WOMEN have the municipal suffrage in Finland—that is unmarried women and widows—since 1879.

RECENTLY a disgraced Oshkosh, Wis., jurymen offered to pay the sum in dispute if the claimant would dismiss the case. The offer was refused.

MR. NILES of Boston told the Christian Endeavor convention that 80,000 human souls go from the United States to perdition every year. Mr. Niles calls for home missionaries.

THE southwestern "Deep-water" convention met at Fort Worth, Texas, on the 10th inst. Deep water on the Texas coast means trade with all the world and commercial greatness for the southwest. Good harbors will make Texas a greater New York. This is the spirit of Texas just now.

WILLIAM BLAINE, the noted athlete, is an active soldier in the white cross army, which enjoins upon its members the duty of treating all women with respect and protecting them from wrong; to frown down indecent jests or language, and to endeavor to spread white cross army principles among companions and younger brothers.

IT is a pleasure to chronicle the fact that about the newest enterprise in the city is paying handsome dividends—we refer to the Astoria street railway company. It gives the town a metropolitan appearance, and is paying good interest on the investment. The only ones that this last fact may displease are those who stood by and prophesied failure, and who have missed one chance of being able to chuckle "I thought so."

THE stupendous plan for supplying the city of Liverpool with water involves the removal of a whole Welch village, including woods, cottages, churches, etc., this immense space to be devoted to a reservoir four and one-half miles long by half a mile to a mile broad, and eighty feet deep. There are to be three lines of pipe, each sixty-eight miles long, with filtering beds and secondary reservoirs, and the cost of the aqueduct alone is estimated at \$15,000,000.

EDMUND STEVENSON, president of the New York state board of emigration, has been out west looking into the condition of emigrants who have gone out to the prairie lands; and observation has convinced him that the country can find room for all the agriculturists that may come for the next fifty years. At the Duluth coal and ore docks men receive 50 cents per hour, or \$5 per day, while farm hands in Dakota get \$2 a day and board, and farmers complaining that they cannot get help enough to get in the wheat harvest.

EIGHT years ago a large part of the nickel used in this country was made at Phoenixville, Pa., by Joseph Wharton. The duty at that time was \$2 a pound, and Mr. Wharton could produce it at \$3 a pound, and sell it for \$4 a pound. Nickel was put on the free list, and as Germany could manufacture it at \$2 a pound, Mr. Wharton had to shut down. Nickel immediately took a rise to \$4 a pound, the price it had been before the duty was taken off, and as it continued firm at that figure, Mr. Wharton again commenced manufacturing. Nickel at once dropped down to a price he could not reach, and again he had to close down. This little game of see-saw would have continued indefinitely, probably, if Mr. Wharton had continued to take a hand in the game, but as his hand was bound to be a losing one, he gracefully withdrew. What are the results? Nickel costs as much as it did before the duty was taken off, Mr. Wharton's works are closed, and his 500 workmen forced to seek other employment, the town of Phoenixville no longer flourishes, and all to support a foreign industry that makes an enormous profit out of the metal they sell us, because we are such simpletons as to give them an opportunity.

A CHILD enjoys himself more heartily, when he does enjoy himself, than an older person does. That everybody admits. A child suffers at heart more keenly, when he does suffer at heart, than does an older person. That is not recognized by everybody. A child's power of enjoyment is made a proverb. A child's power of mental suffering is hardly thought of by the world generally. Now and then the deliberate suicide of a child because of some little disappointment to which an adult would hardly have given a second thought, startles the community and is spoken of as a very remarkable occurrence. Yet, as a matter of fact and as a matter of course, a child's intense sensitiveness gives it the same added power of suffering as of enjoyment,

and the little ones about us have a harder time of it in the days of their childhood than we know anything about—save as we remember our childhood, and retain more or less of its freshness in our maturer years. We say that "we take things more philosophically as we grow older," which is only another way of saying that we grow tougher-hearted. But even if this be the case with ourselves, let us remember that the little ones who lack our measure of philosophy deserve, therefore, a larger share of our sympathy. It is good to have the lightheartedness of a child. It is hard to have the heart-racking sorrows of a child.

What's the Matter with Yakima?

The Yakima Signal says: It is reported that some of our local magistrates, who are well loaded with town lots, have withdrawn their lots from the market and in granted that a man has a right to do with his own as he will; but there is also the other rule that you must not use your property in such a way as to injure your neighbor. We assert that the existence of a large number of barren lots in the very heart of our city is injurious to the prosperity of the municipality. The appearance of these large barren tracts in the center of the city is appalling to the stranger first coming within our gates, and always causes hesitation and inquiry; and when this inquiry further develops the fact that these unimproved barrens are held at rates so high as to discount the future, and within the means of only the most wealthy speculators, it really seems as if our local nabobs, instead of encouraging development, were seeking to discourage and drive away outside capital. We know of many investors who have been scared away by this short-sighted policy. A word to the wise is sufficient, and we hope that this subject will be considered in a proper manner.

LAST NIGHT'S DISPATCHES.

General News Notes From Europe and The East.

(SPECIAL TO THE ASTORIAN.)

St. Petersburg, July 24.—The czar and czarina took breakfast this morning with emperor William on board the yacht. When the czar and his companion had departed, the yacht with the emperor William on board started for Stockholm.

THE SARATOGA RACES. SARATOGA, July 24.—The first race, 5 furlongs Yum Yum won, Egmont, second, Estrella third time 2:04 1/2. In the second race one mile and one furlong Oarsman won, Cruiser second, Bohemian third; time, 1:57.

A BIG FIRE. CINCINNATI, July 24.—Krippendorf, Dittman & Co.'s factory burned this morning. Loss \$310,000; insurance \$164,000. Nearly 600 employees are thrown out of work. The origin of the fire is a mystery.

A RACE WAR. St. Louis, July 24.—A very brief special to the Post Dispatch says that one of the negro county officials of Crittenden county, Ark., was hanged by a mob at Morton last night; that a race war has broken out afresh and a terrible state of affairs prevails.

OBJECTS TO DETECTIVES. QUEENSTOWN, July 24.—Chief clerk O'Connell of the New York court common pleas, has lodged complaint with the authorities against detectives, and asks to be relieved from his unwarranted surveillance. He alleges that since his arrival he has visited several religious and charitable institutions in Cork, and everywhere he has gone detectives have shadowed him.

REPORTED FAVORABLY. WASHINGTON, July 24.—Representative Hermann of Oregon, from the committee on public lands reported favorably to the house to-day the senate bill providing that the alien land act shall not affect title to mineral or mining claims in the territories which may be acquired or held under mineral laws of the United States; or any mills or other improvements thereon.

HIS LOSS MADE GOOD. New York, July 24.—A subscription fund started a week ago by mayor Hewitt to reimburse O. M. Hart, who suffered a loss of \$25,000 by boycott against him instituted by the K. of L., was completed to-day, the full amount being subscribed.

A QUICK TRIP. New York, July 24.—The American ship Henry B. Hyde, which arrived here from San Francisco to-day made the trip in 88 days. This is the second best eastward passage on record from the Golden Gate.
