BIG SALARIES.

Why Railroad Officials are Well Paid for their Services.

It is said that Thomas J. Potter, vice-president and general manager of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad, has been receiving a salary of \$25,000 a year. It is further reported that as general manager of the Union Pacific railroad he has signed a contract for five years at an annual compensation of \$30,000 a year. These figures to some may appear to be enormously beyond the ability of any man to return an equivalent in time or work. To others the larger of these sums will seem small when the responsibility of the position is considered. It is an affair of daily occurrence, so common that no attention is paid to it, for an employee to receive a salary of \$1,000 a year for superintending the management of a business whose aggregate for the year may fall below \$20,000. There are many men who receive \$2,000 a year for directing a business whose volume does not in the course of a year reach \$40,000. Mr. Potter, as the executive head of the Union Pacific railroad, will be the direct representative of a corporation whose capital stock runs up into the millions of dollars. An insignificant per cent. of this enormous aggregate pays his salary of \$30,000 a year. If he has the ability to handle millions of dollars in such a way that a satisfactory profit is returned to the stockholders, then his salary is small in comparison with that of another officer who in controlling the same business fails to make the receipts overbalance the expenses. It is from this standpoint that the services of the great railroad manager must be measured. There are very few men capable of grasping the details of a large business, and they are therefore in a position to command large compensations. At the same time the stockholders of the corporation are individually paying no more for the services of Mr. Potter than some vastly smaller business house or factory is paying its superintendent who receives a salary of \$2,000 a year. There are those who contend that no man can earn \$50,000 a year by honest work. This would be true if the work was confined to digging ditches or holding a plow. There are thousands who can do ordinary work, and stand ready to do it for day laborers' wages. There are very few men endowed by nature with the genius of directing the affairs of an immense concern successfully. Herein lies the difference.

Kossuth in Old Age.
Louis Kossuth, the venerable Hungarian patriot, says in a late letter: "The burden of more than eighty four years weighs down my infirm shoulders. Under this weight the body is deadened, the soul grows blunted, life becomes a state of mere barren vegetating. This is harder than heading an army, harder than wearing a royal crown, harder than preaching truth and right to a generation of fools. In all my life I have known of but one such man; and although I never have met him, I revere him as a god; and yet, the world would question my sanity if I wrote his name where it belongs, high up in the list of heroes.—George Sand in North American Review.
