The next presidential election will take place on Tuesday, November 6, 1888.

MAYOR HEWITT is to run as an independent American-flag candidate for mayor of New York this fall.

ALABAMA heads the column and will first announce her vote in the Democratic national convention. It will be twenty for Cleveland.

"SOMETHING must be done to clean out the Standard oil trust!" exclaims an indignant exchange. Let it swallow the canister oil trust.

THE Republican party will this year enter upon the thirty-fifth year of its existence as a distinct political organization. In July it will be thirty-four years of age.

THE telegraph pole on which St. John's effigy was hanged and burned at Topeka, has been sold for \$200 to eastern prohibitionists, who will use it in the national campaign.

THE hall of the St. Louis exposition building, where the Democratic national convention is to be held, will have a seating capacity of 13,000. It will be illuminated by 1,400 electric lights.

THE New York World says: "The fact that the equal rights party enters the presidential campaign on a platform favoring free whisky and sugar, proves that the great American cock-tail is by no means friendless."

A SYNDICATE of Canadian and American capitalists, representing over \$100,000,000, has been formed to construct a railway tunnel under the river at Detroit, connecting Michigan with Canada. Practical civil engineers pronounce the project entirely feasible.

THE population of Canada is now only about four million five hundred, or more than a million less than the population of the single state of New York; and yet its annual expenditures are \$14,000,000 more than the expenditures of the United States in 1845, when the population of the union was 20,000,000, and we had an army and a navy to maintain and considerable pensions to pay.

A CAPITAL story is told of the late emperor William. While visiting some years ago, a distant part of his realm, he was welcomed by the school children of one of the villages. Taking an orange from a plate, he began to catechise the little ones. "To what kingdom does this belong?" "To the vegetable kingdom, sire," was the ready answer. Taking a coin from his pocket, he said: "To what kingdom does this belong?" "To the mineral kingdom, sire." Addressing himself to a bright little girl, he asked, "To what kingdom do I belong?" The child did not like to say "the animal kingdom," but a bright thought striking her, she said, "To God's kingdom, sire." The emperor, deeply moved, put his hand on the child's head, and said devoutly, "God grant that I may be called worthy of that kingdom."

IN Germany, so long ago as the 14th of May, 1882, Bismarck, in a speech before the German Reichstag, paid to the Republican tariff these compliments: The "success of the United States in material development is the most illustrious of modern times. The American nation has not only successfully borne and suppressed the most gigantic and expensive war of all history, but immediately afterward disbanded its army, found employment for all its soldiers and marines, paid off most of its debt, given labor and homes to the unemployed of Europe as fast as they could arrive within its territory, and still by a system of taxation so indirect as not to be perceived, much less felt. Because it is my deliberate judgment that the prosperity of America is mainly due to its system of protective laws, I urge that Germany has now reached that point where it is necessary to imitate the tariff system of the United States."

The Surveyor General's Salary.

WASHINGTON, May 30.—Congressman Hermann, of Oregon, had a fight with Randall in the house yesterday, during the consideration of the legislative appropriation bill, in which the latter came out second best. The row came up when Randall offered an amendment cutting down the salary of the surveyor-general of Oregon from \$2500 to \$1800. Hermann raised a point of order against it, and after a sharp fight between the gentlemen the chair was appealed to and sustained Hermann.

The latter then moved that the salary be fixed at \$2500, on which he called for the yeas and noes. All the Republicans, and the California delegates, voted with him, but the rest of the democrats voted solidly, and the amendment was defeated.

Randall then moved that the salary be put down to \$1700, and Hermann beat him on a point of order. The democratic leader said if he did not take that he would get nothing, and Hermann said that if that was the way the appropriations committee regarded an office where such a volume of work was performed, when the salary of the Florida surveyor-general was cut down but \$200, they would do without salary altogether and let the office be run by clerks.

Mr. Randall said that suited him, and the bill now fails to provide anything to pay the surveyor-general. Congressman Hermann said tonight he would fix the matter in the senate, when the bill reached there, and the salary would not be less than \$2500, either.
