The Daily News, of Portland, don't seem worth a cent. It talks very plainly in Sunday's issue, and wants to know who murdered Mary Schmeider. That is a very plain question and demands an equally plain answer.

The Chicago Herald says that eight years ago a special campaign fund of \$200,000 was contributed by the Republicans to carry Indiana, and that the Democrats raised a like amount, and that the whole of it did not change a vote.

The abolition of slavery in Brazil was accomplished in remarkably short order, and the decree that accomplished it is remarkable also for its brevity. It reads: "Act 1. Slavery in Brazil is abolished. Act 2. The enactments to the contrary are revoked."

The S. F. Alta approvingly quotes an article asserting that the prohibitionists hold the balance of power in this state. Look here Mr. Alta man, you either know, or you don't know. If you don't know, here are the figures of last election, official; Republican, 32,820; Democratic, 25,413; Prohibition, 1,374. The Alta correctly calls for a clean campaign. Lies are dirty. Practice what you preach.

An agreement has been entered into between the Northern Pacific road and the Manitoban government in which railroad building will at once begin in the name of the government, but under the auspices of the road. The agreement stipulates that no pooling arrangements with the Canadian Pacific shall be entered into. The Manitoba legislature is to be called to confirm the agreement.

AGAIN and again THE ASTORIAN directs attention to the great importance, the imperative necessity of building a railroad from this city to Clatsop beach, and for beginning it now. The capital stock can be raised and the work begun at once. Opportunities pass by. This opportunity may not much longer exist. "Sometime," is too indefinite. If this project is not in definite shape in the next thirty days it may be too late.

THE ASTORIAN is in receipt of a copy of the New York Times, with a big blue pencil mark on a big editorial, about the terrible condition and wages of the miners of anthracite coal, and placing all the blame on "the robber tariff." Our mugwump free trade contemporary and its big editorial, with the blue pencil mark, can be disposed of in short order—anthracite coal is on the free list. Our heart bleeds for the miners, but the tariff has no more to do with it than the eclipse of the sun this morning has to do with the price of salmon.

LOOKING at a noble prince struck down in battle, a king once said: "He looks taller in death." In another sense these words forever hold true, for 'tis only after death that we measure men, and a man must die to be praised. It is so much easier to hate or pity or envy a man than it is to admire him, that we often withhold the meed of praise due. Gallant Phil Sheridan, the general of the army, lies dead at Nonquitt today; and not one of the 67,000,000 people of this country will have other than kindly feeling or generous word for him whose soul has passed away. He was the subject of much vilification, but to-day all that is hushed, and from one end of the Union to the other, nothing but tenderness and regret will be heard.

"Call no man happy till he dies," said the ancient sage. 'Tis death, and death alone, that calls out the proper respect and fair treatment always due and rarely given the living. After the man has passed away we strive to make amends for silence or unjust speech by graceful but delayed speech. But
