ASTORIA, OREGON: SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 11, 1888. THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

The chamber of commerce convened last evening, Judge Bowly presiding, E. C. Holden, secretary. A large representation of the membership was present.

A committee report was made respecting the building, by the government, a service flag, are imposed on the contractor, and because of the repeated failures the postmaster at Oysterville was instructed to employ service.

Information having been received that, owing to the increased and increasing work required from the inspector of this light house district, a wharf was needed for light house purposes at Astoria, separate and distinct from the buoy depot at Tongue Point, and that application had been made to the department for an appropriation for that purpose, on motion, the secretary was instructed to communicate to our representative in congress the request of the Chamber that they secure, if possible, the needed appropriation.

The subject of increased trade and travel between Astoria and Gray's Harbor and adjacent points, was brought before the Chamber and freely discussed. A committee of three, Messrs. Gordon, Devlin and J. W. Welch, was appointed to confer with the Ilwaco Steam Navigation company as to ways and means to permanently provide extended facilities for travel and transportation to those points.

Attention was called to a telegram sent to the New York Daily Sun, and reprinted, with fitting comment, in THE DAILY ASTORIAN, in which were many false statements representing disasters to shipping at the mouth of the Columbia river on January 26th, and the president and secretary were instructed to forward to New York papers a denial of the truth of any of the statements of said telegram.

The chamber then adjourned.

Another Protest Against Bar Charges.

FROM OVER THE SEA.

Specials From European Capitals. A Move to Take the Duty Off Tin Plate.

St. Louis, Feb. 10.—The Western Canned Goods association, at their annual meeting here, passed a resolution providing for the preparation of a memorial to congress asking for the removal of the import duty on tin plate, thus placing canned goods in the reach of all classes of people.

THE WALKING MATCH. New York, Feb. 10.—Panchot has dropped from second to fourth place in the walking match. Albert still has a good lead, scoring at 10 o'clock 482 miles; Herly second, 459; Guerrero third, 458.

DIDN'T AGREE. New York, Feb. 10.—The jury in the suit of Howard Henkel of Cincinnati against Mrs. Jeanette M. Thurber for \$12,000, for money advanced to Manager Locke, of the American Opera company, have disagreed.

THE DRY GOODS MARKET. New York, Feb. 10.—Imports of dry goods at the port of New York for the week ending February 9th, are \$3,689,000. The amount marketed is \$3,688,000.

THE CROWN PRINCE. SAN REMO, Feb. 11.—The official bulletin says the crown prince passed a good night without fever or pain, and that his powers of respiration and deglutition are perfectly unimpeded.

SAN REMO, Feb. 10.—The crown prince of Germany slept well last night. He takes food easily and his general condition is satisfactory.

A MEDICAL OPINION. LONDON, Feb. 10.—The Lancet says: "Even should perichondritis prove the sole disease from which the crown prince is suffering, its great extent must cause serious and permanent deformity of the larynx."

A TECHNICALITY. DUBLIN, Feb. 10.—In the court of queen's bench to-day a verdict rendered by the coroner's jury in the case of the police officers charged with murder in connection with the Mitchellstown riots, was set aside on the ground that the jury was chosen informally.

HANGED AT HELENA. HELENA, MON., Feb. 10.—Patrick J. Harrell was hung at 11:30 to-day for the murder of John Pitts in November, 1885. He acknowledged the deed but claimed extenuating circumstances.

BISMARCK CONGRATULATED. BELMUN, Feb. 10.—The National Zeitung says almost all of the German sovereigns have congratulated Prince Bismarck upon his speech and its results.

THE REPUBLICAN CONVENTION. CHICAGO, Feb. 10.—The sub-committee of the Republican national convention this morning elected Gene Fitzsimons, of Chicago, sergeant at arms of the national convention. The Grand Pacific hotel was selected as a permanent head quarters of the national committee. The committee took a look at the Auditorium building and are apparently satisfied that the vast building will be ready for the convention. They will arrange about admission this afternoon before final adjournment.

NOTES FROM LONDON. LONDON, Feb. 10.—A dispatch from San Remo says the German Crown Prince is uneasy and feverish.

The police have arrested Patrick O'Brien, a member of parliament, mistaking him for a member for West Cork, for whose arrest a warrant had been issued.

O'Brien was taken to Scotland jail yard where he was recognized by an official and was promptly released.

J. D. Pyne, member for West Waterford, was arrested on suspicion from a cab outside the house of commons. Pyne is the gentleman who shut himself up in Lusferney castle, in Waterford, and defied the police to arrest him, and who afterwards eluded the Irish authorities and escaped to England.
