The Lurline has been refitted at Portland at an expense of \$8,000.

The First National Bank makes its regular financial showing in another column.

Geese are in the market. Ducks are also offered for sale at seventy cents a pair.

Services at the Methodist church to-morrow as usual. Evening subject, "The Price of Blood."

"Pomo" is a new word. It is already largely in use among commercial men. It means postoffice money order.

Mr. Cook, the manager of the government quarry at Engly's Hole, had his hand crushed by the derrick there last Monday.

At the Congregational church, to-morrow at 11 A. M.; theme, "Thy Kingdom Come." Evening theme, "Sympathy."

There is considerable talk in San Francisco of Leland Stanford withdrawing from the presidency of the Southern Pacific railroad.

Chas. Maygar, of Maygar's Landing, expects to have 4,000,000 feet of logs in the Columbia river at the close of this season's work.

Allen, the painter, is busy on Democratic campaign devices, banners, etc., which is thus far the only sign of political life in this section.

The Wallula Inland Empire has suspended publication. One of the printers wanted his money and got mad and closed the paper out.

The individual with the dark and roguish eye who stole three suits of clothes from Flynn's tailor shop last Thursday night, is still at large.

Last week S. N. Seerist purchased 269,000 feet logs on the Lokohomam, in Waukegan county, to be made into lumber at the Vancouver mills.

The county court met yesterday, and adjourned to next Saturday, when the bids for county printing, etc., will be passed upon definitely.

Capt. Tibbets of the *Sadie F. Carter*, sends THE ASTORIAN word that he is off to Central America with a cargo of lumber and will return with a load of niter.

The legislature meets January 12th. It may not be wholly out of place to suggest that it is the members of the legislature who will elect a United States senator.

The Oregon Presbyterian synod in session at Salem has formally released Dr. E. W. Garner, LL.D., from the pastorate of the Presbyterian church of this city.

The State of California arrived in from San Francisco yesterday morning with freight and passengers. The Oregon sails to-day. The *Williamette*, coal laden, is outside.

The British ship *Rohilla*, Captain Hinks, which sailed from Astoria June 5th last for Havre, arrived off Pwllbes Point, England, on the 6th inst., and reported the captain dead.

Frank Surprenant has been appointed a trustee of the Northwestern funeral directors association. They will raise rates January 1st. If you want cheap burial now is the time to croak.

Collector Hobson is in official receipt of the Chinese exclusion act. It is iron clad, and if enforced will keep Chinamen out, and those who are here, should they leave, cannot come back.

Geo. Ward, well known in Astoria, till recently editor *Tacoma News*, has quit and is going to start a morning paper in opposition to the *Ledger*. George has bit off a very large mouthful.

A. L. Frazier, appointed in Portland administrator of the estate of Mary Schneller, deceased, says he will sue Mrs. Dr. Murray for \$5,000 damages. The dead girl's parents and sister have assigned their rights to him.

The latest thing in barometers has three little landscapes representing a stormy, a fair and a variable sky. The rise or fall of the mercury causes

a thin mica plate to cover or reveal these pictures, in accordance with the indications.

During the first twenty-five days of September the Northern Pacific carried 2,080 second class passengers to Spokane Falls and points west of there, against 865 during the same time last year, an increase of 1,215, or 140 per cent.

In betting on which way "the northern states" are going at the November election, bear in mind that "the northern states" are Oregon, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, Ohio, New York, Vermont, New Hampshire and Maine, inclusive.

The Portland *News* says: It is now said that Joe Holladay, the executor of the late Ben Holladay, has raised, or will soon raise \$340,000 in cash for the redemption of that portion of the estate represented by the stock of the Oregon Real Estate company, worth upward of \$1,000,000.

The Pacific county Democratic convention met last Thursday and nominated a county ticket, as follows: R. Osburn, auditor and clerk; Jos. Goodell, sheriff; Rees Williams, Elijah Smith, S. A. Soule, county commissioners; Dr. E. B. Stone, probate judge; N. Hanselman, coroner. The nomination of treasurer was left to the county committee.

We had a little prohibition discussion a year ago, which ended good naturedly. Our Alabama friends are having a prohibition argument at present. In one town, Anniston, three men were shot in a newspaper office last Monday by some parties who didn't like the expression of the paper on the prohibition question. Some men can't take a joke.

Yesterday's *Oregonian* editorially pays a just and touching tribute to the memory of the late O. L. Clay. "Tis not the whole of life to live, nor all of death to die," and the tear that is dropped on the brow of the dead by affectionate remembrance, is the silent testimony of appreciated worth. Such testimony is too oft deferred until its recipient is beyond all care or need of earthly notice.

Many of the Mishawaka people who realize the need of good roads have organized in road district No. 13, the three trustees being W. H. Kirkpatrick, Jno. Grounell and Dennis Lucy. They have levied a \$5 assessment as a starter and the intention is to build a passable road to Astoria as far as practicable. When people take hold of a thing themselves there is some chance of having it done.

There was a time says an exchange, when advertising was not supposed to amount to much, and the advertising columns of a newspaper were

patronized either through personal sympathy or because supporting the local paper helped along the community in a general way. But that notion is fast dying out, and wide awake, observant business men realize that they must keep their business before the public in order to get their share of patronage. Some still drag along in the old way, wondering why the other fellow gets nearly all the customers.

The British ship *Lancaster Castle* cleared yesterday for Dunkirk, France. She carries 78,747 bushels wheat, loaded in Portland, and 42,019 bushels, loaded at Astoria, valued at \$86,000 and \$35,000, respectively. This 120,766 bushels, or 72,460 centals, is believed to be the largest cargo of wheat that ever cleared, foreign, from the Columbia river. The American ship *Imperial*, also cleared for Queenstown, with 65,865 bushels of wheat, valued at \$55,886. Of the *Imperial's* cargo, 33,733 bushels were loaded at Portland, and 31,632 bushels at Astoria.

When General Dnane, now on the retired list, was chief of engineers he particularly favored Oregon in the river and harbor improvements carried on under the jurisdiction of his department, and not long ago the Oregon senators were instrumental in getting a bill through the senate for him to reimburse him to the extent of \$650 for losses incurred by his subordinates, and which he was obliged to make up while inspector of the New York City lighthouse district. Last Monday representative Hermann succeeded in getting recognition for the bill, and it was passed by the house without trouble. It now goes to the president for his approval.

An English paper noted for its illiterate blunders and paucity of verbiage recently printed the extraordinary statement that the "Rev. Mr. Jones married Miss Whitehead last Monday; up to the present she has experienced no inconvenience, and it is not expected that any serious disturbance will occur." Next day the editor, whose duties would seem to keep him in a constant state of apologizing, explained that an account of a railroad strike had "somehow got into the wedding announcement." The same paper in apologizing for not inserting all the notices of deaths, a little while ago stated, "we regret, owing to want of space, that a number of deaths have been postponed."

Advices received here from the Skeena river British Columbia, canneries, concerning this season's salmon pack are very favorable. The various canneries packed the following amounts: B. Cunningham 17,860 cases, British-American 18,000, Aberdeen 16,000, Belmore 8,000, and the Inwardness cannery 14,000 cases. Reports from Alaska relating to the season's salmon pack, as received by the steamer *Quickstep*, which was formerly owned in this city and sold to A. B. Foard & Co., to be used for an auxiliary steam tender at Yes Bay, is as follows: A. B. Foard & Co., 7,000 cases, Juneau river canneries 5,000, Leorn bay 2,000, Cape Fox and Tongass narrows 18,000 cases each. The steamers *Mary G. Haven*, *Union* and *Lone Fisherman* are expected daily from Alaska, coming down to spend the winter reparing. The *Quickstep* is at Seattle, where she will go on the dry dock and have her machinery repaired.

The register at some of the fashionable hotels will soon be among the unused, if not among the forgotten things. There is a movement on foot to abolish it entirely, and sooner or later, like a good many other things, it will have to go. People are busier now than they used to be, or else they are lazier. Formerly hotel guests registered their names and the places from which they came with a good deal of accuracy and attention. Now most of the public men and generally all lady travelers decline to allow their names to appear on the book at all. They simply give their names and places of residence to the clerk, who notes the same and sticks the little card containing the information in the office rack. The real object of the register was to accommodate the outsider anyway, and even in this respect has fallen into disuse. The stranger comes in looking for a friend and consults the book, and nine times out of ten if he does not find the name on the register he turns and asks the clerk if the person he seeks is stopping in the house. This is a fast age, and the register seems to be in the way on the hotel desk.
