New boilers of a peculiar pattern were placed on board the tug Astoria at San Francisco last Saturday, and none of the kind have ever been none of the kind have ever been placed on a marine vessel before. There are three cylinders instead of one, and the cylindrical parts, being small, require less thickness of iron for the same high pressure of steam. All the parts being circular in form they require a less amount of staving and it is claimed that the consumption of coal is greatly reduced. The designs of the new boilers have been igns of the new boilers have been sent to the naval authorities at Washington, where the idea received warm commendation. A large num-ber of mechanics and steamboat men have visited the tug to see the new boilers.

The Pittsburg Oil company has necessed in making a deal with inependent producers to stop over-pronction and prevent further breaks in oil. It has contracted to transfer to a certain body of producers 6,000, 000 barrels of oil at 62 cents per barrel. This oil is to be afterward sold out for the benefit of the producers at \$1 per barrel. They agree to dis-courage "wild-catting," stop the drill

A USELESS EFFORT. San Francisco, September 20.— Congressman W. W. Morrow has forwarded a communication to secretary Bayard giving a detailed statement of the murder of Leon Baldwin, superintendent of mines owned by Americans, in the state of Durango, who was shot and killed by Mexican bandits a month ago. Mor-row calls attention to the frequent occurrences of these outrages and urges the government to demand redress from Mexico.

GOOD ADVICE.

Fatal Accident Near Oysterville.

The United States survey steame McArthur, in charge of Lieut. J. S. Burnett, U. S. N., came in from Shoalwater bay, with her flag halfmasted, on a most melancholy errand yesterday.

Last Sunday afternoon the McArthur, the crew of which have been engaged in surveying Shoalwater bay, was lying about half a mile from shore, when ensign N. S. Mosely and draughtsman Whetmore started in a small sail boat to go ashore at Oysterville for the mail. When half way across, the sea being calm and the sail dead, a sudden squall struck the boat and before it could get any headway, capsized, throwing both occupants into the water, where they struggled for three or four hours. Finally, when about ready to sink through weariness, they got the boat righted and got to shore more dead than alive. Upon getting to shore they were taken out of the boat, kindly cared for, and carried to the Tom Morris, and brought out by that boat to the McArthur.

Mr. Whetmore soon recovered, but ensign Mosely was evidently so overcome by exposure as to be dying.


