FOR GENERAL INFORMATION. The Necessary Qualifications for Voters. THE ASTORIAN is now receiving an average of one letter a day asking about the qualifications requisite for voters at the coming election.

Below is given what is believed to cover the question asked. Any native male citizen of twenty-one years and upwards, who has resided in the state six months preceding the election, and any foreign male citizen or who has declared his intention to become a citizen and who has the above qualification in regard to residence, shall be allowed to vote at all elections authorized by law.

No idiot or insane person shall be entitled to vote, nor any man who has been convicted of any crime punishable by imprisonment in the penitentiary unless pardoned by the governor.

An elector does not forfeit his residence by reason of absence while employed by the United States or this state, nor while engaged in navigating the waters of this state, or the high seas; nor while a student at any seminary of learning; nor while kept in any almshouse or any asylum at public expense; nor while confined in any public prison.

Every person shall be disqualified from being elected during the term for which he is elected, who shall have given or offered a bribe, threat, or reward to procure his election.

All qualified voters may vote in any precinct in the county for county officers, or in any county in the state for state officers.

When an elector is a bona fide resident of the county but has no fixed residence in any particular precinct, he may vote in any precinct, in which he may find himself on election day.

If a voter is challenged, after being sworn he must answer the following questions: If challenged on the ground that he is not a citizen the chairman of the board shall ask:

1. Are you a citizen of the United States?

2. Are you a native or naturalized citizen, and if neither, have you declared your intention to become a citizen conformably to the laws of the United States on the subject of naturalization; if so, when and where?

If challenged on the ground of residence, the chairman shall ask:

1. Have you resided in the state six months immediately preceding this approaching election?

2. Have you been absent from this state within the six months immediately preceding this election?

3. If so, when you left was it for a temporary purpose, with the design and intent of returning, or did you intend to remain away?

4. Did you, while absent, look upon, and regard this state as your home?

5. Did you, while absent, vote in any other state or territory?

If challenged on the ground that he is not a resident of the county the chairman shall ask:

1. When did you come to this county and precinct?

2. When you came to this county, was it for a temporary purpose merely, or for the purpose of making it your home?

3. How long have you been a resident of this county and precinct?

An elector must have been a resident of the state six months, and of the county ninety days immediately preceding the election before he will be entitled to cast a vote.

Let every voter in the county be sure he can answer the above questions before he offers his vote.
