ITALIAN immigration to New York is outweighing all other just now. It is a veritable flood. The steamer *Cacheemire* on April 10th brought 1,411 Italians in her steerage from the Mediterranean.

SHOULD the great and only E. J. Phelps be appointed chief justice of the supreme court of these United States it is to be hoped that he will at least take out his naturalization papers before taking the oath of office.

It is said that there is a postoffice for every 1,000 men, women and children in the United States, and that if the expense of carrying the mails was paid directly by the people pro rata, each citizen would pay an average of 85 cents a year.

Most of the depositors in the largest savings institution in Philadelphia are women, and an authority in such matters asserts that by far the greatest share of all the invested capital in Philadelphia held in trust belongs to women.

THE death of Jesse Applegate removes one of the most striking figures in the history of our state. Coming here in the emigration of '43 with Nesmith, Burnett, Baker, Embree, and others, he left his impress on the infant commonwealth and will live in Oregon's pioneer history as one of the men who, in their day and generation, nobly wrought and built up an American state in this remote corner of the national domain.

No loyal American differs with senator Ingalls when he says, "It is a shame and disgrace and humiliation that any man who bared his breast in battle, and has risked his life and shed his blood, that our flag might not be dragged down and defiled by traitors, should ever become an inmate of an almshouse or dependent on public charity for support." Nearly \$900,000 paid out in pensions since 1861 testifies to the nation's gratitude to those who shed their blood for the preservation of the Union. There is no disposition to stint the recognition of the nation's debt to its brave defenders. But twenty-three years after the close of the war, is it not time that an appeal for increased pensions should rest on some conception of patriotism higher than the invocation of the passions of fraternal strife? There was more of true patriotism in a single syllable of the message of Appomattox, than in all the ante-bellum truncheon of a wilderness of senators who never bared their breasts, or shed a drop of blood for their country's flag.

THE Sage of Greystone never made a wiser remark than when he said that the opposition party in this country must be supported by at least two-thirds of the voters to be sure of success. He did not underestimate the value of power and patronage as a political leverage. He knew that the occupancy of the government by the Republicans gave them advantage over the Democrats, and to disclose then would require something more than a small majority of the popular vote. For, in the first place, the patronage of the government judiciously distributed planted active, energetic and influential political missionaries everywhere in the country; these were the organizers of the party legions, so that the party became an army; these had friends and relatives whose votes they could influence through personal considerations; and this splendid organization furnished money and worked all the year round for its cause. When it had control of the local-election machinery it had a still greater reason with which to defeat the opposition, while the latter had all these odds to contend against. Patronage, money, power, as well as conviction, were on the side of the party in power, and the strength of all these Mr. Tilden knew the full value of. Such was the advantage of the Republican party in 1884. The Republicans made full use of all the advantages in their favor then, and the Democrats will make equally good use of those same advantages now in their own behalf. For in the matter of retaining power both organizations can be equally depended upon to maintain their ascendancy, even at the risk of a moderate sacrifice of conscience.

These men will begin work at once.

In addition to the printed matter already provided for, the board have in view the publication of a complete pamphlet setting forth in detail the resources of the state at large, which pamphlets will be placed before the general public through the medium of the systematic plan of distribution at our command. The amount thus far subscribed will not enable us to compile, print and circulate as full a descriptive pamphlet of the state at large as might be desired; but by every county in the state contributing, say in the aggregate the sum of \$20,000, we would be enabled to fully advertise every section of our commonwealth fully and fairly.

Thinking that the citizens of your locality will be interested in this work, and perhaps willing to assist financially in its accomplishment, we take the liberty of addressing you and asking you personally to bring the matter before your fellow citizens with a view of their co-operation. We can spend to advantage ten times the present fund at our disposal, and therefore respectfully ask you to urge upon your fellow citizens the advisability of a liberal contribution. You will at once perceive the very great advantage to be secured by concentration of effort with us, securing, as you will thereby, not only the benefit of your own money, but of the funds already in our hands to be expended, and all other money which may be placed with us. Your community may forward its subscription either in monthly installments, or in one sum as you may deem most expedient.
