Two Drowned; One Missing.

The sad sight of drowned bodies borne to the undertaker's to be prepared for decent sepulture, was again seen yesterday afternoon, two poor fellows whose troubles on earth are over, being arrayed in the habiliments of the grave.

The first was the body of Gas. Mattson, a Russian Finn, aged 24, fishing in boat No. 12 of the Cutting Packing Co., who, with his boat puller, was drowned off Clatsop spit Friday morning. The body was found by A. K. Weir Friday evening, where it had washed ashore on Clatsop beach near the wreck of the *Cairnmuir*. The body was wrapped in the net, and the boat, oars, etc., had also come ashore a short distance from the body; the watch in the pocket of the drowned man had stopped at twenty-five minutes past five. It appeared as though he had tried to beach his boat, but unsuccessfully. The boat puller is missing; and was, in all probability, drowned also; no tidings has yet been received of his body. Deceased was well spoken of as a hard working young man who saved his money and was trying to get on and get a start in the world. He had \$26.35 in his pocket, and is said to have had a handsome sum at interest in one of the banks. He was a member of the Columbia river fishermen's protective union, and will be buried by that association at ten o'clock this morning.

The name of the missing boat puller could not be ascertained. Later in the afternoon G. Compare, fishing Geo. W. Hume's boat No. 9, brought up the body of a drowned man that he had found floating at Scarborough head. It had been in the water for some time and was so decomposed as to be unrecognizable.

New York, May 21.—The Saturday half holiday rule was generally complied with to-day. In the afternoon there was a general cessation of business and down town streets had a Sunday appearance. The Exchange, courts, city and county offices, etc., closed promptly at noon.

BIG RAILROAD TRANSFER.

BOSTON, May 21.—A contract for the purchase of the Boston, Hoosac Tunnel, and Western, and Troy, Saratoga and Northern railroads has been confirmed by the stockholders. The terms are that Fitchburg & Co. pays \$5,000,000 for the property in stock and bonds. In return Fitchburg & Co. get a clear title to the rights of franchise and property of both roads.

"FOR ADMINISTERING HICKORY."

Ozark, Mo., May 21.—Ten more bald knobbers have been arrested in Douglas county for administering hickory to one Swearingen last July.

MEXICAN EARTHQUAKES.

CITY OF MEXICO, May 21.—Reports from local officials in regions recently visited by earthquake shocks were received to-day. The earthquake did not leave a single habitable house standing. At Bapisepe sixty persons were killed and many wounded beyond hope of recovery. Between 3 p. m. and 1 a. m. the day following there were eighteen shocks. Bodies are still being dug out and it is thought the number of killed will reach one hundred and fifty.

ROUGH WEATHER.

LONDON, May 21.—Heavy gales accompanied by snow, hail, thunder and lightning continue with unabated violence in England.

PAYING STRICT ATTENTION.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 21.—Russian papers consider the present cabinet crisis in France closely connected with the Boulanger question.

RONVIER IS WILLING.

PARIS, May 21.—M. Ronvier has consented to form a ministry. He hopes to induce the leading members of the banquet committee of the chamber of deputies to accept a position in the new cabinet.

WANT HIM RETAINED.

PARIS, May 21.—The municipal authorities of Lyons, Rennes, Montpellier, Lehey and other places have petitioned president Grevy to retain Gen. Boulanger in the cabinet.

SMASHING THINGS IN BELGIUM.

BRUSSELS, May 21.—The strikers in the district of Borinade are singing "The Marseillaise," and visiting factories intimidating the employes and stopping their work. The houses of a number of workmen who would not strike, have been blown up with dynamite.

HONOR HEADED BY GUINEAS.

LONDON, May 21.—De Bensusade, the husband of Violet Cameron, has obtained £1,950 damage against the Manchester *Umpire* for a libel contained in an interview with Lord Lansdale and published in that paper.

GARIBALDI'S ANNIVERSARY.

ROME, May 21.—Influential liberal and radical members of the chamber of deputies are arranging for an anti-papal demonstration at Capriera on the anniversary of Garibaldi's death.

BERLIN, May 21.—Two subalterns have been arrested at Strasburg, on a charge of high treason. They have made confessions implicating several other officers.

LATEST FROM STATE AND COAST.

A Fatal Caving in the Siskiyou Tunnel.

Death of E. L. Bristow—Railroad Ramors.

HENLEY, Cal., May 21.—News has just reached here that at the Siskiyou mountain tunnel on Thursday night, a large cave occurred, which caught seven Chinamen and two white men all of whom were instantly killed.

SMALL POX AT SAN FRANCISCO.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 21.—The steamer *Gallic*, from China and Japan, arrived outside this morning with small pox on board, and is now coming into the harbor. Before the vessel came to anchor she was boarded by the quarantine officer who, on investigation, found two cases of small pox among Chinese passengers aboard. She was at once placed in quarantine.

DEATH OF E. L. BRISTOW.

PORTLAND, May 21.—Hon. E. L. Bristow, a very prominent member of the Odd Fellows fraternity of the state, died at his home at Salem this morning. The funeral takes place to-morrow afternoon, under the auspices of the order of Odd Fellows, of which he had been for many years an honored and active member. Mr. Bristow was well known in Portland, having spent much time here for several years as business manager of the *Standard*.

A TERRIBLE DEATH.

The body of Mrs. Catherine Quinney, an aged pioneer of Portland, was found this morning in the river near E. street. The general impression is that she fell overboard while intoxicated and was drowned in the darkness. The deceased was aged 70. She has resided here for over thirty years. She had been a childless widow for many years and leaves considerable property.

IMPORTANT RAILROAD REPORT.

ALBANY, Or., May 21.—It is ascertained from reliable information that a syndicate of ten men who with \$1,000,000 each, are Chicago & Northwestern railroad stockholders, are negotiating for the transfer of the Oregon & Pacific railroad to the former company. The transfer would include 200 acres of land adjoining this city, \$835,000 in city property and vast water power privileges.

INTERESTING LETTER FROM YAQUINA.

YAQUINA CITY, Or., May 18, '87.

The Oregon Development Co.'s steamer *Willamette Valley* arrived in to-day, forty-eight hours from San Francisco. This is a handy little vessel of 615 tons, three years old and well appointed. This is about her fourth trip since arriving from the east.

On her last trip up she had to lie off the Yaquina bar four days, before it became smooth enough for her to cross.

During this time she weathered the gale of Saturday, the 7th, which old settlers pronounced the hardest experienced for years.

The large buoy placed at the end of the NW reef, dragged its moorings and now lies in the south breakers.

Will T. Webber's dwelling, which was in frame, was blown to the ground, and several other buildings were badly racked.

Lumber from Roy's wharf was blown into the bay.

There arrived on the *Willamette Valley* to-day, a Mr. Bennett, an old time steamship purser, who comes to assume the duties of agent of the O. D. Co.'s steamers at this place.

These in charge of the government work are pushing the repairs to the jetty and approaches. Everything has to be strengthened for the heavier rolling stock, which it was found necessary to use.

This work was commenced during the earlier part of the winter, but was discontinued on account of bad weather.

Mr. Ingham, of Elk City, has the contract for furnishing stone for the jetty, which he will take out of the old government quarry. He is stripping the stone now and getting ready for work. Mr. Copeland, of Idaho, has the contract for furnishing the piles.

In the *Oregonian* of to-day appears a dispatch saying that two Indians who went outside the bar with Geo. Washington, of Newport, to catch fish, were missing, having been caught out in a blow. There is no truth in the report as they all landed safely at Cape Point wharves.

On the same day that Washington and his companions went out Mr. Henry Nice, well known in Astoria, started for Alsea Bay, a distance of about 12 miles, in a very large skiff. He went alone, having a sail and one pair of oars in the boat.

On arriving off Alsea bar he found it to be too rough to cross in and stood off shore. About 7 o'clock that evening a strong wind from the south suddenly sprung up and drove him to the northward.

He pulled for dear life to keep from going ashore in the breakers in the vicinity of Cape Foulweather. The wind abated about 10 o'clock and he was able to pull to the whistling buoy of Yaquina bay where he hung on the rest of the night.

Next morning the tug *Favorite* picked him up and landed him inside. It is safe to say that Mr. Nice will not undertake a sea voyage in a skiff again. She filled twice with him. Had the wind not gone down he would undoubtedly have perished. Mr. Nice, with Capt. Freeman Dodge and others, is interested in a salmon cannery at Alsea bay.

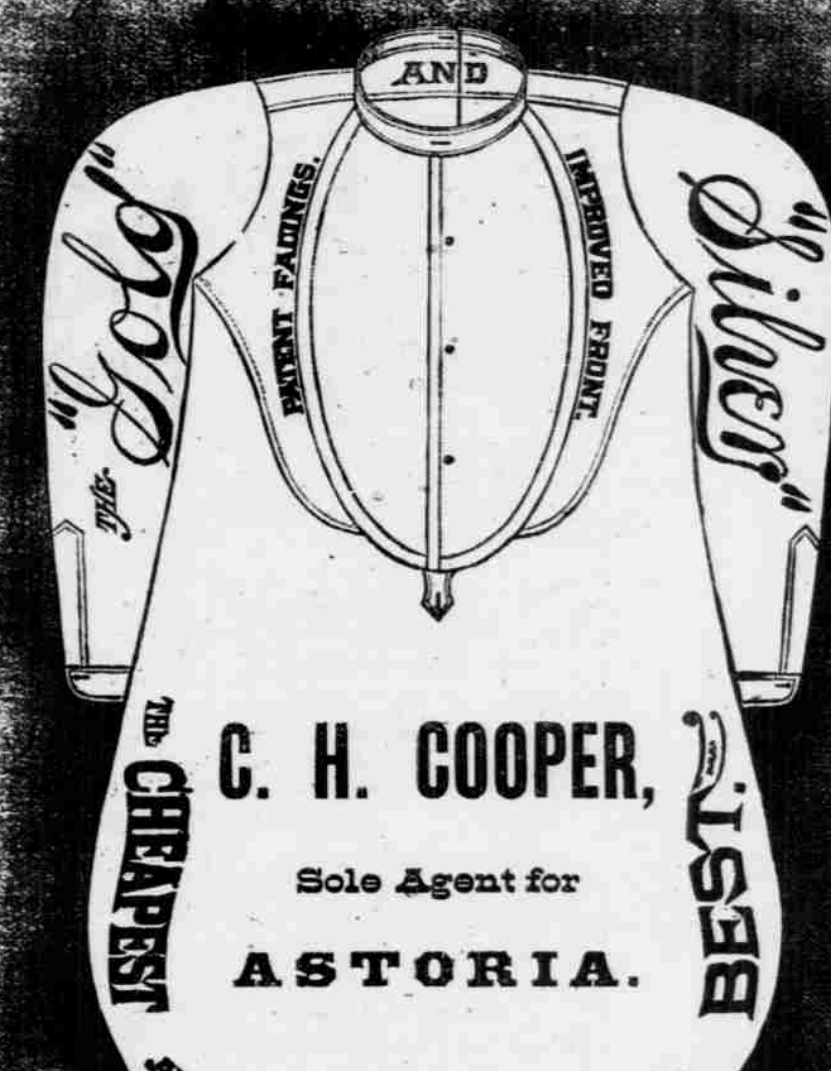
