The council of the Russian empire has just decided upon an enterprise that will doubtless prove the greatest undertaking of the twentieth century: the construction of a railroad from Petersburg to Peking.

What They Say in San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 30.—The Southern Pacific company will soon put on a line of steamers of its own between here and the Columbia river and Puget Sound. This is believed in railroad circles to be the key by which the future plans of the Southern Pacific company may be predicted. No one acquainted with the railroad situation along the coast, and the intense rivalry between all of the American lines for business, together with the rapid and bold struggles of the Canadian Pacific, thinks for one moment that the Southern Pacific secured the Oregon and California road merely with a view of reaching only Portland, no matter how valuable such a point may be to the company.

The establishing of the proposed line of steamers to the Columbia river and the Sound is understood by well informed railroad men as simply a temporary arrangement, and will be maintained only until the railroad is extended. It is also considered an indication that there was a sound basis for the report which leaked out about the branch road from Forest Grove to Astoria.

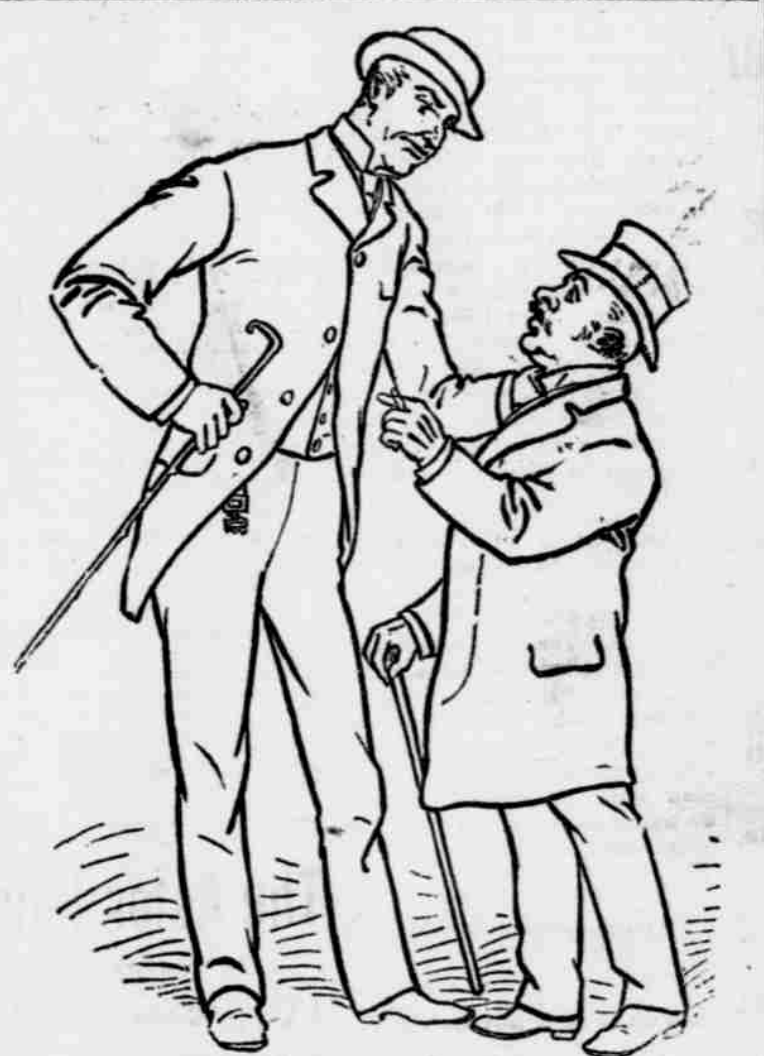
