Where rolls the Oregon?

The Renfrewshire sailed yesterday.

The Villalta arrived in yesterday from San Pedro.

Oscar I. Clay, of the Oregonian is in the city.

A cornet has been added to the Methodist church choir.

Reports from up river say the water is steadily going down.

Dr. A. E. Shaw is confined to his room by an attack of pneumonia.

To-morrow will see the finest celebration of the Fourth ever held in Astoria.

Houses to rent are about the scarcest commodity in Astoria at present.

The Alaskan arrived down yesterday evening and leaves for Portland at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon.

Flags, festoons, evergreens, trees, garlands, wreaths and trimmings tastefully arranged greet the eye in every direction.

The State sailed yesterday morning with 400 ca. salmon, 500 barrels fish oil, 130 skt. oysters, 1,200 bls. shooks and 80 M. lath from Astoria.

Salem No. 3, the boat to be used at the Clatsop ferry, arrived down at 5:30 yesterday evening, having left Rainier at 10 A. M., with load on board.

A post-mortem examination yesterday on the body of Pong Hi, the Chinaman brought down from Miller's Sands last Friday, disclosed the fact that his neck was broken.

Rev. E. W. Garner, LL. D., will deliver a discourse this morning, at the Presbyterian church, on "The Glory of America," and in the evening a sermon on "A Nation's Doom."

The grand marshal of the day, the aids and assistants and a representative of each organization intending to take part in the parade are requested to meet at the city hall at two o'clock this afternoon.

An 800 ton steam vessel is to be built at Skookwa: length 160 feet, beam 33 feet, depth of hold 11 feet. The keel is to be laid next Saturday. She will have iron bulkheads and will be fitted with accommodations for fifty passengers.

Capt. Hustler has placed the spacious Main street wharf at the disposal of the Daphnians and the troupe will issue thenceforth at 5 o'clock to-morrow afternoon. They will be a large force and they will emerge in great shape.

At the Methodist church to-day—Subject, 11 A. M., "How reconcile the fact of divine foreknowledge with the fact of man's moral free agency?" At 7:30 P. M., patriotic service—and sermon by the pastor—subject: "Why celebrate? and amid the dangers."

Dr. Estes, health officer of the port, has prepared his quarterly report for the quarter ending June 30th. Any one wishing to see the document can easily have his curiosity satisfied by calling at the doctor's office any time between now and six o'clock Monday afternoon.

Remember that the steamer Gen. Canby will leave Gray's wharf on July 4th at 6 A. M., sharp; returning, will leave Ilwaco at 8 A. M. and arrive at Astoria about 9:30, in time to participate in all the exercises of the day, returning to Fort Canby and Ilwaco at 5 P. M. Fare at excursion rates.

Preaching in the Baptist church to-day, by the pastor Rev. M. L. Rugg. Subject of morning sermon, "Personal Loyalty to a Personal Christ." Evening discourse will be first in course of lectures, subject "Perils of Our Free Institutions and How to Meet Them."

With six transcontinental lines it is out of the question to suppose that Astoria is going to be left out in the race for requisite terminal facilities. All the indications point to an era of great prosperity; no spurt, no fictitious, manufactured "boom," but a solid advance in growth and prosperity.

Fishing Boat Race.

Entries for fishing boat race will close at 10:30 on the morning of the 4th. All boats to report to C. J. Trenchard. Boats to carry only their usual working sail, that is mainsail and studding-sail; and to bring back the same amount of ballast they start with. Race to begin at 1 P. M. from line from Flavel's dock. Course to be from there to black buoy off Booth's cannery, which is to be left on the starboard hand. After rounding buoy, thence to buoy off Tansy Point, which is to be rounded also on starboard side, thence back again to place of starting, the first boat passing the judge's boat to take the first prize and the second boat second prize. In addition to the first prize of \$65 Messrs. Elmore & Sauborn will add a prize of \$15 for the winning boat, thus making the first prize \$80 and second \$90 to contend for.

A Patent Ice Cooler.

Ho ye that thirsteth draw near to the water. This is to give notice to the public generally that Messrs. Utzinger and Liddicoat have placed two of their patent coolers pro bono publico. One on Lafayette street opposite the Custom House and one on Water street in front of the office of Mr. William Welch. These little coolers are portable, easily moved from place to place as required and use but one tenth the quantity of ice required by other coolers, and another peculiarity is that the water is cooled by the ice, without the ice being mixed with the water, thus no matter how impure the ice may be, it does not affect the water you drink it only cools it. Messrs. Utzinger and Liddicoat generously furnish both the machine and the ice necessary and Mr. William Welch will furnish all the water that may be required free of cost. Don't fail to take a glass of ice cold water and test the cooler or if that is too thin for your patriotic souls, Utzinger and Liddicoat have been on draught passed through one of their coolers; try if some of that will quench your thirst and cool your fevered brow.
