MANIFEST DESTINY.

For the last ninety days it has been understood that inquiries in San Francisco and New York regarding the building of a railroad from Forest Grove to Astoria were being prosecuted in a manner satisfactory to the promoters of the scheme. The following from yesterday's Portland News, fits in so well with what is known here that it is considered worthy of credence.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 21.—Work will shortly be commenced on a road extending from Astoria, Oregon, to Forest Grove, a distance of 110 miles. The line will connect with the Oregon & California branch of the Southern Pacific railroad.

By means of this road, connections can be maintained with the eastern routes, and as the builders of the road intend to erect sheds and wharves, deep-water ships will be able to load at Astoria. Rails for the line are expected shortly from England. Locomotives and rolling stock are being constructed in the East.

The cost of the road and equipment is about one million dollars, and the entire sum has been subscribed.

Arrangements have been in progress for some time regarding terminal facilities, depot grounds, etc., and prominent residents of Oakland and San Francisco are understood to have been in communication with railroad men whose corporate interests suggest the obvious necessity of building the road.

Coming as it does, simultaneously with the announcement that the Union Pacific lessees of the O. R. & N. Co. purpose competing with the Southern Pacific for San Francisco northwestern business, tends to still further confirm the report.

It is asserted from a source that entitles the statement to a hearing that the Southern Pacific company which now has 5,000 men closing up the gap between the O. & C. and C. & O. railroads, will, immediately upon the close of work there, transfer the entire force to the route between Forest Grove and Astoria and build along the already surveyed line.

The situation is this. There is a three-cornered fight between the Union Pacific, the Northern Pacific and the Southern Pacific. The U. P. has the O. R. & N. Co., and can stand off the N. P. on very safe grounds. The S. P. has the road from San Francisco to the Columbia river. It is a vital part of its policy, a matter of necessity that it secure a seaport outlet. That it can find here. The N. P. will no doubt discover before a great while that it is in the same fix and will need to come to Astoria a good deal quicker than Gen. Anderson thought when he last winter.

In all this intense rivalry, this strife for points and contention for advantages, Astoria holds the commanding position. "Whether next week or next year, it is but a question of time, it is inevitable that her importance shall be recognized; a glance at the map is sufficient. It is a case of manifest destiny.

The dispatch says the entire amount necessary has been subscribed. The railroad official to whom allusion is made in the foregoing, said last April: "If the representations made are warranted, there will be no difficulty in getting the money." From the tenor of the dispatch it is evident that subsequent investigation on the part of examining visitors has shown that the facts fully bear out the representations that have been made on this subject.

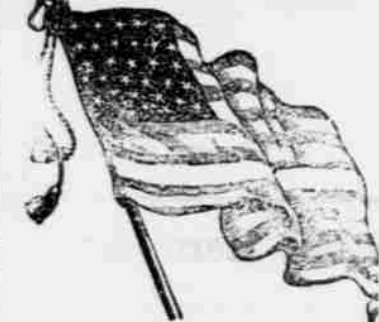

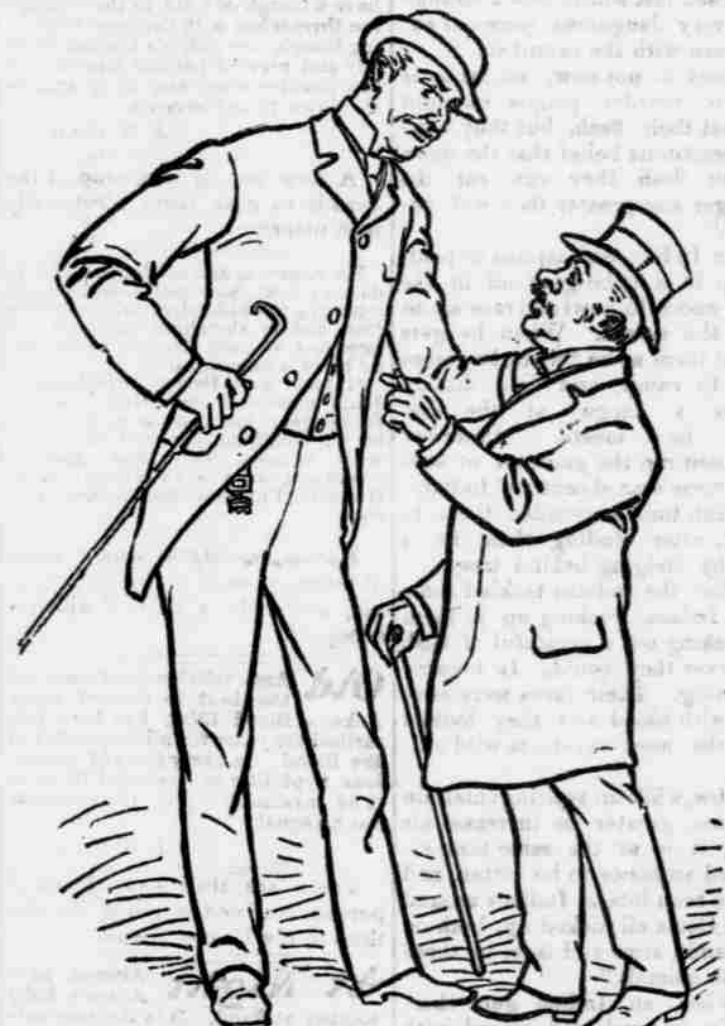
