NORTHERN RAILBOAD RUMORS

PORT TOWNSEND, W. T.— For several weeks past a movement has been quietly taking place among certain wealthy parties and representatives of several noted capitalists of San Francisco and Sacramento who were and have been interested in Pa cific coast railroads for years. Following is the progress made thus far in the proposed establishment of a railroad from the straits of San Juan de Fuca to the Columbia river.

been going on between California pares and influential citizens of Puget Sound relating to the system referred Recently one of the wealthiest citizens of Washington territory left for San Francisco to confer with the railroad men. This conference was so satisfactory to the Californians that they dispatched representatives to Washington territory for the purpose of ascertaining the feasibility of building and operating a railroad, taking the line along the coast.

A greet deal of pains has been taken to keep the whole affair a profound secret. Articles of incorporation have, however, been under con sideration by interested parties, with the capital placed at \$3,000,000, divided in small shares. The value of these shares has not been decided upon. A desirable tract of land, fronting on Port Townsend bay, being favorably looked upon by the

railroads as a terminal point. The line will run, as now proposed, southwest of Port Townsend, to the west of Hood's canal, where a more southerly course will be taken through Mason county. The Satsop railroad will be crossed near Montesano, thence heading almost directly south. The lumber district of Che-halis county will be penetrated, and sawmills will then be afforded an opportunity of shipping lumber direc-to the port of entry, where quick dispatch will be afforded vessels in

carrying cargoes from the sound. The next county the railroad [will pass through is Lewis. The mount ains in this county will afford abun-dance of coal, which has never had facilities of being worked. The road will for the present, terminate at or near Kalama. A line of steambonts will be run both on Paget sound and the Columbia river, grain not only from the districts through which the railroad will pass, but from the in-land empire, will be transported down the Columbia river by the O. R. & N. Co.'s lines, and thence to Port Townsend. Towage charges of from \$250 to \$400 will then be saved by the ls in loading at Port Townsen instead of at up-sound ports.
