Three Good Business Hints.

Never sign a paper without reading it; and if after reading you do not understand it, have it thoroughly explained before you put a signature to it. It is best to get some third person who is not interested in the matter at all to explain the meaning of what is not clear, or to point out words that have two meanings in the document.

Always make a memorandum in your little book of any contract you undertake for money or any agreement to work. It saves much trouble to keep a memorandum book and put down the dates when you either pay or receive money. Whatever money passes on account, set it down. If any money or thing of value goes through your hands give a receipt for it and make a memorandum. Your receipt settles the amount that passes, and that cannot be disputed. When you pass it to a third party get a receipt and keep it. This form is as important in the transfer of income, trust-money, or valuables among your own family as with other persons.

A City Beneath the Sea.

A city at the bottom of the sea was seen toward the end of October near Treptow, in Prussia, when a powerful south sea blew the waters of the Baltic away from the shore, uncovering a portion of ground usually hidden from sight by the wave.
