NEITHER president Cleveland nor Gen. Harrison seem to be in any hurry about writing their letters of acceptance.

Iowa people are going to give T. J. Potter a bronze monument. Oregon gave him a memento in the shape of a Columbia river steamer.

At a mass meeting of citizens in San Francisco recently a memorial was drawn for presentation to congress, setting forth that 9,000 Chinese have been landed on writs of habeas corpus since 1884, and that the violation of the law has been accomplished through the agency of federal courts. The memorial further charges that there are now 4,000 Chinese in San Francisco without certificates, who have been landed on writs of habeas corpus, and who are now out on bail. In conclusion the memorial demands the impeachment and removal of Lorenzo Sawyer, judge of the United States circuit court of the ninth circuit, and George M. Sabin, district judge of the district of Nevada.

The Popular Science Monthly describes a curious and ingenious device called "The Echo-Maker," to be used on ships at sea. A flaring funnel is screwed to the muzzle of a rifle. When a supposed obstacle is near the vessel the rifle is fired in its direction, and if the obstacle is there the beam of sound projected through the funnel strikes the obstacle and rebounds, and as the echo is more or less perfect in proportion as the obstacle is more or less parallel to the ship from which the gun is fired, and as it is near or remote, the position of the obstacle may be inferred. The inventor claims that a sharp sound projected at or nearly at an object, and only when so directed, will in every case return some of the sound sent, so that, theoretically, there will always be an echo, and the difference in the time between the sound sent and the echo will indicate the remoteness of the object. The naval board tried the echo-maker and found that a return sound could be heard from the side of a fort half a mile away; from passing steamers a quarter of a mile off if broadside to; from bluffs and sails of vessels at about the same distance, and from spar-buoys 200 yards away.

CROSSING THE CONTINENT.

An Old Man's Progress in a Long Walk On a Big Wager.

St. JOSEPH Mo., July 7.—Last night a man 79 years of age, Charles D. Carpenter by name, arrived in St. Joseph. He is engaged in walking from Astoria, Oregon, to Portland, Me., on a wager, and is confident of winning. He was for fifty-one years a sailor, and during the late war served in the army and navy. In spite of all the hardships he has encountered he is as strong, and spry as a man of 40. His usual weight is 180 pounds, but his long walk has reduced it to 140 pounds. He never eats cooked meats of any kind, but subsists entirely on raw beef, ham and cooked vegetables. Last winter he left New York on a steamer bound for Astoria, Oregon, and went around Cape Horn. In Astoria he one day made a short walk for a bet and so pleased a number of sporting men by his powers of locomotion that they offered him \$2000 if he would walk against another man from Astoria to Portland, Me. He at once consented. The other man was found in the person of an Irishman named Patrick Martin. The gentlemen who got up the match wagered \$10,000 on the result, and the two left Astoria on the 14th of March. The distance he has traveled so far is 2750 miles. Carpenter has kept posted as to the whereabouts of Martin, and finds that he is 450 miles ahead of him. At every important city he has to make out before a notary as to the distance he has walked. This affidavit is mailed to parties at Astoria. Mr. Carpenter is something of an artist, and has made sketches of the mountain peaks and other scenery along the line of his march. He is very confident of being the winner in this novel race, and will then write a book chronicling some of his adventures, the sale of which together with the \$2000 he expects, will keep him in comfort for the rest of his life. He is a native of Vermont.

FROM THE NATION'S CAPITAL.

The Presidential Party Has Returned.

WASHINGTON, July 31.—The president, postmaster general, and Col. Lamont, arrived in Washington this morning. There was a small crowd of travelers in the station, but the president passed through almost unrecognized, he and Col. Lamont were driven direct to the White house. They are both much sunburned. Col. Lamont said: "The president went on board the *Susquehanna* Thursday night and did not leave her except to fish until last night at 1 o'clock. Stories about his visits to various places on the route are untrue. He did not take a meal off the yacht and there was no one in the party at any time except those who were in it when we left New York."

A CHICAGO SCARE.

CHICAGO, July 31.—The guests at the Palmer House were startled in their sleep this morning, by a terrific clap like thunder accompanied by a very perceptible shock in all parts of the house. Thoughts of dynamite bombs and earthquakes caused nearly all the guests to hurriedly dress and crowd pell mell through the corridors. Meantime a few passers on the streets were kept busy dodging flying splinters of timber. The flagstaff on the northwest corner of the building was found shattered to shivers by lightning.

Ropes were quickly stretched across the sidewalk to keep pedestrians out of possible danger of some huge cornice falling. Investigation showed, however, that the actual damage done by the bolt was very slight, notwithstanding the scare given hundreds of people in the hotel.

A PLEASANT PROSPECT.

CHICAGO, July 31.—Chief Hubbard says that sooner or later, in searching the house of suspected reds for dynamite, he or some of his men will run against a snag. By this he means that some cunning and revengeful anarchist will fix up an old trunk or box so that it will go off without opening and blow the whole searching party into eternity. If this happens it is sure that the contriver of the infernal machine will be killed at the same time, for here after, it is intimated, the police will insist that the suspected man shall do the searching himself under the direction and supervision of the police. No more force will be used than is necessary to accomplish this result, but its use will be considered legitimate in such cases.

INTERNAL REVENUE BUREAU.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 31.—Hon. Joseph S. Miller, commissioner of internal revenue, has made a preliminary report of the operations of the internal revenue bureau for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1888. The total collections for the year were \$124,326,474, as against \$118,896,801 for the previous fiscal year, being an increase of \$5,439,673. The cost of collection for the year was \$3,983,000, exclusive of the amount not increased by items yet to be settled, the percentage of cost of collection will be about 3.2 per cent of the amount collected.

The commissioner says that, under the conditions now existing with regard to pending legislation, etc., it is impossible to make estimate of the probable collections for the current fiscal year. The collections were made up as follows: On spirits, \$69,306,166, an increase of \$3,476,845; on tobacco, \$30,662,431, an increase of \$554,364; on fermented liquors, \$23,324,218, an increase of \$1,402,031; on oleomargarine, \$864,140, an increase of \$140,192; banks and bankers, \$4,203, a decrease of \$86; on miscellaneous, \$165,316, a decrease of \$84,172. The collections were greatest in Illinois, New York, Kentucky and Ohio in the order named, and smallest in New Mexico, Alabama, South Carolina and Arkansas in the order named. There was an increase of 278,220,900 cigarettes and 56,421,207 cigars manufactured during the year.

FROM THE EAST.

Distinguished Deaths—National Railroad Legislation.

LOUISVILLE, July 31.—Dr. Robt. Morris died this morning at his house in La Grange from paralysis aged 70 years. Morris was the post-lantern of masonry and was the most distinguished mason in the world.

ALGER VISITS HARRISON.

INDIANAPOLIS, July 31.—Gen. Alger arrived in Indianapolis to-day. He was met at the depot by a committee from the Harrison club and escorted quietly to the residence of Gen. Harrison. Arrangements were made for the New Castle delegation with three bands and 300 members of local Republican clubs to call on general Alger at Harrison's residence this afternoon.

OBITUARY.

NEW YORK, July 31.—Christopher Meyer, a millionaire died at his residence on Fifth Avenue this afternoon. Deceased was born in Hanover, Germany, in 1818. He came to this country when 15 years old. For many years he had been the foremost man in the rubber fabric business of this country. He was lately brought into additional prominence by connection with the raid of Ives upon the Cincinnati Hamilton & Dayton railroad.

A TRAIN COLLISION.

SACRAMENTO, July 31.—The east bound and west bound freight trains collided at Antelope station at 4 o'clock this morning. Ten cars were badly wrecked and three engines disabled. No one injured. The track was cleared at 10:20.

RAILROAD LEGISLATION.

WASHINGTON, July 31.—In the senate to-day senator Frye of Maine, from the select committee on Pacific railroads, reported the Union Pacific funding bill, providing for the settlement of claims growing out of the issue of bonds to secure payment of all indebtedness. He said the bill is Outhwaite's bill as reported to the house, containing many amendments over the bill as it came from the commission originally. The senate report is signed by all the members of the committee. The bill relates only to the Union Pacific and central branch, having nothing whatever to do with the Central Pacific.

The committee found much greater difficulty in formulating adjustment and settlement with the Central Pacific than with the Union Pacific, and is not prepared at the present time to make any report touching the former company.
