It is claimed that the new twin-screw steamship of the Guion line now building, will reach Queenstown from New York in five days.

It is reported that the first of Dakota tin was put through the new smelting process at Rapid City successfully, and plans for the erection of large works for treating tin are in course of execution.

This trail was 600 miles long and one mile wide, and when the original survey of Colorado was made this strip was left for the use of the cattlemen. 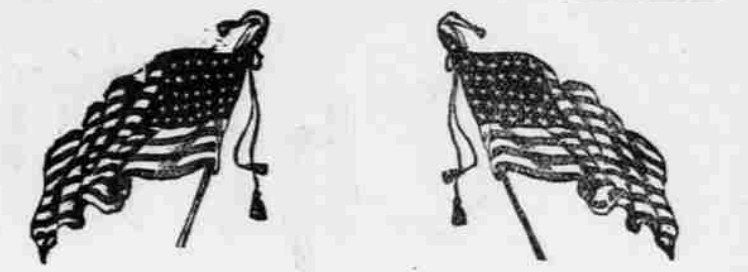
