EACH of the 670 members of the British parliament represents on an average 8,728 voters, the constituency varying this year from 2,737 to 15,658.

THE title for the queen, lately proposed by the British government, is "Queen of Great Britain and Ireland and of the Colonies and Dependencies thereof."

RUSSIAN petroleum is being brought into competition with the American product in the Dutch East Indies, which have heretofore consumed over 2,600,000 cases of refined American oil.

FASHIONABLE London is horrified at the fact that a prominent milliner ran the gauntlet of the lord chamberlain's office and was presented to Queen Victoria at the last drawing-room.

BERLIN's chief dry goods merchant, Rudolph Hertzog, spends \$100,000 a year in advertising, and says that before he began to advertise he barely cleared expenses. After that his profits increased in proportion to the amount of advertising.

ACCORDING to the Philadelphia Times, the excellent manual training schools of Philadelphia are mainly filled with sons of wealthy men. In sending their sons to these schools the wealthy men show their good sense; but it will be a pity if the sons of poor men are thereby deprived of the opportunity of attending them.

ON the 15th inst., at Denver, C. G. Kountze, trustee, signed the deed conveying the land for the new military post to the government. The site was purchased by citizens of Denver at a cost of \$100,000. The deed will be forwarded to Washington at once, and it is presumed work upon the new post will be begun just as soon as the examination of the papers is concluded by the attorney-general.

COMPUTED according to the treasury system of book-keeping, the public debt was reduced \$8,888,997 in the month of May. This indicates that the debt was lessened, when counted by this method, nearly \$93,000,000 in the eleven months which have now expired of the fiscal year. Undoubtedly the reduction of the indebtedness in the present month will bring the total for the fiscal year up to \$100,000,000. The following shows the extent which the debt was cut down in recent years:

IMMIGRATION is expected to reach 800,000 in the calendar year 1887. This would be the biggest influx ever experienced in the United States, the total of 1882 being the highest in any one year thus far. The following shows the immigration in each of the past eight years, the years in each case being fiscal years, ending on June 30:

It will be noticed that there was a steady increase from 1879 to 1882, and a decrease from that year to 1886. The renewed increase began after the middle of the calendar year 1886. The entire immigration in the past thirteen years was 4,934,418.

THE FIREMEN'S TOURNAMENT.

The Sixth Annual Meeting, at Vancouver.

The sixth annual meeting and tournament of the fire association of Oregon and Washington territory commenced at Vancouver Wednesday morning, in Knights of Pythias hall. After some delay, owing to the absence of Secretary Hodgkin and his substitute, the meeting adjourned to 4 p. m.

At 2 p. m. the grand parade was formed in the following order: Chief Wentworth, of the Vancouver Department, with Chief Kellogg, of Seattle, and Chief Hoffman, of Albany.

First Assistant Wentworth, and Second Assistant Bury, of Vancouver. Blue Ribbon Band. Walla Walla "Our Boys"—Fifteen Men. Albany—Fifteen Men. Lebanon—Fifteen Men. Astoria No. 1—Twenty Men. Vancouver Companies with Steamer, dressed with Roses and Flags—Forty Men. Vancouver Gen. Team No. 3—Thirty-six Men. Vancouver Tigers No. 2—Thirty-four Men.

Mayor, Common Council, President of the Association, and Delegates in Carriages. The different engine houses of the city were handsomely decorated, as were many places of business. A grand triumphal arch was erected in front of the city hall.

The parade marched through the principal streets of the city to the city park, where an address of welcome was delivered by the chief of the Vancouver fire department, Mr. John W. Wentworth, after which followed brief remarks by the mayor, President Worsley and others. On reassembling at 4 o'clock, the convention was called to order by the president, and in the absence of Secretary Hodgkin the minutes of 1886 meeting were adopted without being read. Parker, Rescue No. 2, Astoria; F. H. Roscoe, G. W. Cruzan, No. 1, Lebanon; J. P. Pinous, C. Troup, Vancouver No. 1; J. R. McCull, L. A. Sanctuary, Umpqua Hose Company, No. 1; C. J. Curtis, Astoria, and A. N. Gilbert, Salem.

The reports of officers not being obtainable were made a special order for Thursday. After the repeal of rule 5, section 6 and section 4, article 6, governing the association, the meeting adjourned to seven o'clock, when, after debate, some changes in relation to the disposition of prizes were adopted and the constitution amended by the adoption of sections regarding membership.

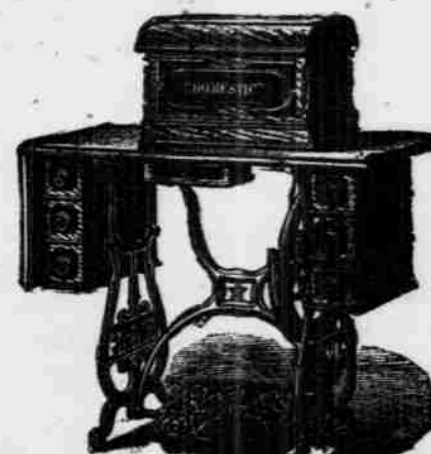
