The Republican state convention speaks in unequivocal terms favoring the opening and free use of the Columbia river.

The Philadelphia Natural Gas company, of Pittsburg, Penn., controls 75,000 acres of territory on which 125 wells are in use and have a production of 400,000,000 feet per day.

The number of hogs packed in the west during the late winter season is estimated at 5,900,000, a decrease from last year of about 539,000 head. The prospective hog supply points to a decrease of 13 per cent.

Four more volumes of the census of 1880 will be required to complete it, and \$70,000 will be appropriated for the purpose. The last census will be finished just in time to prevent it telescoping the next census.

The output of the tomato canneries of the United States and Canada during 1887, was 67,651,162 cans. New Jersey took the lead. The industry is conducted in twenty states. The 1888 outlook indicates a good year as 1887.

A MURDERER who had been released on ticket-of-leave, near Tempegar, Hungary, went to the house of the judge who condemned him and killed the judge's wife. He then went to the house of the notary and killed the latter's deputy. From there he went home and split the skulls of his wife and children, after which he fled and has not been captured.

Who will be the Republican presidential candidate is a question without an answer. Now, even guessing is done in the dark. It is now thought that the effort to revive the Elaine boom will be successful in the convention. Failing that, all is uncertainty, though it is not improbable that the convention, when the time arrives, will, owing to the undoubted strength of Mr. Cleveland, carefully select for their candidate a leader who, by his high character and general popularity, will unite the party, and who, by his assured protective record, will attract from the Democratic ranks all protectionists. When the time for selection comes, it will not likely be asked who is willing, but rather who, if nominated, can be elected, and that one will become the candidate. At least such appears to be the hope of the intelligence and patriotism of the party who want no worn-out practical politician to fight a losing battle for, but a man to fit in all things, and having the universal regard, to fight a winning battle for. Among the million of Republicans certainly, it is contended, such a candidate can be found.

ROSOE CONKLING RECOVERING.

The Deadlock in the House of Representatives Unbroken.

WASHINGTON D. C. April 11.—The deadlock in the house is still unbroken, and the house is constructively in session for Wednesday of last week.

A motion to adjourn was declared out of order because no business had intervened since, a similar motion was lost.

A FATAL DOSE. PORTLAND, Or. April 11.—Mrs. Fred Catlin of Freeport W. T. A sister-in-law of Judge Catlin of this city, who came here for medical treatment accidentally took an overdose of Morphine this morning which resulted fatally.

A MURDER. SAN FRANCISCO, April 11.—John Mestall a poultry dealer was found murdered in his room on Clay street this morning. There are a number of knife wounds on his head and body, from four of which a great quantity of blood had flown.

The room was in a very dirty and disorderly condition and presented a horrible appearance when the body was found. Suspicion pointed to his partner, Julian Portelli, as perpetrator of the crime and he was immediately arrested.

ADDICTION AND SCANDAL. PITTSBURGH, Pa. April 11.—Ensign Ryan, of the U. S. N., detailed here to inspect the armor plate of the Carnegie works for the government, and J. W. Meed, president of the Arctic Ice company, were arrested on a charge of abducting the seventeen year-old daughter of W. J. Parsons, a prominent citizen of Allegheny.

The daughter, Rosa Parsons, is a leading soprano of North avenue M. E. church choir, one of the most fashionable churches here. The charge is made by Mrs. Parsons, who claims to have discovered through detectives that her daughter was induced to go to New York on promise that she would be secured a position in an operatic troupe and supplied with costumes. She went to Trenton, N. J., stopped there several days at the Windsor hotel, under the name of Mrs. Marshall, and was joined by Ryan and taken to New York, where she is now sequestered in a flat on Broadway.

The arrests have created a great social stir and scandal. The daughter has been missing ten weeks, and the mother has been searching for her everywhere and the most prominent citizens here, as well as pastors of churches, have been interested in the hunt. The parties have been committed for hearing.

Lieut. Eaton, who is in command and is here, has been notified to suspend Ryan, pending investigation. Lieut. Eaton says that if the charge is sustained Ryan will be dismissed from the service. The prisoners are held in the sum of \$10,000 bail.

CONKLING RECOVERING. NEW YORK, April 11.—What was thought to be the turning point in ex-senator Conkling's condition came this morning at 6:20 o'clock, while suffering from one of his periodical attacks of delirium. Mrs. Conkling passed up and down in the sick chamber. After ten minutes he once more sank back on the bed and it was not long before he was fast asleep. His physicians said that much depended upon the condition of their patient when he awakened and were on tip toe of expectancy. Dr. Baker called at his patient's residence at ten minutes past 9 o'clock and found his patient yet resting peacefully. The Dr. felt his patient's pulse and said it was more regular than it had been for several days. Just then Conkling awoke and cordially shook hands with his physicians, who at once asked him if he would not take some soothing medicine. The sufferer promptly replied in the affirmative and as promptly took the medicine offered him. Subsequently Dr. Baker in the form of an official bulletin announced to the members of the press that Mr. Conkling was beginning to recover. Marked change for the better he added, has taken place during the night.
