**Collecting Bad Debts.**  
"We intend to make life very pleasant for the man who owes small bills around this town that he is able to pay, but won't," said W. H. Reynolds, manager for Steuben county of the Elmira Uniformed Collection company. "We are in the field to collect accounts from just such customers, and if there is one who doesn't come down after we have turned all our batteries on him, he's a man that dynamite wouldn't rattle."  
"The way the Uniformed Collection company works is this: Such persons as desire our services become subscribers to our plan, and pay a fee or bonus of \$1. We furnish each subscriber with blanks, which he fills out and sends to his delinquent debtors, with a statement of their accounts. The blank is simply a request for them to remit the amount, with the declaration that if they do not their cases will be turned over to the Uniformed Collection company. When the collection company receives a case a collector is sent at once to the debtor to solicit payment of the amount due. If he still refuses to pay, we send another collector, who wears a striking uniform, with the word 'Collector' in very distinct letters on the band of his hat. This collector visits the debtor three successive days at his house or place of business. If the third visit does not result in obtaining the money the collector wears a hat on the band of which are the words 'Collector of Bad Debts.' His orders are to call on the debtor daily and demand payment of the claim or claims against him. These calls soon attract the attention of the neighbors and become the talk of the town. It has got to be a case-hardened old pensioner in the confidence of his butcher and baker and candlestick-maker who can boldly face more than half a dozen calls from the gentleman with the suggestive hatband, and the consequence is that an arrangement satisfactory to the creditor is always effected. We charge the creditor ten or fifteen per cent. of the amount, as the case may be, and everybody is happy but the man who has come down with the skads. This method of collecting bad debts is no experiment. We have tried it in a hundred different places, and never lost a case yet. The system originated in Canada. We have had several collectors very neatly 'done up' by irate debtors, but our men expect that, and assume all such risks when they enter our employ. If a collector is disabled, we put a bigger man right in his place, and it has got to be a very sultry day when we let a man rest easy while we've got a bill against him."—*Elmira Advertiser.*

**Virginia Eloquence**  
Ben: Perley Poore thus describes a florid speaker in the Boston Budget: "Senator Daniel of Virginia, is an orator of the old Virginia style, introduced by Patrick Henry and transmitted down through succeeding generations. A specimen of this histrionic elocution was the opening paragraph of a speech by Mr. Daniel at Petersburg during a recent political campaign: 'Fellow citizens of the old commonwealth of Virginia: I come to you from the fair domain of the mother of statesmen and presidents. I come from the valley of the Shenandoah, the daughter of the stars. There the river flows, whispering to its grassy banks the name of Lee, Lee, Lee! The rivulets, flowing down the mountain side to join the river sweeping to the sea, whisper the name of Lee, Lee, Lee! The depreciation in the world's market rate for silver is creating trouble in Mexico, where the circulating medium is almost entirely silver. Consul Winslow writes from Guerrero that the Mexican dollar is now worth but 76 cents and that fact has caused a considerable disturbance throughout Mexico, the values of all imported goods having risen 25 per cent. This is felt keenly by the poorer classes, who still receive the same wages in silver, though the articles which they must buy have increased in price.

The new navigation company lately organized at The Dalles are building one steamer at Hood river to run between The Dalles and Cascade. Another will be built or bought to run between The Dalles and Portland.
