The state vagrant law goes into effect to-day.

The Central hotel is being adorned with a new coat of paint.

The building between Carnahan & Co.'s and A. Balmano's looms up.

Excursion tickets on the O. R. & N. boats are good till September 30th.

The Telephone has been repainted and made otherwise attractive, and looks fine.

Any one finding a solitaire diamond shirt stud will be rewarded by bringing it to this office.

The fine weather yesterday brought out a large number of neatly dressed ladies and children.

The Mountain Queen and Telephone were down yesterday within a few minutes of each other.

The Walla Walla foundry recently paid \$36 freight on 500 brick, from Portland, 245 miles; a little over seven cents a brick.

The Salem fire department will send a hose team to Vancouver. It will be a picked team from Capitals and Tigers.

The Columbia came in yesterday; the Oregon sailed. She took out 300 cases salmon, G. W. Hume, and a large lot oysters.

In a run of ten hours last Wednesday, the Port Blakely mill cut 516, 273 feet of lumber. Heavy lumber 20 inches square counts up fast.

At three o'clock this afternoon Prof. Yeomans will deliver a free lecture to ladies only at the hall of Astoria Engine Co. No. One. This evening Prof. Anguire will deliver another free lecture.

According to the new school law which took effect last Wednesday, no clerk can receive an order for school money until his bond is properly made out, accepted and filed in the office of the county superintendent.

Of the 1,720 boats on the lower Columbia good authority is of the opinion that 1,300 are out this week. The run, which picked up a little in the early part of the week, has fallen off again. So far indications point to a light catch.

The Deep Sea fishing schooner Venture is at Parker's wharf. So far the enterprise has not proved a financial success, though, it is believed that once a market is established in Portland and farther east, the scheme would be a paying one.

On the Oregon yesterday went some jagged lumps of cargo, comprising 38,087 pounds scrap tin, consigned to Scotchler & Gibbs of San Francisco. By them it will be sent to Amidon & Co., Baltimore, Md., that firm working it up into a variety of shapes.

The Fleetwood and Emma Hayward are running daily races between Olympia and Seattle. Steamboat racing is bad all round; it uses the boats up, creates no end of ill will, and subjects passengers and all hands to possible peril of a dreadful accident at any moment.

School in district No. One closes to-day. Prof. Johnson and his corps of assistants have labored faithfully for the best interests of those committed to their charge and deserve commendation for their efforts. The marked improvement in the pupils is good evidence of faithful work on the part of the teachers during the term.

Brig.-Gen. Siglin will shortly issue an order for the first meeting of the new military board, at the capital, on June 24. No orders will emanate from headquarters concerning parades on May 30, but each company may act as it pleases. General orders for reorganization of the militia into the National guard, on June 1 will be issued in a few days.

At a recent masquerade in Portland, a number of the maskers, who had attracted attention from their dress and antics, which were those of the salvation army, formed a circle in the middle of the floor, and then a tall, athletic young man, who personated Satan, burst into the ring and tried to break it up. The army rose as a man, throttled Satan, threw him down and wiped the floor with him.

The Portland school directors will have a good time of it for the next two or three months. They have elected the teachers—some seventy in number—for the next school year and refuse to let the newspaper reporters, or the teachers themselves, or any one else, know who has been elected. It's dollars to dimes that the teachers will find some way of finding out before the 1st of next month.

It has been discovered that the new militia bill, which goes into effect to-day, does not make any provision for immediate payment of funds to the national guard, under the new law. The law provides that a special fund shall be created for the sustenance of the guard, and that the source of revenue shall be from a special tax of one-fifth of a mill levied for that purpose. The tax will be levied upon the taxes of 1887, and these taxes will not be collectible until the courts have passed upon the assessment rolls and approved them. Meanwhile, the national guard will have to run on credit, probably until fall.

Henry George and National Politics.

A Newspaper's Demand for Free Speech.

New York, May 19.—The Commercial Advertiser publishes the following: It is already stated on very good authority that Henry George, of the labor party, has already begun to prepare for the fall campaign.

District leaders with their assistants are making house to house canvass in the tenement districts, and are said to be largely recruiting their ranks from lukewarm Democrats. It is estimated that the object of the whole affair is to swell the labor vote in the approaching election to such an extent that George could then be in a position to make a profitable deal with Blaine in the presidential election of 1888.

Henry George this morning said: "You can authoritatively deny that there is any deal or agreement either past, pending or to be made in the future between Blaine and myself. I am opposed to Blaine; he represents all I have been fighting against for years in monopoly and the worst form of capitalistic power." He was asked: "Will there be a labor presidential candidate in 1888?" "It is strongly probable there will," answered George.

SEIZED FOR DEBT. CHICAGO, May 19.—After the performance of "Clothilde" last night the costumes and box-office receipts of Miss Jeffreys-Lewis were attached in a suit for one thousand dollars, brought by New York costumers.

GONE BACK TO WORK. HAYVERHILL, Mass., May 19.—The manufacturers association have conceded the demand of the employes, and forty-one shoe factories employing three thousand men resumed work this morning.

DEAD. NEW YORK, May 19.—Wm. H. Mayo, president of the Seaman's Savings bank, died this morning.

A CALL FOR FREE SPEECH. TORONTO, May 19.—The Globe, referring to yesterday's disturbance says: "The ruffians of yesterday doubtless expected to overawe the eloquence and courage of O'Brien, and this they vainly attempted. They have thrown over to him a volume of public sympathy which he could not have otherwise obtained. He stands now identified with the cause of free speech in Canada: freedom to walk the streets and freedom to express his opinion, and these common rights must be vindicated at any necessary trouble and cost." The comments of the other papers are of the same tenor.

TO SPEAK AT HAMILTON. HAMILTON, Ont., May 19.—Wm. O'Brien is to lecture here on Monday night under the auspices of the local branch of the Irish National League. It is proposed to call a public meeting on Saturday evening to protest against O'Brien's coming here to continue the attack on Lord Lansdowne.

A REBATE TO BE ALLOWED. OTTAWA, May 19.—The government will make an allowance for iron importers who had entered into contracts previous to the imposition of new duties and will allow their assignments to come in under the old tariff.

THE AMENDMENT REJECTED. RICHMOND, Va., May 19.—The senate yesterday rejected a resolution providing for a constitutional amendment which proposed to repudiate all state bonds not funded in new three at the time the amendment is ratified by the people. A motion to reconsider went over until to-day.

School Picnic To-day. Examinations closed in the public school in district No. One yesterday, and the several results announced. In the afternoon a photograph was taken of the school building, the teachers, and many of the pupils. To-day, weather permitting, there will be a basket picnic at Smith's Point, to which the teachers and pupils of the other schools are invited. Should the morning be unfavorable the picnic will not take place; if considered favorable the bell will ring at half past eight; otherwise it will remain silent. If it rings, the understanding is that the pupils shall assemble at the school house and go from there in a body to the ground selected for the picnic.

FROM THE EUROPEAN CENTERS.

The Czar and His Loyal Cossack Subjects

Mexico Looking to Don Carlos of Spain.

St. Petersburg, May 19.—The czarowitch last evening was installed with great ceremony, Atanor Teberkash hetman of the Cossacks. The decree of appointment was publicly read to the Cossack soldiers. The czar thanked the Cossacks for their faithful services and for the cordial reception extended to him and his family. He then handed the hetman's baton to the czarowitch, the presentation being attended with great pomp and ceremony, which included a superb exhibition of imperial regalia and jewels. After the ceremony the czar reviewed the Cossack regiment and battery of young military pupils of two regiments of Cossack boys. A detachment of Talmuck horsemen then gave an exhibition of a war game for the entertainment of the imperial visitors, and presented the czarowitch with a cream colored horse. The day ceremonies and exhibitions were followed in the evening by a gorgeous display of fireworks and a grand jubilation ball.

FROM THE ETERNAL CITY. ROME, May 19.—Gen. Gene, commander of the Italian forces at Marsowah, has dissuaded the government from carrying out its Abyssinian expedition, on the ground that the cost and difficulty of the undertaking would outweigh the probable gain.

VATICAN AND ST. JAMES. ROME, May 19.—A gentleman in the confidence of Lord Salisbury, is negotiating with the Vatican in a semi-official capacity for the resumption of official relations between the Vatican and England.

A FRENCH DUEL. PARIS, May 19.—A duel has taken place between Victor Konig, husband of Madame Jane Bading, a well known French actress, and M. Lacour, a journalist who had written an article derogatory to Madame Bading's reputation. M. Lacour was wounded.

NOT VERY PROBABLE. CITY OF MEXICO, May 19.—It is stated in upper government circles that a plot on the part of the conservative party has been discovered. The government members of congress are in the confidence of President Diaz, and several cabinet members stated yesterday that the Mexican conservatives have actually invited Don Carlos, the Spanish pretender, to visit this country for the purpose of entangling him in Mexican politics, and of eventually making him the head of their party.

STRIKE IN BELGIUM. BRUSSELS, May 19.—The metal workers of Belgium are joining the strike inaugurated by the miners. Workers in other trades are likely to follow suit. Eighteen thousand persons have struck in the Center district alone. Troops are being forwarded to prevent the strikers from committing acts of violence.
