THE New York Assembly has cut down Roscoe Conkling's claim for legal services from \$20,000 to \$2,000.

THE contest of 1888 promises to be one of unexampled interest, and of the educating sort whose benefits are not confined to the mere selection of a chief magistrate, or even the acceptance or rejection of political or economic theories.

SENATOR EDWARDS has introduced a bill providing for the inspection of masts intended for exportation, to meet the objections urged against American meat products by the German and French governments, and to prevent the importation into this country of adulterated goods.

THE newest story is that the Burlington & Quincy managers brought about the great strike on purpose—the object being to force the other roads into a great railroad trust. If that was the object it has signally failed, and the results may be disastrous to the great corporation.

Alaska Coast Pilot.

Lieutenant-commander H. E. Nichols, United States navy, attached to the United States coast survey for the special duty of compiling, has left on the Alaska Commercial company's steamer Dora, Capt. Erskine, for Kodiak island. He will make an examination of the shores and harbors of the island and of the shores and bays of the south side of the Alaska peninsula abreast of Kodiak.

In turn he will make visits to and examine all the shores of Alaska as far as Point Barrow to the northward, and southward as far as the field of his three years' surveying in the southern part of the Alexander archipelago. Every headland, inland rock and danger will be examined so as to be fully described to the navigator. Instantaneous photographs will be taken to indicate the peculiarities which the pencil might overlook in sketching.

Commander Nichols is peculiarly fitted for this duty and takes special interest in the work, so that when he has concluded his labors a thoroughly reliable coast pilot may be expected from his hands.

The first coast pilot of the coast of Alaska was made by Prof. George Davidson and published by the government in 1859. The second one was compiled by W. H. Dall of the coast survey, from all available data and his own observations. These and the many maps published by the coast survey added vastly to the information respecting Alaskan waters.

While the coast of California, Oregon and Washington territory is remarkably free from dangers to navigation, the waters of Alaska are full of dangers, and very frequently in the most unexpected places. The needs of a coast pilot and additional charts are therefore paramount, and it is to be hoped that congress will give a fair and liberal appropriation for the survey of that territory, which is now looming into great importance.—S.F. Call, March 29.

She jumped after the child. Both are seriously injured and will probably die. The husband of the woman is a baker and was not at home at the time.

A CHARTER REPEALED.

BALTIMORE, April 3.—Late last night the legislature of Maryland repealed the charter of the Baltimore & Ohio employees' relief association, to take effect April 1, 1888. This action meets the approval of the new officers of the railroad company.

DIED IN NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, April 3.—Jacob Greenbaum, a well known California auctioneer, who died at the Windsor hotel last Friday, was buried this morning in Cypress Hill cemetery. He was on his way to Europe, on a visit, when taken ill.

A CONGRESSIONAL INQUIRY.

WASHINGTON, April 3.—The house commerce committee has ordered a favorable report on a resolution to provide for congressional inquiry into the engineers' strike in the west.

CALIFORNIA TIMBER FRAUDS.

WASHINGTON, April 3.—Commissioner of public lands Stockslager has made a report concerning the redwood land frauds in California. He says: "The entries now under consideration are only a small portion of those in which the same parties are interested, and to which the alleged title has been acquired in a similar manner, the records of this office showing at least 300 such entries and embracing about 57,000 acres of the finest timber land in the United States, which Putnam, who is admitted to be a specially well-informed timber expert, estimated to be worth at least \$11,000,000."

AN UNDERGROUND RIVER.

LEAVENWORTH, April 3.—In prospecting for a gas well, some days ago, the drill struck a cavity at a depth of 1,800 feet, and raised no more dirt. It has since been discovered that the drill has penetrated a wide underground river which carried away the loose earth. The water is shallow and the drill is working the sandstone bed of the stream.
