It was supposed by some that the doctor had reference to Jay Gould in his declarations. Dr. Paxton explains, however, that the sermon was general in its nature, and its doctrine was that a rich man could get into heaven as easily as a poor man if he used his riches properly.

The vice-presidency is, according to most politicians, the most inconsequential office in our government. Yet four men elected vice-president have been made presidents through the death of the executives with whom they were chosen. Daniel Webster, although always desiring the presidency, twice missed it through his unwillingness to take the lower office. Thurlow Weed urged Webster to take the nomination under Harrison, and again when Taylor was nominated, but he refused, beneath his dignity. Then, in each case as when the vice-president was promoted by the death of the superior officer, Webster went into the cabinet as secretary of state, feeling, probably, that but for his pride he might have been himself selecting the cabinet instead of being a part of it.

At a Parnell banquet in London on the 6th inst., Sir Thomas Henry Grattan Esmond, just returned from America, presented to the home-rule treasurer a check for \$10,000 subscribed by citizens of New York. It was a very handsome and no doubt very welcome gift. Could the total of American subscriptions to the Parnell fund be learned they would, we think, be astonished at the sum of patriotic devotion thereby manifested; and it would perhaps be remembered that the greater portion of the vast amount had come from the pockets of men and women who had worked hard for it and who in giving it exercised the greatest self-denial. Parnell, his fellow parliamentarians and his numerous agents and lieutenants ought to be very prudent in their expenditure of the subscriptions poured in upon them, for it is not the money of millionaires they are spending, but a percentage from the weekly wages of cooks, housemaids, laborers, mechanics and underpaid and over-worked clerks and salesgirls.

The bill creating a national department of labor has become a law. The head of the department will be known as the commissioner of labor, and his salary will be \$5,000 a year. He is to hold office for four years. The duties of the commissioner are to acquire and disseminate among the people of the United States information connected with labor in the most general and comprehensive sense of the word, and especially in relation to capital, the hours of labor, earnings of working men and women, and the means of promoting their material, social, intellectual, and moral prosperity. It is especially charged to ascertain, whenever industrial changes shall make it essential, the cost of producing articles at the time dutiable in the United States in leading countries where such articles are produced, under a classification showing the different elements of cost of such articles of production; to establish a system of reports by which, at intervals of not less than two years, he can tell the general condition, so far as production is concerned, of the leading industries of the country. He is also to investigate all controversies and disputes between employers and employees which may tend to interfere with the welfare of the people, and report thereon to congress. The law virtually expands the present bureau of labor statistics, which is a branch of the interior department, into a division of the government.
