The Astoria & South Coast Railroad Company has levied a second assessment of ten per cent. payable December 8th.

J. Q. A. Bowley, assignee of the Lewis and Clarke Lumber & Manufacturing company, will sell valuable property, right of way and belongings on the 8th of next month.

The polls closed in New York city at four o'clock yesterday afternoon about the same as one o'clock, Astoria time. The registration amounted to the enormous number of 233,532.

Rochester's Musical Comedy company will be here with "The Widow O'Brien," and "Senior and Junior," next Monday and Tuesday evenings. Reserved seats at New York Novelty Store.

In a prize fight between Tom Cleary, ex-middle weight champion of the Pacific coast, and Tom Scott, near Seattle last Saturday night, Cleary knocked Scotty out in the fourth round.

Astoria was about the last polling place in the United States to close last evening. The president was elected three hours before we got through voting on this extreme western verge of the American Republic.

C. W. Fulton and P. W. Weeks made a novel bet yesterday. If Harrison is elected, Weeks walks in the Republican celebration procession. If Grover C. gets there, C. W. will do the same service in the ranks of the celebrating Democracy.

A final bet of \$1,000 was made yesterday afternoon; about six on each side making up the amount on the result of yesterday's election. For its size, about as much money was bet on the result in Astoria as in any other town on the coast.

Mrs. J. E. Thomas has returned to Nestucca. During her absence her youngest child, a boy, two months old, died. The dispatch apprising her of her child's death didn't reach Astoria till after the A. B. Field, with her aboard, had sailed for Tillamook.

Some of the best vocal and instrumental talent of the city has been engaged for the entertainment on Thursday evening at the Methodist church. The admission charged is but a trifle, and the ladies will serve refreshments free, after the program is finished.

The British ship Hesperides cleared yesterday with 63,815 bus. wheat, of which 20,341 were loaded here. Her cargo is worth \$63,997. The British bark Highlands cleared for Hull, England, carrying 71,125 bus. wheat, of which 23,435 bus. were loaded here. Her cargo is valued at \$62,600. The British bark John Gambles cleared for Queenstown with 57,750 bus. wheat, worth \$51,875.

Telegrams From Both Countries.

DUBLIN, Nov. 6.—The Freeman's Journal asserts that all dynamiters in prison in the United Kingdom have been approached by emissaries of the Times who informed them that the government would grant them liberty, if they would give testimony for the Times before the Parnell commission. The prisoners refused their freedom at such a price.

A MINING ACCIDENT. ASHLAND, Ky., Ala., Nov. 6.—Saturday afternoon, while four gold miners were in a pit thirty-five feet deep, the sides caved in. John Wheeler, was taken out dead, and John Jones and Frank Smith dying. Wm. Moore was struck while unsealing on the head with a pick ax and fatally hurt.

THE ENGLISH PARLIAMENT. LONDON, Nov. 6.—Parliament assembled to-day. In the house of lords, Salisbury stated in response to an inquiry that papers relating to the Sackville affair, would be issued by the government to-morrow. In the meantime he would reserve any statement made in regard to the affair.

MURDER AND SUICIDE. NASHVILLE, Nov. 4.—Sunday night, Allen Taylor in a jealous fit murdered his wife and then suicided. The bodies were found in the parsonage of the Edgefield Baptist church. Mrs. Taylor was cook for the pastor.

ADVISES CO-OPERATION. LONDON, Nov. 6.—The currency commission have made a report. It advocates the co-operation of England with the United States, Germany and the Latin Union to secure the restoration of Bimetallism.

RESERVOIR DESTROYED. GENEVA, Nov. 6.—The reservoir at Montreux, on Lake Geneva, has burst destroying property, and drowning many people. Seven bodies have been recovered.

GOING TO THE SPRINGS. LANONA, Dak., Nov. 6.—Will Parker, register of deeds, is reported to have gone to Winnipeg. His accounts are said to be short ten thousand dollars.

HEAVY WEATHER. LONDON, Nov. 6.—Heavy gales prevail on the British coasts. Several vessels are wrecked but no lives are reported lost.
