A Land Decision Modified.

WASHINGTON, May 14.—Secretary Vilas has modified the decision of the commissioner of the general land officers in rejecting the section of the Northern Pacific railroad company for lots 3, 4 and five and one half of a section of land in section 7 township 9 north, range 4 west, Vancouver, W. T., and allowing Andy P. Anderson to purchase this land under the act of January 31, 1885. This land is within the limit of the grant to the Oregon Central railroad company, by act of May 4, 1870, and within the limits of the grant made to the Northern Pacific railroad company by the joint resolution of May 31, 1870.

The Northern Pacific company appeals from the decision of the commissioner, arguing that the grant to the Oregon Central had not embraced lands outside the state of Oregon, and that this tract being in Washington territory was not included in that grant. The question had been previously considered, and it was held that the grant to the Oregon Central did extend into Washington territory. The secretary holds that the Northern Pacific has no legal claim to this land, as at the date of the grant to the Northern Pacific Co., and of its definite location, the land was embraced in the grant to the Oregon Central road, and therefore excepted from the grant to that company. By act of January 31, 1885, granted lands along the uncompleted portions of the Oregon Central road were declared forfeited to the United States and restored to the public domain. Andy R. Anderson applied at the local land office, but as the record does not satisfactorily disclose the nature of claimant's alleged settlement, the secretary has directed that he be given sixty days in which to furnish evidence as will show his compliance with the law, and that the purchase be held in abeyance until such evidence is produced.

A Portland Opinion.

THE ASTORIAN is urging upon the people of Clatsop county the building of a railroad to Clatsop beach. No better suggestion than this could be made. Such a road would be a paying investment from the start. Clatsop beach, as a summer resort, possesses attractions better than any other locality on either the Oregon or Washington coast, but the long ride of thirteen miles over dry, hot sand, which rises in clouds and fills the eyes, ears, nose and mouth has kept the number who have chosen this resort a very limited one. With a railroad to Clatsop beach, three or four new hotels would be needed, while the farmers of Clatsop plains would have to increase the number of their cows and chickens, in order to be able to supply the increased demand for fresh milk, butter and eggs. Of course the road would pay during the summer; why not, also, in winter? The farmers of the plains would get rich during the summer, and in the winter would make frequent trips to Astoria and buy the little comforts of life which they now look upon too much as luxuries. Astoria is growing rapidly, and will furnish a continually increasing market for the Clatsop plains farmers' products. The railroad would make the farmer a suburban citizen, afford the merchant a chance to escape from business cares without losing too much time, and be a means of mutual benefit to both classes in every way.—Oregonian, 15.
