It is impossible to avoid the belief that only an unjust social condition can have produced the present condition of things in Ireland. Over 3,000,000 acres of land are now lying idle, while nearly 1,000,000 of pauperized inhabitants are annually relieved out of the poor rates.

THE PRESIDENT GOES FISHING.

Republican New York Convention.

Savage Reprisals On The Barbary Coast.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—President Cleveland has gone on a three days' fishing trip in the vicinity of Clifton Forge, Blue Ridge mountains. He has been confined closely to official duties many months and does not expect to be able to get any recreation except as he clears off his desk in advance of congress and takes a day or two at a time, piece meal, as congress lingers and promises to stay until after election.

NEW YORK REPUBLICANS.

SARATOGA, Aug. 28.—The Republican state convention met this afternoon. Gen. Benjamin F. Tracy was elected temporary chairman and addressed the convention at considerable length. Gen. Tracy said not since '64 when the Democracy in national convention solemnly declared, in its platform, that the war for the Union was a failure and demanded that it should be brought to a speedy end, has a more important political issue been presented to the American people than that presented by president Cleveland's free trade message and the Mills bill. The issue of '64 involved the existence of the nation; the issue of '88 involves the continued existence of our manufacturing industries and our commercial prosperity.

After the appointment of the usual committees a recess was taken. The delegations of New York city and Brooklyn have decided to unite in support of Conger for lieutenant governor.

BARBARY COAST VENGEANCE.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—A dispatch from Tangier says the emperor of Morocco has determined to wreak quick and fierce vengeance on the rebels who massacred prince Muley and his 103 followers recently. The troops sent against the insurgents have been given free license to butcher, ravage and burn. Neither children nor aged are spared. Women are being outraged and enslaved. The emperor has penetrated the disaffected districts and it is reported he is surrounded by hostile and insurgent. The European powers are being urged to send ships to Morocco to protect Christians and Jews in the coast towns.

RAILROAD COLLISION.

LIMA, Ohio, Aug. 28.—A collision occurred on the Dayton & Michigan road near here this afternoon, between a freight and special from Ottawa with a military company on the way to Columbus. One or two cars were broken up and two passengers, one engineer and conductor received slight injuries.

THE YELLOW FEVER.

JACKSONVILLE, Aug. 28.—The official yellow fever report for yesterday records ten new cases, nine recoveries and three deaths: O. H. Pollard, Albert Fisher, Burton Mays (colored). Total, 110 cases, 17 deaths and 62 under treatment.

A RUNAWAY CAR.

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 28.—A motor and car on south side electric railway ran away this morning and was completely wrecked. Seven persons were seriously injured; one probably fatally.
