The Great Boat Race.
CHICAGO, May 30.—For weeks past there has been no little excitement over the Hanlan-Gaudaur sculling race that took place to-day over the Pullman course. At Toronto odds were offered against Hanlan that staggered his friends there, but they did not lose faith in him. At Pullman, Gaudaur's backer St. John, put up \$200 on his man, but most of the bets were private on even terms. When Hanlan came out in his shirt and trunks to-day his appearance evoked most favorable comment and all were enthusiastic over his fine form. Gaudaur in a red shirt and cap and blue trunks, towers over Hanlan physically. The course was three miles in length and the race was exciting the whole distance. Gaudaur won. Time, 30:29.


