Last year St. Paul built 4,000 new buildings, worth altogether \$12,000,000, and Minneapolis built a like number. St. Paul has now 170,000 people and Minneapolis even more.

A celebration is now being held at Marietta, Ohio, to commemorate the one-hundredth anniversary of the first settlement of the territory north-west of the Ohio river, from which were carved the states of Ohio, Illinois, Indiana, Michigan and Wisconsin.

The constitutional amendment just passed by Rhode Island adds some 5,000 new voters to the registry and from the date of its passage grants the franchise to every alien who has resided six months in the state and does away with all property restrictions.

The favorite dress of the United States senator is a black broadcloth double breasted frock coat, high-standing collar open at the neck, and boots. Business suits are, however, fast creeping in, and now about one-third of the senators wear cut-away coats.

A GEORGIA negro, having hurt his leg, treated the wound with mud from the Ocala swamp, and found when he removed the bandage that the wound was healed and that the leg had turned almost white. The result is that the negroes of the vicinity are flocking to the swamp and covering themselves with the mud, hoping that it will turn them white.

SALEM NOTES.

SALEM, Or., April 11.—The state military board adjourned to-day. During the session allowances to different companies of the national guard were made. Those to the First regiment aggregating \$717.40; Second regiment, \$826.30; Third regiment, \$826; Battery A, \$75. Among other things discussed and acted upon was the manner of obtaining discharges from the guard. It was decreed that the absence without leave for thirty days shall constitute sufficient ground for dishonorable discharge.

Messrs. Huntington, Crocker and other railroad magnates passed through at 8:30 this morning, and having examined the present depot building expressed themselves as favoring the construction of better depot facilities for Salem.

Mr. George Mack, deputy county clerk, and Miss Lora Chapman, daughter of county clerk Chapman, were married at the residence of the bride's parents this evening.

Luella Nover, aged 19, wife of a citizen of Clackamas county, was brought up to-day, examined here and committed to the asylum.

Superintendent Downing of the penitentiary has filed his quarterly report with the secretary of state, having assumed control March 10. It is a statement of the administrations, both of himself and Mr. Clow, from January 1st to March 31st. From it, it is learned that expenses, including salaries of officers, provisions, etc., were \$9,674.22; earnings from the Northwestern foundry for contract labor, and the United States for the keep of prisoners, were \$14,491.50; 2-7; collections were \$3,538.81.

A Heavy Blow at the Silver Miners.

WASHINGTON, April 8.—Representative Woodburn of Nevada says that one of the most important objections to the Mills tariff bill seems to have been overlooked, even by the opponents of that measure. It is proposed to reduce the duty on lead from \$20 to \$10 per ton. Woodburn says if this reduction should go into effect it would mean the shutting down of scores of silver mines in Nevada, Colorado and Montana, Idaho, Arizona and Washington territories. The value of lead in low-grade silver ores now pays, under a protective tariff, the cost of mining. If this protection is reduced one-half the mining of these ores will be no longer profitable, and the mines must shut down.

St. John and Miller at Eugene.

EUGENE CITY, Or., April 11.—The Lane county prohibition convention met here to-day, with about fifty delegates present. They put a ticket in the field and organized for the campaign. George Belshaw was nominated for state senator; for representatives, A. J. Zumwalt, W. A. Potter, and Vern Veatch; clerk, T. Rowland; sheriff, A. J. Harlow; assessor, F. J. Danton; commissioners, A. J. Bushnell and Joseph McClean. Miller spoke to an audience of 500 at the courthouse at 2 o'clock, and was followed in a short address by St. John. The ex-governor spoke to-night to an audience of more than 1,200 at O'Brien's hall. He speaks to-morrow night at Albany.
