WASHINGTON, June 22.—The President will tender Secretary Lamar the position in the United States supreme court made vacant by the death of Justice Woods.

Since the new railroad law went into operation, the Mississippi river business has increased largely. New Orleans has been doing a big business in the shipment of wheat to French ports, and most of it went down the river from St. Louis.

GEORGE C. GORHAM, formerly secretary of the United States senate, in an interview last week expressed the opinion that Mr. Blaine went to Europe in order to leave the shaping of events entirely to Providence and his friends. Mr. Gorham thinks the Republicans can elect the next president, but that do it they should nominate John Sherman.

JUDGE RITTENHOUSE of the district court of Denver, Col., has adjudged that certain property which Andrew Meldrum conveyed to his wife before they were divorced, shall be given back to Meldrum, because the judge believes that at the time of the transfer to the wife she did not love him and hence she got the property by fraud. The decision is one of the most extraordinary known to the legal profession.

REV. EDWARD EVERETT HALE'S prediction of the increasing popularity of the signed editorial and the decreasing power of the anonymous one is justified by the journalistic signs of the times. Even those papers that still rigidly adhere to anonymous editorial utterances are admitting signed articles to their other columns in constantly increasing numbers. That shows that they recognize and feel they must needs bow to the growing popular taste for identified writing. Mr. Hale is quite right in his forecast of the decline of the plural "we."

COL. JOHN ADAIR'S proposition to run a ferry across Young's bay in connection with a road to the seaside is a step in the right direction. Communication is one of our greatest needs. Anything that will make transit faster; that will bring the different parts of the county closer, is a benefit to all. The Clatsop bridge, urged some time ago, appears, to many, an expense that would outweigh the advantages. Such an objection cannot apply to this latter scheme. Our advantages and attractions for visitors from the interior are so manifest as to scarcely need reference. Were better means to had to get over to the beach, the means this way would be greatly increased, and every one would be benefited directly and indirectly. We trust that the present ferry scheme will take tangible shape, and that the boat will be put in operation next month.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—The flag topic has not been altogether exhausted. A move is on foot to require the war department to provide better quarters for the flags, and to have them open to the inspection of the public, as the law directed. If the war department refuses to do this, when congress meets a resolution will be offered in the senate, to investigate the reason why. The law is clear on this point, but at present it is necessary for any one wishing to inspect the flags to first get a written permit signed by the secretary of war. It is thought the flag episode will be made a subject for congressional inquiry next winter in any event. It is believed certain correspondence relating to the issuance of the first or-

der for the return of the flags has been suppressed. While it is emphatically denied at the White House that the subject was discussed by the cabinet before the order to return the flags was given, it is charged in other quarters with almost equal emphasis, that the cabinet discussion of the question was considerable length. It is alleged by very good authority that secretary Endicott brought the matter up at a cabinet meeting and urged the adoption of adjutant-general Drum's recommendation. And that all members of the cabinet, with one exception, favored the return of the flags. The exception was postmaster-general Vilas, who served in the Union army. He did not think it would be a politic move, but gave in to his associates.

It is also asserted that secretary Bayard was most enthusiastic on the subject, even going so far as to assure the president that such an executive order would make "him a name that would live forever." The legality of the step was referred to the attorney general, who gave it as his opinion that there was nothing in the law to prevent it. The true story of how the order came to be issued will never be known. Those who are familiar with the facts, however, say that President Cleveland would not have decided upon such an important step without consulting his cabinet. Adjutant-general Drum said repeatedly before the president rescinded the order, that the matter had been fully discussed by the cabinet.
