WHO WILL IT BE?

McKinley of Ohio As a Dark Horse.

To-Day Will Doubtless Decide The Matter.

(SPECIAL TO THE ASTORIAN.)
CHICAGO, June 22.—The Chicago convention has now reached that stage in which all interest in its proceedings culminates. The decks have been cleared for action and the battle royal is about to begin. What the first ballot will disclose is already known; the all absorbing curiosity is to know what the fourth or fifth ballots will show. The air of the convention hall is full of rumors, theories and blind guesses. Sherman loomed up last night because of a great demonstration which the presence of the Ohio senator provoked. There was a feeling that Sherman would win to-day or not at all. Rumors are afloat of danger of defection in Pennsylvania from Sherman to Harrison, but there are so many stories of all sorts that nobody seems sure of the ground he stands on and everybody is prepared for the unexpected.

MCKINLEY OF OHIO.
CHICAGO, June 22.—Attention is called to the fact that major McKinley of Ohio in having secured eight votes on the third ballot stands in precisely the same position as that occupied by Garfield in 1880; as an earnest follower of Blaine and the man best qualified after Blaine to make a strong protective campaign he is occupying much more attention than the size of his vote warrants, and should California now swing for him it would be very significant as showing the direction in which Blaine's friends are tending, and it is believed it might result in his nomination.

CHICAGO PRESS OPINION.
CHICAGO, June 22.—The Tribune says there is a scheme on foot among Blaine's friends to nominate him after giving Harrison a chance as a feint to beat Sherman. It says that New York may turn to Gresham if Depew is not taken up by other states.

The News says Michigan, Ohio and Indiana are having formed a combination to prevent a stampede for Blaine. The Inter-Ocean says New York is receding from Sherman and Gresham and Harrison stock is advancing. The Times says the contest is narrowing down to Blaine, Sherman and Harrison.

RIVER AND BAR CHARGES.

PORTLAND, Or., June 21, 1888.
To the Editor of The Oregonian:
Seeing the announcement in this morning's edition that the Oregon Railway & Navigation company has fixed a schedule of rates for towage on river and bar which is pronounced to be "eminently satisfactory to the resident managers of the largest shipping houses," I would nevertheless like to ask if this is in consonance with the pledge of the railroad owners made to the visiting committee in New York, who reported to the board of trade that the promise was readily given that rates would be established which would put shipments ex the Columbia river on a par with those from Puget sound.

If the schedule proposed is deemed one to meet that exigency it will doubtless be approved by the "resident managers" much more heartily than it will by resident property owners of this city.

It is in fact and effect, a tax on shipments ex the Columbia river of at least \$1 per ton over and above similar shipments from Puget sound, and handicaps Portland to that extent in the rivalry that is to ensue for the grain shipments of eastern Oregon and Washington territory.

Schooled by affliction, any one controlling the O. R. & N. Co.'s line will eventually understand it to be a cardinal proposition that grain freights to the ocean must at least be as cheap as that by any other line to obtain business.

So far as the schedule of towage is concerned, it is much lighter than the rates in vogue when the Portland tug company and Capt. Flavel fixed terms several years ago, and I feel confident if a monopoly of the business such as the O. R. & N. Co. are laboring to create would be offered Mr. Kamm he would gladly obligate himself to do bar and river towage at a quarter reduction from the list of the O. R. & N. Co.

Interested in Portland's welfare as I am, I do not feel at ease to read the sugar-coated apology for the list even if coupled with sanction from the resident managers of the principal shipping houses, who mostly have put little concern for our commercial interests, as it makes no difference to them whether shipments are made from here or Puget sound.

THE PORTLAND TOURNAMENT.

Wet Test Won By Walla Walla's Team.

"Championship" By East Portland's Team.

(SPECIAL TO THE ASTORIAN.)
PORTLAND, June 22.—The firemen's tournament has attracted great attention and drawn an immense crowd. The first race to-day was a wet test, distance 700 feet, in all; 500 feet to hydrant, lay 200 feet of hose uncouple and screw on pipe. Time taken when water leaves hose.

The first team run was the East Portland team; at 11 o'clock they were in readiness and a few moments later made the run; Time 42 1-6 seconds.

The Portland team followed about half an hour later and as they came down the racks were greeted with shouts. When their time announced everybody concluded they were victorious; time 37 11-12 seconds. The Albany team, however, soon dispelled the illusion and came down the track at a rattling pace. When within about twenty feet of the goal one of the men fell and was severely bruised. This interfered materially with their time but they succeeded in lowering the time previously announced, making the distance in 37 1/2 seconds.

"Our Boys" hose team of Walla Walla were the next runners, and the way they came tearing down the street evoked much enthusiasm. They came like arrows and never made a slip, getting water in 36 14-15 seconds and winning the race.

The Lebanon team after a long and tedious delay, got started about 1:30 P. M. They were slow in getting water and then the time was announced at 40 seconds.

The Vancouver team made splendid time in running, but failed to get the nozzle on the base before the water came. No time allowed them, but the distance was covered and water obtained in 35 1/2 seconds.

AS USUAL.
The 100-yard foot race was next run, but the contestants got a bad start and there was much dissatisfaction. The judges finally declared the race off. It will be run over to-morrow.

THE CHAMPIONSHIP.
The championship test race this afternoon was won by the East Portland team; time, one minute, 16-2-15 seconds.
