DOING HIS BEST.

The young man "who does the best his circumstances will allow," makes even that a stepping stone to success. When poverty obliged Stephen A. Douglas, a boy of fifteen years, to give up all hope of entering college, he indentured himself as an apprentice to a cabinet maker.

At twenty years of age he left the academy and law office to seek his fortune in that vaguely defined region known as "the west." He wandered through Cleveland, Cincinnati, Louisville and St. Louis, seeking in vain for some "opening" through which he might pass to self-support.

The morning after his arrival he left his lodgings to find employment. As he approached the public square, he saw a crowd, and joined it. An administrator, about to sell by auction the stock in trade of a deceased merchant, was halted by the want of some man competent to keep a record of sales, and to make out the bills of purchasers.

No person in the crowd, though several of them had been asked, was willing to undertake the duty. The administrator was embarrassed and the would-be bayers impatient.

It was in the days when president Jackson was fighting the United States bank, and party feelings were at fever heat. At intervals during the sale and in the evenings he joined in the political conversations which took place.

While teaching school he devoted his evenings to studying the statutes of Illinois. On Saturday afternoons he acted as counsel before the justice's court.

In seven years from the date of his application he occupied a seat upon the supreme court bench, and in ten years he went back to the east as member of a congress. His subsequent career as a United States senator, a leader of the Democratic party, and a presidential candidate is well known.

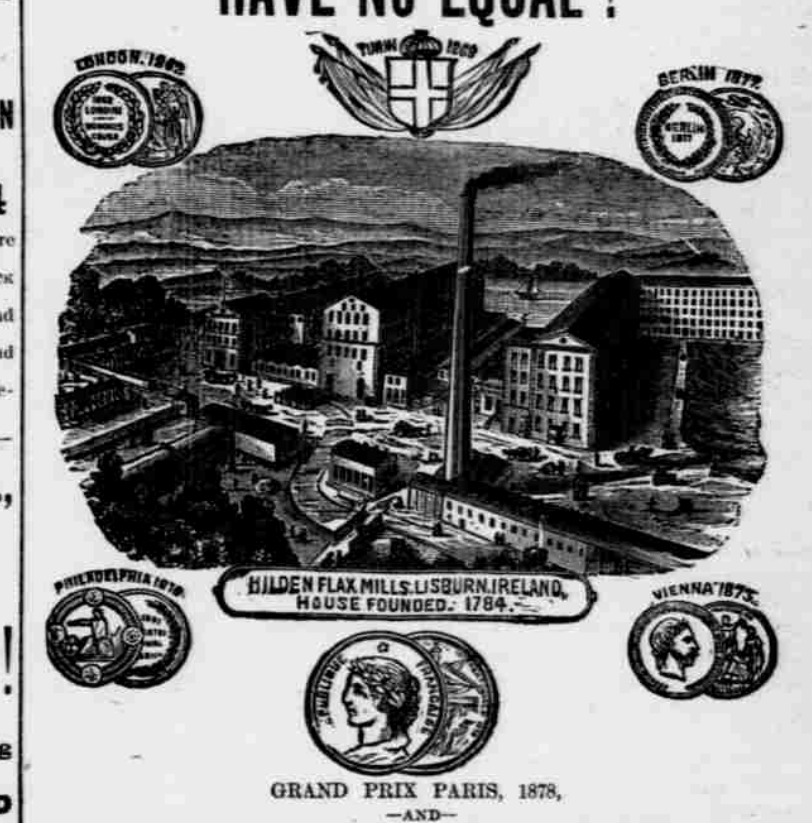
