SAN FRANCISCO thinks her population is 300,000. Oakland claims 48,000.

THE running expenses of the village of Estelline, Dakota, for the last year were \$48, the chief item being the marshal's salary, \$19.

A JUSTICE OF THE PEACE in the District of Columbia refuses to be removed by the president, and says only the supreme court has the authority.

THERE is now only one Republican internal revenue collector remaining. He holds the Second district in New York city, and a Tammany brave is after his scalp.

ACCORDING to a Richmond dispatch to the New York Tribune, in the county elections in Virginia colored men voted with the Democrats in some counties, and the Republican party gained many white votes.

OF the 300,000 immigrants who arrived in the United States last year, only 6,000 went south of the Potomac, to reside. The 6,000, however, were first-class, as the majority were either colonists or skilled workmen.

IT has hitherto been supposed that the highest mountain in the world was Mt. Everest, one of the Himalayan range, but this honor is now claimed for Mt. Hercules in New Guinea, which soars to the tremendous altitude of 32,786 feet.

SENATOR STEWART of Nevada is out with a novel proposition. He thinks that congressmen should be provided with free transportation and required to travel at least five thousand miles a year in the pursuit of useful information.

THE National Tribune, organ of the Grand Army of the Republic, says that of the 350,000 members of the organization about 75 per cent. are Republicans, but that in Indiana and New Jersey the Democrats constitute fully 50 per cent., and in the state of Delaware they make about 75 per cent.

OF the 121,000,000 bushels of wheat imported into Great Britain last year, three-fifths, or 73,000,000 bushels, came from the United States, 20,000,000 bushels from India, 7,200,000 from Russia, an equal quantity from Austria and Germany together, 7,488,000 from Canada, 3,144,000 from Chile, and 2,960,000 from all other countries.

FOR the purpose of carrying out the act of congress making an annual appropriation to provide arms and equipments for the militia, the following regulations have been issued by the war department: the adjutant-general of the army shall annually, on or before July 1 of each year, report to the war department the number of regularly enlisted, organized and uniformed active militia of each state and territory, and this report will be the basis of action to be taken for the ensuing year. Requisitions for any or all public property provided for in this act will be made by the governors of the several states and territories on the war department. Four hundred thousand dollars is appropriated in the act. There will be distributed in the Pacific states and territories the following sums: California, \$7373; Colorado, \$2764; Nevada, \$2764; Oregon, \$2764; Alaska, \$2764; Washington, \$2764.

A MEMORIAL has been forwarded to President Cleveland, from San Francisco, urging him to clearly define the rights of American seamen to hunt and fish in Behring's sea and in the Pacific ocean, off the coast of Alaska. The memorial calls attention to the fact that in 1872 Boutwell, then secretary of the treasury, gave his opinion that the territorial jurisdiction of the United States did not extend beyond one marine league from

the shores of the mainland of Alaska, or of islands acquired by the United States in its purchase from Russia; and that, outside of that three-mile limit, the sea was free to all citizens as well as foreigners; that in 1881 the then secretary of the treasury thought proper to reverse that ruling, and declare that waters adjacent to Alaska territory meant the whole of Behring's sea; that under this ruling American ships and seamen have been seized, condemned and sold for hunting and fishing anywhere within this large sea, and shippers left without redress, while British vessels, for doing the same thing, are allowed full immunity from seizure, and if seized are released by the president. Senator Stanford supplemented this with an urgent letter to the president, urging him to define the rights of American seamen, and not leave the question for decision by irresponsible officials.

The Price Was Raised.

Last evening, says the Telegram of the 11th, a party of horsemen were at the White house discussing the merits of their respective steeds. Among the number were Capt. Flavel of Astoria, Brown, Betts and L. S. Hawkins. The former had just brought his horse Chance, which had been on grass for two years, here, and Capt. Betts had an animal purchased in San Francisco with which he was going to beat anything on the road. Capt. Flavel wagered that his animal, just from the pasture, could make a better record than the San Francisco horse. Capt. Brown offered \$500 for Chance if it could do so. In a few moments thereafter both horses were on the track and the Oregon animal, driven by Mr. Hawkins, shot ahead of Captain Betts, coming in several lengths ahead. Brown was willing to take the horse at the figure named, but Flavel raised the price to \$800. He purposes putting a hundred dollars additional value on the animal every twenty-four hours he has to hold it.

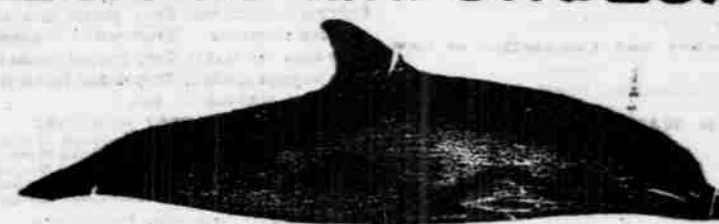
