BREAK IN THE STOCK MARKET.

A Very Poor Rule That Works Both Ways

The "Genesta" Wins the Ocean Yacht Race. NEW YORK, June 24.—Exchange this morning became extremely active and excited with heavy declines. The market opened with a feeling of confidence in many of the stocks which suffered so severely yesterday and large supporting orders were given all over the room. In a few moments there was heavy selling apparent, and reports were circulated that Jay Gould was dead and that there had been a falling out between Jay Gould and Russell Sage and Cyrus W. Field. At the same time heavy blocks of Manhattan stock were offered, causing prices in that stock to break from 156 1/2 to 120. The room was crowded with brokers and the decline brought out selling orders in all classes of securities. Western Union telegraph stock began to break down about 11 o'clock and in fifteen minutes had dropped eight points. The fall in other stocks was correspondingly great. The greatest excitement was in the loan crowd where many inquiries were made for loans on call, but parties prominent in loaning money refused to lend any amount, no matter how small.

The correspondent telegraphs to the Oregonian to-day that he has interviewed there the directors of the Southern Pacific railroad company and that they have informed him that it is not the purpose of the company to build that road at present.
