The Massachusetts house of representatives last Tuesday refused to agree to the constitutional prohibitory amendment, by a vote of 135 to 73.

The will of the late William A. Wheeler was opened at Malone on the 14th inst. It gives \$25,000 to home missions, \$5000 to foreign missions, \$5000 to his housekeeper, Betsey Chambers, and a few bequests to various friends.

SWEDEN has become a great exporter of butter. The amount sent abroad last year was valued at more than \$4,000,000. The Swedish dairies are now worked upon the most improved system. Only skilled hands are employed in receiving the milk, separating and refining the cream, and churning the butter. The work is performed only with the greatest care and cleanliness. The dairy maids receive a practical and theoretical training at dairy schools.

On or near the British coasts there were lost during the five years ended June 30, 1885, as shown by a recent official paper, of vessels 2482, and of lives 15,071, and of these 206 vessels and 883 lives were lost through collision. Of the remainder, 267 vessels and 1541 lives were lost through foundering; 538 vessels and 3616 lives through stranding, 696 vessels and 1448 lives from other causes, and 775 vessels, containing 7583 persons, were reported missing.

The looseness of the English civil-service is shown by the recent discovery that a pension has been paid for thirty-five years after the death of the person entitled to it. An officer retired from the customs service in 1845 at the age of sixty-seven, and lived for seven years afterward. His widow went as usual for the money, and received it during her own period of survival of twenty-three years; and even then, when the deceased officer had been lived so long, would have been ninety-seven, the daughter was enabled to enter into the inheritance without difficulty and enjoy it for twelve years.

Dr. PETER HOOD, of London, in a recent number of the *Lancet*, refers to a communication of his published in that journal nearly twenty years ago, on the value of calcium carbonate in the form of calcined oyster shells as a means of arresting the growth of cancerous tumors. In a case which he then reported, that of a lady nearly eighty years old, the growth sloughed away and left a healthy surface after a course of the remedy, as much as would lie on a shilling being taken once or twice a day in a little warm water or tea. He now reports another case of scirrhus of the breast, in the wife of a physician, in which the treatment was followed by an arrest of the growth and a cessation of the pain, the improvement having now lasted for years. He states that the remedy can do no harm, and that the evidence in its favor is strong. He would restrict trials to well marked cases of scirrhus, and insists that no benefit should be looked for in less than three months.

In the opinion of Representative Oates of Alabama, neither Blaine nor Sherman will be the presidential nominee. He says: "These two men are pretty equally balanced in power. They are the two strongest men in the Republican party, because they are the ablest. I think neither of them will be nominated, because it rarely occurs that a party renominates its ablest man, and if it does renominate him it is only to have him defeated. Henry Clay could never be elected. He was always beaten by much smaller men. Great men antagonize too many people, and too many inter-

ests. They have too much of a record. That was Blaine's weakness. He had too much record, and Cleveland's great strength was that he had very little record, and consequently very little to cause antagonism. Allison, I think, is the man most likely to get the Republican nomination. He has not too much of a record. Cleveland, I have no doubt, will be the Democratic candidate, notwithstanding some little disappointments. I believe that every southern state will send its delegation to the national convention pledged for Cleveland."

The count of the cash in the United States treasury which is now in progress has developed the fact that the vault capacity is entirely inadequate for the safe handling of silver. The silver vault was piled to its utmost capacity some time ago, and there still remained 8,000,000 standard dollars which for want of a better place were piled in bags in the passage-way leading to the vault. In making the count these bags had to be removed to an outside hall, where they remain protected from outside interference by nothing but a pine board partition, it has therefore been guarded at all times by watchmen. Every precaution has been taken to prevent its being tampered with, while in its exposed condition. The count will last five weeks more, and the silver cannot be returned to the vault room until that is concluded. In the meantime work is being pushed on the new silver vault authorized by the last congress. It will have storage capacity for 100,000,000 standard dollars, and will probably be ready for use in September.
