NOT AN EXPERIMENT.

The latest authentic regarding the railroad is a direct statement from headquarters that if it is the subsidy of \$150,000 is raised the parties negotiating the matter when notified of the fact will place preliminary surveys in the field and if they pronounce it feasible the railroad will be built.

The ASTORIAN takes pleasure in informing the gentlemen that routes have been surveyed on three separate occasions and the approaches, gradients, etc., have been pronounced by competent engineers in every way satisfactory. The last was made by Mr. Hurlburt, between here and Forest Grove, four years ago and he informed us at the time that the route was a most excellent one in every respect.

So on that score no doubt need be entertained, and as far as the Columbia river route, and the route by way of Forest Grove, the matter is not an untried experiment, but a demonstrated fact.

In the meantime let the question "How is the subsidy getting along?" now asked from Lewiston to the sea, and from San Diego to Alaska, let it not languish. Help it all you can to grow. That is the main point and the vital essential.

A SOCIETY for the promotion of the higher education of women has been founded in Japan under the presidency of the prime minister, and with the support of various foreign and Japanese gentlemen. Besides regular courses of instruction which will be provided, special courses of afternoon lectures will be delivered by the professors of the university. The whole institution will be under the control of a foreign lady principal, assisted by two or more foreign lady teachers.

The result of the Northern Pacific railroad election is one of those happy events that gives every community, no matter how apparently diverse their interests, something to rejoice over. When Portland, Seattle and Tacoma can each heartily celebrate and rejoice over the same action, it is, indeed, a pleasure.

## The English Salmon Market.

The London Grocer of August 17th says of the salmon market in that city:

The trade in salmon is becoming something of a mystery, as, while parties are to be met with who make out that there is "nothing doing," and the market is practically a blank others inform us that unabated firmness exists for choice brands, and that more business is passing in the inferior packs at relatively moderate prices. Which is the true version respecting the article we leave our readers to judge for themselves, merely annexing a few quotations at which offers for such and such lots have been made and actually accepted, viz., Columbia river fish at 28s to 29s 6d, finest Fraser river salmon at or nearly the same money. Behring sea fish by the Arctic Packing company at 26s in London, or 25s 3d in Liverpool, both ex wharf, and the "Tomahawk" brand at 24s 9d and 24s per case of 1-b tins.

Of the Liverpool market the same authority says:

There is a very strong market for salmon, and the undoubtedly short catch will still further strengthen prices, although the consumptive demand is being most satisfactorily maintained. This may be attributed to the extreme regularity and fine quality of last season's pack, the public evidently appreciating a good and reliable article. There are still several poor parcels of last season's on hand, which are found difficult to dispose of. Quotations for Columbia river are, flat tins 33s, tall 28s to 29s, outside rivers, tall tins 25s to 26s.

## A Valuable Cargo.

The most valuable general cargo which has left this port in years will be carried by the British ship *Lagdale*, which sails to-morrow for Liverpool. The estimated value in round figures is \$500,000, and the most interesting fact connected with it is that it consists entirely of California products. The following items from her bill of lading will give an idea of what she will convey to England as samples of the varied products of California: Sixty-three thousand, seven hundred and thirty-one cases of canned fruit, 14,362 cases of canned salmon, 64 cases of pearl shells, 1,609 cases of eucalyptus oil, 395 barrels of the same, 66 pounds of elk-horn, 25 tons of cotton, 1,922 sacks of borax, 111 bales of wool, 856 barrels of grape brandy, 430 bunches and 716 barrels of wine, 30 cases of champagne and some tons of mint sweepings.—S. F. Bulletin, 15.

## FROM EUROPE AND THE EAST.

Specials to Readers of "The Astorian."

Dubuque, Sept. 19.—A horrible accident on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad two miles north of this city, took place about 5:30 this morning. The north and south bound passenger trains collided at full speed. Five persons were killed outright and many injured. All the victims are train men; none of the passengers seriously injured.

New York, Sept. 19.—The Uncom-pahgre Mining Co. has been dissolved and Henry L. Coldwell has been appointed receiver by order of Judge Donohue, of the supreme court. The company has two mining claims, the Mammoth Lode and Great Republic, in Ouray county, Colorado, and its capital stock was one hundred thousand dollars. Of this 67,000 shares have been placed, all full paid, among prominent New Yorkers. It appeared on the petition for dissolution made by Joseph T. Stevens, the company's president, that the property of the company was not worth more than one thousand dollars.

A HALF-MILLION-DOLLAR FIRE. MARTVILLE, Cal., Sept. 19.—A fire started in the Union Lumber company's yards, in the heart of the city, at one o'clock this morning. The department responded to the alarm, but its efforts were of little avail, and in a short time a large lumber pile, F. Brown's residence, Gilman's Red House and a large number of stores, and the greater portion of the water works were on fire. At 2:30 the fire was under control, but the total loss will reach half a million.

ARRANGING MATTERS. LONDON, Sept. 19.—The Standard's correspondent at Shanghai says the American-Chinese bank syndicate have accepted Li Hung Chang's conditions. An American official will depart for China immediately to complete arrangements. The bank will probably be started in Shanghai and Tientsin, and branches opened in Philadelphia and Liverpool in the spring.

FAILURE OF A BREWERY. CINCINNATI, Sept. 19.—The Geo. Weber brewing company made an assignment this morning; liabilities estimated at \$500,000; preferences in the form of mortgages given aggregating \$163,000; assets, \$350,000.

BIG GOLD IMPORTS. NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—The steamers *Champagne*, *Alaska* and *Germanic* brought \$1,384,000 in gold to this port to-day.

HE LEFT IT ALL. SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 19.—The inventory and appraisal of the estate of the late ex-senator A. A. Sargent, showing its value to be \$133,427, was filed in the probate court to-day.

A MELANCHOLY CASE. WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—Capt. Mullet, of the revenue marine service, who committed suicide in San Francisco yesterday, was a brother of ex-supervising architect Mullet. He was on an eighteen months' leave of absence, on account of acute melancholia caused by malaria contracted in the service. His friends have feared for some time that his malady would end in suicide.
