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MARINE INSURANCE COVERED BY OUR OPEN POLICIES.
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SENATOR SHERMAN'S SPEECH.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 1.—The bad weather to-day seriously interfered with the Sherman reception at the state capital, so far as the outdoor demonstration was concerned. About 12 o'clock rain set in, which continued at intervals, making it necessary to abandon the outdoor programme. Elaborate preparation had been made in the way of a platform and seats in front of the state house. During a lull in the storm about 1,000 persons occupied their seats, but were driven to the representatives' hall by the rain at 2 o'clock.

At this point the committee determined to remove the demonstration to the shelter of the state house, and the crowd surged and pressed for entrance to the assembly chamber. In a short time 2,000 persons had crowded into the galleries, capable ordinarily of holding 800, and the more favored to the number of 1,500 were admitted to the floor of the house.

As senator Sherman, accompanied by Gov. Oglesby, Senators Cullom and Farwell, and state officers and members of the managing committee, entered the hall, there was loud and continued applause. Senator Sherman was introduced by Gov. Oglesby.

Sherman, after paying a glowing tribute to Illinois statesmen, Lincoln, Douglas and Logan, gave a sketch of the history of the two great political parties since the repeal of the Missouri compromise, showing the position of Republicans and Democrats on the question of the war, emancipation, reconstruction and suffrage.

Referring to the Democracy in the southern states, Sherman said there was not an intelligent man in the land who does not know that Cleveland is president by virtue of crimes against the electoral franchise, including murder, arson, ballot box stuffing, forgery and perjury, but for which Blaine would now be in his place. Continuing on this subject, he said: "The poison of the success of these methods has already affected elections in some of the great cities of the north, especially in Chicago and Cincinnati, where, under the lead of Makin and Tosney, the criminal classes adopted some of the meanest of the crimes to control the elections. Why should they not? If crime should be resorted to by white Democrats of the south, to cheat and intimidate poor negroes in the south, why should not white Democrats of the north be permitted to resort to forgery and perjury to successfully change the result of the election of the north? Why discriminate against Makin and Tosney by sending them to the penitentiary, while sending Democrats of the south, by means of like offenses, to the senate and the house, and to represent the great republic in foreign courts? The mission of the Republican party will never end until every legal voter can cast one honest vote, and no more, and have that vote counted."

Speaking on the tariff, Sherman said the revenues must be reduced, but opposed the reduction of duties on articles that we ourselves produce, thus bringing our skilled artisans in competition with foreign labor that will inevitably reduce the price of domestic labor.

TACOMA, June 1.—A special to the Ledger from Cole's station says: "The last spike in the line of the Northern Pacific railroad joining the eastern and western ends of the track of the Cascade division, and completing through connection to Tacoma from Duluth and St. Paul, via the switch-back over the Cascade mountains, was driven at 6:02 P. M., to-day. Quite a number of persons, including officials of the road, civil engineers, trainmen, and railroad employes gathered at the point of junction of the rails, on the extreme top of the switch-back.

The Northern Pacific Enjoined.

NEW YORK, June 1.—The Oregon Transcontinental company began suit in the U. S. circuit court to-day against the Northern Pacific to enjoin the directors and the president of the defendant company from issuing any bonds or raising any money to build a road to be called the Oregon & Washington railroad company from Wallula to Pendleton. The plaintiff alleges that they own over 56,000 shares of common stock, and this is the largest amount of stock owned by any one person. The plaintiff claims that the Northern Pacific attempted to build the new road for the purpose of plunging the stockholders into debt, and that the court should not permit any such scheme to be carried out. The cost of the new road will be about \$800,000.

Mackerel are being taken by trap fishermen, but owing to the dense fog the Americans have been unable to successfully work with their seines. Orders have been given for the cruisers to follow the fleet when they leave for the north bay.


