The London Grocer of Dec. 10th, says: New salmon of 1887 pack is expected to arrive here about the be-ginning of January, and sales have already been made of Columbia river fish at 28s 6d, c. f. and i., for London: but we hear that merchants will not go on at these terms, as it is generaly admitted that best brands will not open at less than 30s per case, and ransactions in the interval have been reported at 29s 6d on the spot for best quality in tall tins. A public sale by the Hudson's Bay Co. on Wednesday passed off with some spirit as fol-lows: 1,760 doz. tins preserved salmon, ex-Labrador, which went at 6s 3d to 7s 3d per doz.; also 659 casks saltted, salmon, per same ship, tierces weighing on the average 438 lbs. each at 121s to 123s, ditto averaging 475 fbs. each at 98s to 105s, and inferior (477 lbs. each) at 91s to 93s per cask, besides a few lots of low quality and smaller packages at 62s down to 30s and 27s; but another parcel of 599 bbls salted salmon, "Inverness" brand, from the Skeena river, British Col-umbia, packed in 1886, and imported per Amberlemo from Victoria, of fered by a private firm, met no adequate bids, and was withdrawn.


