Rev. M. C. Ware, presiding elder of Portland district, will preach at the Methodist church at 2 P. M., to-day, and at the usual hours to-morrow.

The Democratic electors are W. H. Effinger, W. R. Bilyeu, E. R. Skipworth.

A rainbow at one o'clock in the afternoon is something unusual, but that phenomenon was seen twice within the last month; at that time on Tuesday, October 16th, and again yesterday.

In the justice court yesterday Jas. McNamara, charged with the larceny of a pair of boots and a hat, from Duncan McKane, was held in the sum of \$100 to appear before the grand jury.

Miss Katie Thrall will open her new millinery establishment next Monday. She has received a very fine stock of fashionable goods and invites its inspection by the ladies.

The steamer Oregon is about ready to be taken off the ways at San Francisco, and will be put on the route on November 11th. The Elmer will be run as a freight boat on the same route. This will make four steamers on the line, which will be equal to a three-day schedule, says the News.

Upon the arrival recently of the British bark Emblem, Walter Toy, one of the sailors, had Capt. Lewis arrested, claiming that the captain had struck him with a three cornered scraper. The case comes up to-day in Portland before the U. S. court.

Constable Smith left last night with Walter Cook, Geo. Washington, R. Clark and W. Toy, witnesses.

The Gen. Canby was coming up to land at the O. R. & N. dock yesterday afternoon. The S. G. Reed had just come alongside and had a line out forward; just then a squall struck her swinging her out broadside in front of the Gen. Canby. Capt. Parker did all possible under the circumstances, but couldn't avoid an inevitable collision, which carried away some stanchions, and railing from the Canby and slightly damaged the Reed.

It is reported that the American private sealers, who have their headquarters in San Francisco, will, one and all, fit out every available schooner for service in Behring sea next summer. This determination has been prompted by reports which have been received there recently, stating that the British sealers, all of whom obtained good catches, were not notified by the United States revenue cutters during the season just ended.

If there is any one thing more surprising than another, it is the facility with which people forget. Perhaps, though, it is a wise dispensation that folks have the fortunate facility of forgetting. The antipathy of cattlemen to sheepmen was illustrated in a peculiar manner at Lakeview recently, says the East Oregonian. The county pays a bounty on coyote scalps. An old Scotch gentleman came rushing into the clerk's office last week and made the following report: "Mr. Boyd: You issued script for bounty on five scalps from Warner a few weeks ago. Well, sir, last night the varmints got into my flock and killed ten of my sheep. This morning I killed two of the coyotes; and, sir, would you believe me! They were scalped; both ears all gone, and their heads all raw. Those blasted coyotes had lassoed them, ran them down on horseback, and getting their scalps let them go to worry us sheepmen." This was an actual occurrence, and the old gentleman wanted the district attorney to prosecute the boys, which he could not well do.

THE WRECKED BARKENTINE. The mail carrier and another man from Tillamook, asked about the barkentine Makah, report that vessel lying on her beam ends in the breakers about two hundred yards from shore.

The beach is strewn with lumber, but no ship's articles of any kind have come ashore. The theory is that the barkentine, which sailed from Port Discovery on October 6th, lumber laden, for Australia, was struck by a squall off Cape Flattery, dismantled, her deck load shifted, and was abandoned by the crew, finally drifting ashore at Tillamook.

Yesterday afternoon Martin Foard, one of the owners of the Makah, received the following from Capt. Gallup, of the schooner Mary Dodge, which is loading lumber at St. Helens:

"ST. HELENS, Or., Nov. 1.—On my passage this time, on Sunday October 21st, I passed for nearly the day through a large amount of lumber, laths, doors, and windows etc. I suppose it was the deck load of the schooner; it might have been the cargo of the Makah: lat. 46° 10' north, long. 126° 54' W., or 126 miles W. N. W. of the Columbia bar."

So far there is no trace nor tidings of her hapless crew. It is to be hoped that they were at least picked up by some passing vessel and will be heard from later at Liverpool or some other port.
