Capt. Powell's Successor.

CHICAGO, March 16.—The announcement that Maj. Handbury, chief of the United States engineering department in Chicago, has been ordered to Portland was as much of a surprise to the major himself as to his many friends. He was seen in his office yesterday and asked if the report had been verified, and he replied that it had. He explained that he would relieve Capt. Powell, who is in charge of the improvements at the mouth of the Columbia river, of construction of dams and locks in Oregon, of improvements at the Cascades, of construction at Forts Canby and Stevens, and of the Thirtieth light house district. Maj. Handbury says he was not expecting anything of the kind, but as far as that went he was liable to be moved from one place to another without other notice than in the present case. He would have liked to remain here a little while longer, but personal preferences did not weigh anything, as the orders of his superior officers had to be obeyed.

He was asked if he thought his opposition to one of the plans for a great waterway connecting the lakes with the Mississippi river had anything to do with the transfer and he replied that he did not think so for a moment, adding that he was not wedded to one route any more than another. He was confident that this matter had no weight at all in the decision to send him to Oregon, as it could not be personal under any circumstances. He had been ordered to Chicago without any solicitation and knew that his being sent away had not been solicited.

Hassler of the interior department, who enjoys the reputation of being one of the best story tellers in public life, "you all remember dear old Beau Hickman, the notorious 'beat' of antebellum days? What They Decide.

The fish commissioners have decided that no salmon of any kind or description shall be caught during the close season. It has been the custom hitherto to fish for salmon at Oregon City during March and it was learned yesterday, says Friday's News, that parties were catching fish there at present. To-day Mr. Thompson will leave for Oregon City to investigate the matter, and it on inquiry it is found that the law has been violated the parties will be arrested and prosecuted. Governor Penney's attention has been called to the Oregon City matter and it is probable that he, too, will look into it and give it his personal attention.

The fish commissioners think that express companies and their agents are as much interested in enforcing the fish law as any other portion of the community is, for the reason that if the salmon become extinct through ceaseless fishing, it means loss to the express companies. The fish commissioners, therefore, think that the express people should refuse to carry salmon during the present month. It is against the law to catch the fish, and the express companies should, therefore, refuse to transport them for this reason alone, if no other existed. If this was done it would go along way towards preventing illegal fishing. Mr. Thompson stated that the law is generally being well observed. A few complaints were made about parties fishing on the lower Columbia but those who filed them were in no case willing to swear out complaints for the reason that the information came to them second-handed.
