Council meeting to-night.

The annual horsetrot at Salem began yesterday.

J. H. Mansell has just completed a fine map of school district No. One.

The Scandinavian Benevolent society meets this evening at 8 o'clock.

The outlook is brighter to the man who has had his windows washed.

In the C. A. Reed case the Ilwaco coroner's jury brought in a verdict of drowning.

Between \$65,000 and \$70,000 has so far been subscribed on the railroad subsidy subscription.

The sheriff's sale at the court house yesterday afternoon was postponed till Saturday at 2 P. M.

Writing from Sweden, D. P. Thompson says that that country reminds him of Oregon more than any other country in Europe.

There will be a meeting of the British Benevolent association at Mr. P. L. Cherry's office at eight o'clock this evening.

While riding in upper Astoria yesterday Mrs. C. L. Parker's horse slipped and fell, throwing his rider, who, fortunately, escaped with a few slight bruises.

While blackberrying last Saturday the little son of A. V. R. Snyder had his finger bitten by some insect, causing a painful swelling and blackening of the finger.

In the police court yesterday afternoon John Brown was assessed \$20 worth; \$10 for being drunk or having been in that condition, and \$10 for contempt of court.

Mrs. M. J. Bell, wife of Capt. Geo. Bell, of upper Astoria, died last Sunday morning, in the 35th year of her age. The funeral will take place at ten o'clock this morning from her late residence.

A noticeable feature of the railroad at Fort Stevens to the end of the jetty is the enormous amount of rust that accumulates. Great flakes of rust form on the rails, owing, it is said, to the action of the sea air.

Mr. Carnahan sends in from the Klaskanine a new variety of grass, heavily seeded, that grew among some timothy that he sowed this season. It is a new species of grass in these parts, and any one that can tell us what it is can have it.

Nathan Cole, who founded the Portland News and founded thereby, is said to have cleaned up \$40,000 in the last year in Los Angeles, "putting up houses on the installment plan," whatever that may be. Mr. Lord took charge yesterday as chief engineer of the Manzanita, vice E. P. Peake, who resigned. Harry is to be congratulated on deserved recognition in his appointment to a fine position.

As a companion item to that in THE ASTORIAN last Friday about Maurice Sullivan, of Cathlamet, who had been offered \$32,000 for 40 acres of land that he bought four years ago for \$2,000 near Los Angeles, it may be mentioned that Jas. Moore, near Knappa, at the same time bought 20 acres of the same tract, and last week got such big offers for it that he and his family have gone there to see about it.

FROM EUROPE AND THE EAST.

DUBLIN, Sept. 12.—Editor O'Brien, who was arrested at Kingstown yesterday, was conveyed to Mitchellstown this morning in the custody of an officer. He was accompanied by Harrington, M. D., and his counsel. O'Brien emphatically denies that he boarded the steamer at Kingstown to avoid arrest, his object being simply to see Labouchere who was about to leave for London.

A DREADFUL HURRICANE.
GLoucester, Mass., Sept. 12.—The schooner *Arctus* arrived here this morning from Grand Banks, and reports that a terrible hurricane swept over the Banks August 29th. Great damage was done vessels and many fishermen were lost. Fourteen men belonging to the schooner *Mausse*, of Publico, Nova Scotia, were swept overboard and drowned.

AN INTELLIGENT CROWD.
NAPLES, Sept. 12.—Three soldiers at Trapani were sent to perform disinfecting duty, and were assaulted by the mob who tried to force them to swallow the carbolic acid which they had been sprinkling about the streets and houses. One of the soldiers imbibed the liquid and soon after died in horrible agony. The other two refused to drink the acid and were killed.

O'BRIEN SATISFIED.
DUBLIN, Sept. 12.—O'Brien was enthusiastically received by a large crowd on his arrival at Limerick. In an address O'Brien said he never went on a journey which promised better for the cause of Ireland than this one. The government might close his lips, but there was spirit left in Ireland to-day that all the bayonets at their command could not silence.

DENOUNCED BY GLADSTONE.
LONDON, Sept. 12.—Gladstone arrived here to-day from Hawarden; he will speak in the house of commons to-night, in denunciation of the shooting of the people by the police at Mitchellstown last Friday.

GERMAN TRADE.
BERLIN, Sept. 12.—Prince Bismarck gave an audience on Saturday to several merchants, manufacturers and others who were interested in colonial enterprises. The manufacturers of rolled iron have founded a syndicate with the object of increasing the prices. The combination will begin operations on the first of October.

A MOUNTAIN FIRE.
GRASS VALLEY, Cal., Sept. 12.—Indian Springs, Penn and Pleasant valleys were swept by fire yesterday. No houses were burned, but much fencing and a large area of pasture in the finest farming district in this county was destroyed.

A RELIEF FOR HIM.
SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 12.—A report received here at 10:30 states that Gov. Bartlett is sinking rapidly and cannot live till noon.

DEAD.
LONDON, Sept. 12.—Sir Charles Young, author of the play, "Jim, the Penman," died suddenly last night.

NOT BUSY AS NAILERS.
LONDON, Sept. 12.—The number of nail makers on strike in Staffordshire alone is 15,000.

A CONSTABLE MURDERED.
DUBLIN, Sept. 12.—Moonlighters last night murdered constable Wielehan and mortally wounded another officer, near Ennis, county Clare. Wielehan was killed with a bludgeon. Eight arrests have been made on suspicion.

A Midnight Mystery.
Shortly before one o'clock yesterday morning, Mr. and Mrs. Battersby, who reside in Dr. Kinsey's building on Water street, were awakened by the cries of some one in deep distress; from the water in the rear of the building, came the cry, "For God's sake help me!" Rushing down the stairs and out on the planks as quickly as possible, they saw a man, who appeared to have a white coat on, sinking in the water, while around the corner of the piling on which Geo. W. Hume's cannery is built they saw a boat gliding in the darkness down the stream. They stood and listened but could hear and see nothing more than the water lapping against the piles and flowing on to the sea. There was no further sound or evidence of life, and further inquiries during the day failed to throw any light on the mystery. Who the man was; who were in the boat; where it went; these are questions that are, for the present, unanswered.

MARINE MENTION.

River, Ocean and Coast Shipping News.

The *Gen. Miles* goes to Shoalwater bay this morning.

The British bark *Irvine*, 655, from San Diego, arrived yesterday.

The *Nith* has been chartered by Balfour, Guthrie & Co. to load wheat.

The bark *Saranac* is loading at the Cantsop mill. She will take 850,000 feet.

The barkentine *John Smith* came in last Sunday and went to Knappa to load.

The *Idaho* sailed for Alaska yesterday. The *Columbia* leaves to-day for San Francisco.

The tonnage now en route to the Columbia aggregates 29,374 tons; registered tonnage in port, 14,470; total tonnage, 43,844.

The tug *Astoria* went on the Merchants' dry dock at San Francisco last Saturday to be cleaned and receive a new propeller.

The steamer *Arago*, at San Francisco from Coos bay, brings among her cargo fourteen cords of matchwood and sixteen sacks of grape-rot.

U. Sebree, light house inspector writes to Dr. Miner, of Seattle, that he will establish stake lights in Puget and Washington sounds. Points thus far decided upon are Olympia and Seattle.

There are a number of vessels about due: among them the *C. S. Hurlbert*, *Fiji*, *Vanduaara* and *Moresby*. The *Eclectechan*, a vessel of about the same large tonnage as the *Vanduaara*, is also due.

Commander Louis Kempf, U. S. N., commanding U. S. S. *Adams*, reports that on May 19, 1887, he passed over the assigned position of Passion Rock, latitude 16° 54' N., longitude 159° 54' W., without seeing any indications of land.

Edward Clark, mate on the schooner *Black Diamond*, which arrived at Victoria from Behring Sea last Wednesday, fell off the dock into the harbor at noon last Saturday, and was drowned. He was a native of Glasgow, where his family reside.

The *Manzanita* is taking supplies at the buoy depot for southern Oregon ports. Before going, the bell buoy formerly off the wreck of the *Great Republic*, now well out off the bar, will be taken up. A new buoy was put down in the former location of that one some time ago.

The largest cargo of lumber shipped from this coast during the month of August was by the British ship *General Gordon*, 1651 tons, from Ludlow to Melbourne. It consisted of 1,333,901 feet, value, \$18,954. The largest cargo shipped in July was by the British ship *Kilkerran*, from Port Blakely to Callao, 978,891 feet, value, \$12,726.

The foreign shipments of lumber from the Sound during August were: Three vessels for Valparaiso, with 1,354,087 feet of rough, 243,224 feet of dressed, 248,357 feet of rough redwood, and 5,269 feet of dressed redwood lumber, value \$24,527.92; three vessels for Melbourne with 2,480,729 feet of rough, and 21,904 feet of dressed lumber, \$20,469 value; and 160,540 pickets, value \$25,665.98; two vessels for Honolulu with 1,016,419 feet of rough, 229,146 feet of dressed lumber, 71,900 laths, and 3,002 feet of dressed spruce, value \$14,242.37; two vessels for Sydney, with 1,038,067 feet of rough, 321,375 feet of dressed lumber, 227,670 laths and 47,404 pickets, value \$16,071.60.

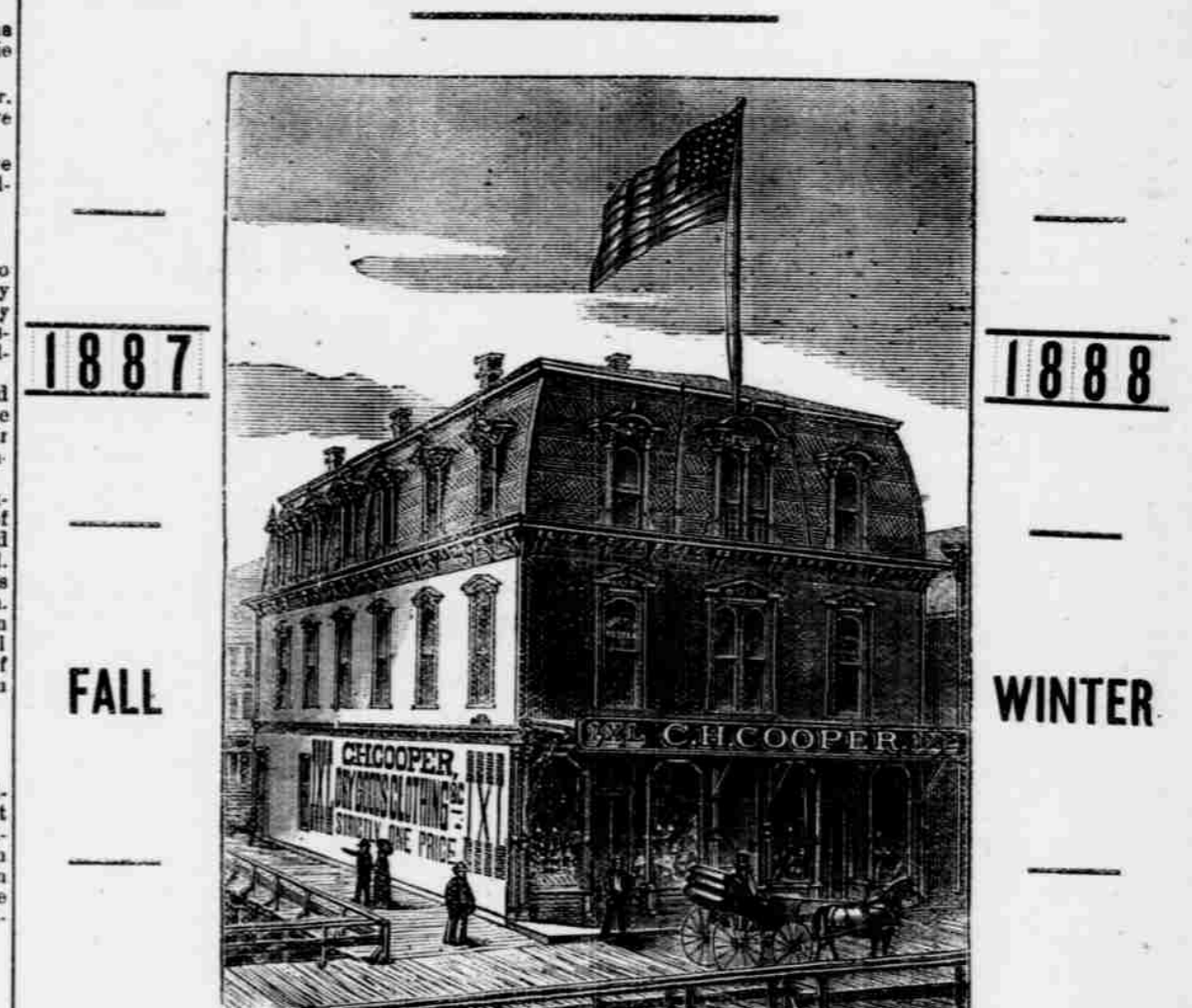
