STATISTICS show that there are more vessels registered on the lakes than on the Pacific ocean and its tributaries.

The total cash in the United States treasury on January 1, 1888, was \$942,640,200.23, an increase of \$19,182,695.19 during the year.

The Yale College School of Journalism has decided that the coming newspaper will not print advertisements. That settles it.

The lowest temperature yet reported in this country this winter was at Belgrade, in Montana territory, January 7th—52 degrees below zero.

In the United States senate last Thursday bills were passed granting pensions of \$2,000 annually to the widows of Gen. Jno. A. Logan and Gen. Frank P. Blair.

A comparison of the mails across the Atlantic and the Pacific shows that the news of an event in Singapore reached New York by the Pacific route one day ahead.

While the dominion government is spending thousands of dollars every year to bring assisted immigrants from Europe, the exodus of its own people to the United States is constantly increasing.

Russia is increasing her forces by sea and land. She has 450,000 men on the frontier of Germany and Austria and it is plain that she is just biding her time to commence hostilities or test the strength of her neighbors.

The Bell Telephone company, it is reported, is preparing to enter into active competition with the Western Union for the telegraph business of the country. The fact is, the Western Union is a large stockholder of the Bell company.

Last year bread and butter cost less than in the previous year, but cheese, pork and canned goods were higher. Coffee, which advanced in price, decreased largely in consumption, while tea, which declined in price, increased 10 per cent. in use.

Never in time of peace has there been such a demand for lead and zinc as at present. "Agents of the French government have purchased nearly the entire American output, to have it on hand for the manufacture of brass field-pieces."

MINING men of Montana are becoming alarmed over the fact that a vast majority of the public land in the territory is being classed by United States surveyors as agricultural, thus allowing it to be claimed by the Northern Pacific railroad under their grant.

THERE were lynched during the year 1887, in these United States, no fewer than one hundred and twenty-three persons. Of the various states and territories, Texas leads the list with fifteen lynchings, and Mississippi is entitled to second place, with fourteen to her credit. All the victims were males, eighty of them being negroes.

The salvation army consists of 2,292 corps with 5,684 officers. During last year 1,810,280 meetings have been held, 2,717,880 houses visited, and 148,905 were "converted" in Great Britain alone. "General" Booth, who runs the business on business principles, has made a handsome fortune out of the scheme. It's worked for all its worth.

It is not generally known that Washington is the most southern of the capitals of the great nations of the northern hemisphere. Madrid, Constantinople and Rome are even further north, while Paris is up in the neighborhood of Newfoundland, and London and Berlin are on the line of Labrador. St. Petersburg is on the same parallel as Greenland and is 1,460 miles north of Washington.

A French company has submitted to the Chilean government a scheme for establishing a towing service, to be carried on by tug-boats, towing vessels through the straits of Magellan, between Patagonia and Terra del Fuego, and for lighting up the long and narrow channel by means of sixty-five fires to be maintained along the banks. To cover the expense and interest an impost of 30 cents upon a register ton of the vessels passing to be levied. The company demands the concession to be granted for seventy-five years. The Chilean government looks upon the scheme with the greatest favor, as it promises to be a set-off against the dangerous competition threatened by the Panama canal, and has, therefore, instructed its diplomatic agents to sound the other seafaring nations on the subject.

PERSONAL MENTION.

Since his return J. C. Dement has been seriously ill of fever. The venerable R. W. Morrison, of Clatsop, was in the city yesterday.

W. E. Dement, who has been quite ill, is again able to be on the street. Thos. Haro is reported some better of the pleurisy which has seriously affected his health.

Mollie Berdan, formerly a well known resident of this city, died at Murray, Idaho, on the 17th inst. M. Jensen, of this city, has been granted a patent on his new invention of a can crimping and capper.

Mrs. Dr. Trenchard has received the sad news of the death of her brother, an old and honored resident.

Dr. Wm. H. Watkins, a prominent resident of Portland, died of heart disease in the Taylor street Methodist church, last Thursday evening.

Samuel K. Williams, printer, died last week in Charleston, S. C., aged seventy-seven. He was the inventor of the cylinder proof-press now to be found in every printing office in the country.

Geo. Benn, of Aberdeen, died in Portland last Tuesday, of typhoid pneumonia. His father, Samuel Benn, who is in San Francisco, was immediately telegraphed for and is on his way up.

John F. Coyle, once editor of the National Intelligencer, the friend of Wilkes Booth at the time of the assassination of Lincoln, and the power behind the throne during Andy Johnson's administration, later the private secretary of Samuel J. Tilden, has reached the bottom of the ladder and is now a free-lunch fiend around New York barrooms.

George W. Rosare, known as the "cowboy evangelist," is said by an Arkansas newspaper to be worth \$700,000, which yields him an income of \$150 a day. His fortune was made in cattle and by lucky investments in real estate. He is just forty years old, and in his youth was reputed to be one of the most lawless of the desperadoes of the plains.

R. H. Dunlap, of Skamokawa, died at that place yesterday morning. Deceased was in the 52nd year of his age, and leaves a wife and four children. He was an uncle of J. W. Dunlap, of this city. He came to Skamokawa from Prairie City, Iowa, about 3 years ago. He was prominent in Masonic circles and will be buried under the auspices of the fraternity this afternoon.

Senator John H. Mitchell has "a double" in Washington who is a horse-shoer. Every week the senator receives mail matter intended for his namesake of the smithy, and is compelled to spend a considerable sum in postage stamps in remitting the letters, etc., which belong to "John H. Mitchell, horse-shoer." The senator is no worse off than he was, however, for several years while Hon. John I. Mitchell was senator from Pennsylvania. There being only the difference of a middle initial in their names, it was unavoidable that their letters should be much mixed in the mails. Fortunately, they both belonged to the same political party, and could afford to share their confidences to a certain extent.
