THE PROPOSED SUBSIDY. A COMMITTEE has been selected by the chairman of the chamber of com-merce to take into consideration the best means to raise the \$150,000 sub-sidy. Positive assurance is made by railroad men in San Francisco that if that much ruoney is raised and suita-ble grounds donated for depot, round houses, machine shops, etc., that the read will be built inside of a year. A road will be built inside of a year. A year seems too short: the language of the resolution adopted by the chamber of commerce last Monday night says eighteen months, which is more reasonable.

With this as a tangible basis there need be but little difficulty in raising the required amount. It is not a gift. Not a cent of it is required or expected till the road is completed. The question is not "How much will my neighbor give?" It is "How much til they also have a look at the northwill the road benefit me?" and give accordingly. This is a selfish view 'tis true, but pocket interests largely govern in these affairs. If a man is benefited \$5,000 by the road coming here he can well afford to give one of those thousands to the project that is going to benefit him five times the amount-especially if he won't or can't make that \$5,000 any easier way.

The beginning of the road would be the beginning of the enhancement of value; not till the road, was finished would the money contributed be expected.

THE ASTORIAN favors and encourages this with more force than two or three other plans formerly proposed, because it comes with greater positiveness and precision than its predecessors.







