At a desk in his office the editor sat, and wrote up an excellent screed, telling farmers the way to do this and that, from plowing to sowing the seed. In words that were burning he told of neglect that lay on some farms like a pall, and asked how the farmers in sense could expect to harvest a crop in the fall. Your ads are set up in deplorable taste, and some of them cannot be read; your wrappers are botchy and covered with paste—you run in old matter that's dead. You ought to endeavor to write in a vein, that's cheerful—not dry and morose; to read what you write always gives me a pain, though I try to enjoy it, Lord knows!"
