The Doctors and The Dead Emperor.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Sept. 29.—Up to noon forty eight new cases of fever have been reported, and one death.

THE CHIEF NOTIFIED.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—Sec'y Vilas today sent a letter to the principal chief of the Cherokee Indian nation notifying him that any lease or contract for grazing on the Cherokee outlet in the Indian territory will be without authority from the government and subject to cancellation.

FROM PARIS.
PARIS, Sept. 29.—The Boulangier agitation has been resumed.

WHAT MADAM CHARLOTTE THINKS.
POUGHKEEPSIE, Sept. 29.—Referring to the balloon found yesterday near Providence, R. I., with the name "Carl Myers" and the penciled words, "Met our death in the clouds," Madam Charlotte, who made the balloon ascension yesterday, says: "On the 26th inst., Leon A. Dare and Carlotta, wife of Carl Myers, were to have had a balloon race from Syracuse, and yesterday Carlotta was to have made an ascension from Lockport. The name found on the lost balloon is that of manager Carl Myers. I cannot believe Carlotta or Dare are hurt, though they may be. I have not heard anything in relation to the matter, which makes me think it can be neither of them."

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THE GATE OF THIBET.
CALCUTTA, Sept. 29.—Colonel Graham has completed the capture of Jelapla Pass, the gate of Thibet.
After Godley's reconnaissance, the main column of the expedition pushed forward and attacked the Thibetans, who were strongly entrenched in great force in Kuppa Valley, within Jelapla Pass.

MEXICAN IMPROVEMENTS.
CITY OF MEXICO, Sept. 29.—The government has made a contract with Luis Hunter, authorizing his company, the Sonora, Sinaloa and Chihuahua railroad to issue bonds and stock secured by mortgage.

HOSTILITY TO EUROPEANS.
LONDON, Sept. 29.—The natives of Zanzibar are in full revolt against Europeans.
They have stripped many caravans, forbidden all Englishmen entering the country, and are determined to resist further landing of Germans on the sea coast.

A RUSSIAN SUBSIDY.
LONDON, Sept. 29.—Russia has granted an annual subsidy of 1,110,000 rubles to a private firm for a steamship line between Russian ports on the Pacific and Corea, Japan and China.
