—Owing to a disagreement between the Knights of Labor and the shoe manufacturers association forty shoe manufacturing establishments closed their doors this morning, throwing 3,000 men out of employment.

THEY WILL DISBAND. JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., May 17.—Owing to the refusal of the legislature to appropriate funds for the support of the militia, the instrumental national band guards of Missouri will disband.

O'BRIEN IN TORONTO. TORONTO, May 17.—William O'Brien arrived here this morning amid a scene of enthusiasm and excitement unequalled since his entrance into Canada. Fully three thousand men crushed and struggled with each other to catch a glimpse of him. A few attempts at hooting and hissing were made as O'Brien entered the carriage, but were quickly drowned by a hearty, stirring cheer, which went up as he stood up in his carriage and exclaimed: "Three cheers for our friends in England and the cause they are struggling for!"

A CAVALCADE of mounted police with drawn swords, and a platoon of officers surrounded the carriage. The hotel was reached without a sign of hostility except an occasional hoot or hiss from an Orangeman.
