NEWS BY WIRE.

A Dynamite Fiend—Murder And Suicide—A War of Rates.

(SPECIAL TO THE ASTORIAN.) ITHACA, N. Y., July 25.—Ben Dutton a farm hand, went to the house of John Lamont three miles from East Bryden last night, and attempted to kill Lamont and Miss Root a young woman employed in Lamont's family. Dutton fired one bullet at Lamont which took effect in his face, and four at the girl, all of which took effect. Her most serious injury is a wound in the back of the head and her recovery is considered doubtful. After shooting, Dutton escaped to the woods pursued by the deputy sheriff who hunted for him all night and this morning his dead body was found with a bullet hole through his heart. A paper was also found at the dead man's feet marked "strychnine." Dutton had been paying attention to the girl but Lamont considered him unworthy of her and at his advice she rejected his suit. Dutton swore to get even with Lamont for interfering and it was in fulfillment of this oath that the crime was committed.

ANOTHER ANARCHIST CAUGHT. CHICAGO, July 25.—The drag net of justice caught to-day another of the anarchists, who sought revenge upon the representatives of law in the persons of inspector Bonfield and judges Gary, and Grinnel. A gunsmith named Rudolph Sebic, was arrested before daylight this morning and is now behind prison bars in default of bonds to the amount of seven thousand dollars. He is charged with being the individual who furnished dynamite to the conspirators who attempted to assassinate the three law officers most prominent in the Haymarket prosecution. Sebic acknowledged he has been illegally dealing in dynamite and has sold over fifty pounds of the explosive to various persons within a year.

A COMMITTEE OF INQUIRY. NEW YORK, July 25.—To-day the congressional committee appointed to look into the affairs of the country at large, began its work. The first session of the committee opened at Westminster hotel this morning. Chairman Ford of Michigan, congressmen Morrow of California, and Gunther of Wisconsin, were the only members of the committee present, but Gen. Spinola and congressman Oates are expected to arrive tomorrow.

A SLIM ATTENDANCE. NEW YORK, July 25.—The commissioners of emigration were none of them present at the opening inquiry, nor was anyone else here to represent Castle Garden.

A WAR OF RATES. NEW YORK, July 25.—Yesterday was probably the most disastrous day of the season in the war of freight. The rates of \$1.20 and 72 cents per one hundred pounds on drygoods and cotton piece goods respectively from New York to Missouri river points via rail, has created a great deal of comment. What is perhaps even more decided evidence of prolongation in the rate war is the fact that yesterday tariff rates to Salt Lake and all other common Utah points were declared by all roads.

A SHOCKING SUICIDE. LOS ANGELES, July 25.—Charles Jansen, formerly sheriff of Sacramento county, committed suicide at his home early this morning, in the most shocking manner; he used a double barreled shot gun, and tied a handkerchief from the toe of the right foot to the trigger; both barrels were discharged at once blowing one side of his face, and half his head off, and spattering his brains against the ceiling of the room, making a most sickening sight. It is supposed that despondency from drink and lameness were the cause of it.
