Joe Pinschower, of the New York Novelty Store, has some fine views of Astoria, from advance sheets of the West Shore. That Astoria number will be here on the 21st.

There is now \$1,000 deposited with J. F. Halloran, to be given to the winner of the 200-yard foot race between Pete Grant and Ed. Rea to-morrow afternoon. The race will be run about three o'clock on Water street in the vicinity of the O. R. & N. dock.

In another column is announced the marriage of Mr. Charles F. Flanders and Miss Nellie McGuire, daughter of Hon. C. A. McGuire, of Clatsop. The newly married couple have the congratulations and good wishes of a large circle of acquaintances and friends.

There is little or no change in salmon matters. Thursday showed a little improvement, but it let down again Friday and yesterday, boats coming in with one or two fish, the highest boat heard of having eighteen. An improvement in the run is looked for this week.

Oregon peaches of fine quality are in market; raspberries are about going out; strawberries, large and luscious are still plenty; the apples take on a riper and more appetizing appearance; cherries, unsurpassed for flavor, are in abundance, and grapes at fancy prices are for sale.

The new steamer Walluski is ready for business between here and Young's river points. She will leave Gray's wharf every Friday, and leave Kamm's farm on her return trip the next morning. Capt. J. H. D. Gray is the agent and her Capt. Jno. G. Blake on board will tend to any business connected with the vessel.

"One Hundred Minutes with the People of Jerusalem" was the title of a very interesting lecture delivered by Wad-el-Ward at Liberty Hall last evening, being the last of the course, and which, with the accompanying tableaux, songs and costumes, was greatly enjoyed by those present. To-night there will be a union meeting at Liberty Hall, under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A., conducted by the distinguished lecturer.

Mrs. Johanna Bochau, whose prostration was spoken of in yesterday's issue, passed quietly away at nine o'clock yesterday morning. Deceased was a native of Holstein, and was in the 71st year of her age. Her daughter, Mrs. Capt. Bochau, at The Dalles, was telegraphed to last Thursday, and is expected down on the Telephone this afternoon. The funeral will be from the house of her grandson, Wm. Pohl, at ten o'clock Tuesday morning.

In the justice court yesterday in the case wherein Sam Johnson was the prosecuting witness and Mike Erickson was the defendant, justice Cleveland dismissed the case, which was a trivial one, and taxed the costs to the prosecuting witness. Another case wherein the same parties were in the same relative position came up shortly afterward, and resulted in the defendant being fined \$20. The net result of the two suits was that both parties were cinched, and at a slight outlay found out that this is a bad time of year to monkey with the band wagon.

By direction of the board of state land commissioners, treasurer Webb has begun to distribute to the treasurers of different counties their proportionate share of interest which has accrued during the past year on the irredeemable school fund. The amount being disbursed is \$87,400, just \$1 for each person of school age in the state. The school fund now amounts to \$1,200,000, and is increasing at the rate of from \$15,000 to \$20,000 per month. The present distribution is the largest ever made, the last amounting to 90 cents for each person of school age.

LATEST NEWS BY TELEGRAPH

NEW YORK, July 16.—Dreadful hot weather is reported at Utica, Syracuse, Cleveland, Detroit, Pittsburg and Chicago; at Pittsburg two fatal cases of sunstroke and a number of serious prostrations from heat are reported. The iron and steel mills were compelled to close during the heat of the day.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, July 16.—The temperature was two degrees hotter at noon to-day than yesterday. At noon there were two prostrations from the heat among laborers exposed to the extreme heat; there were four deaths from the heat yesterday and four more have been reported up to noon to-day. Many laborers have given up work on account of the extreme heat.

ST. THOMAS, Ont., July 16.—The number killed in the railroad disaster yesterday was nineteen and the number injured is about forty. After the collision occurred the passengers commenced emerging from the car windows and every available means of egress was being taken advantage of. Engineer Donnelly was found in the cab with his hand on the lever still, as if endeavoring to make the air brakes work.

FIRE IN NEW YORK. NEW YORK, July 16.—Fire was discovered about three o'clock this morning in the five-story brick building of the Metropolitan Storage warehouse on Fifty-eighth street, between Broadway and Sixth avenue. In a few minutes the flames mounted up through the structure and before the firemen arrived the whole place was a raging furnace. The warehouse formed an "L" within the Casino building, and for awhile it was feared that that beautiful temple of light opera would be in ashes, but it was saved by strenuous efforts of the firemen. Soon after the firemen had got to work at the Storage warehouse a terrific explosion occurred and seven men were blown through the window into the street, all severely burned; the damages are estimated at half a million dollars, although it may be much more.

HE MAY SCORED. PARIS, July 16.—Figaro says: "Capt. Jovis will, in October, attempt to make a balloon voyage across the Atlantic to New York; he will start from St. Naevis."

UNLIKE THE AMERICAN VIO. COM. PARIS, July 16.—The radical members of the chamber of deputies have framed a vigilance committee, composed of M. M. Antoine De La Forge, Clemenceau, Paulets and others, to watch political affairs.

ADVOCATE BARROW OF THE COURT OF appeal made his appearance on the steps here yesterday crying, "A bas Grey!"

AT A night fete some persons who were riding in cabs were compelled to alight in the streets by a mob. Those who declined to do so were forcibly removed from the vehicles.

THERE were some hostile demonstrations at the German embassy in Bordeaux and windows were broken in the office of the government organ.

TRAVELING THROUGH NEW YORK. UTICA, N. Y., July 16.—The special train which conveys the president and party to the Thousand Isles left Utica at the appointed hour. Secretary and Mrs. Fairchild boarded the train in Utica in the morning. At Holland Patent the party was further augmented by Miss Rose Cleveland, L. L. Yomans and wife, brother-in-law of the president, and Miss Carrie and Miss Mary L. Hastings, president Cleveland's nieces.

PENNSYLVANIA FOREST FIRES. PITTSBURG, July 16.—Telegrams from Brockwayville, in the lumber regions of Pennsylvania, report forest fires raging in every direction, and fears are entertained for the lumber settlements. A large force is at work fighting the flames, but so far all efforts to check them have been fruitless.

BIZ. NEW YORK, July 16.—The bank statement shows the reserve increase to be \$1,573,000; the banks hold \$79,575 in excess of the legal rule.

SAN FRANCISCO WHEAT RECEIPTS. SAN FRANCISCO, July 16.—The receipts of wheat for the first ten days of the new harvest year are 35,000 centals, as compared with 26,000 centals during the same period last year. The grain so far received does not grade as well as that of last year.

WANT CHEAPER RATES. LONDON, July 16.—One hundred members of the house of commons have formed a committee for the purpose of endeavoring to cheapen postal and telegraphic charges between the mother country and the colonies.

Recent Columbia River Tides. The tide table for the past six weeks has been badly upset in marking the ebb and flow of the tides in this locality by reason of the high water, and not till within the past few days has the upward sweep of tide from the ocean resumed anything like its usual dimensions. During this time the great discharge of fresh water has met and pushed back the salty current setting inward twice a day, the rush of water out to sea overpowering the incoming flood and forcing its own way many miles beyond the mouth of the river so that vessels in the offing dipping up water would find it but slightly brackish. During the middle of the ebb and on to the time of low water the current past the city and down over the bar was something tremendous, and when later on came the struggle between the flood tide and the current fed by the meeting of snows in the far off mountains it was a matter of vital importance to the fishermen who found there was virtually no flood tide to come in on.

Columbia Salmon Movement. From April 1st to July 1st, '86, 59,628 cases salmon went overland, from the Columbia; from April 1st to July 1st, '87, 96,676 cases were shipped overland; for the three months of '86, 27,101 cases went to San Francisco by steamer; for the three months of this year, 10,441 cases were so shipped. In 1885, 232,819 cases went eastward by rail; in 1886, 266,454 cases. In 1885, 102,610 cases were shipped to San Francisco; in 1886, 108,946. In 1884-5, 317,000 cases salmon went to England; in 1885-6, 213,947; in 1886-7, 162,556 cases.
