The City of Seattle and the Dolphin crossed out yesterday morning. The Alliance arrived in.

The Norwegian Lutheran congregation has bought lot 1, in block 35, Shively's Astoria, for \$550.

Harrison is elected and Thompson & Ross are on deck with choice groceries, which they are selling at low figures.

The Varuna is discharging coal at Flavel's dock. She has 1,700 tons aboard, the duty on which under a protective tariff, is \$1,275.

Every precinct in the county, but one—Bear Creek—gave a majority for Harrison, and that was a stand off, Cleveland getting half the vote.

All the stock of the general merchandise store of R. Houseman, will be sold at auction, the sale commencing each evening at 7 o'clock.

All bets are to be paid to-morrow. Considerable coin changes hands in this city, and boxes of cigars, hats, suits of clothes, etc., will be handed out freely for the next week.

John Cyr who has been making a holy show of himself for the past week got too obstreperous yesterday and was judged, greatly to the relief of ladies and children on the streets.

Peter Weiman, while engaged in a spirited argument last Monday, with a compatriot, had the misfortune to break his collar bone, necessitating being temporarily laid up for necessary repairs.

The British ship Brambletyre cleared for Queenstown yesterday, carrying 87,853 bus. wheat, valued at \$76,896. The British bark Bestfield also cleared for Queenstown, carrying 74,865 bus. wheat, worth \$67,400.

Complete returns from every precinct in the county are now received. Mishawaka's vote was: Harrison 19, Cleveland 17. The total vote of the county last Tuesday was 1,758. Of these 1,060 were for Harrison, 646 for Cleveland, 52 for Fisk. Harrison's plurality 414.

Oregon's Republican majority in November promises to even exceed the high tide of June when 7,407 was the register. The people don't seem to know any better. How surprised Mr. Biggen and Mr. Veach and Mr. Noltner will be when they hear from Clatsop county!

Geo. Ross got a letter last night from John Jack, well known to old Astorians, who writes from Vancouver B. C., under date of the 4th inst. He expects to visit Astoria with his Company towards the last of this month and may be assured of a hearty welcome.

Steamships from Alaska are omitting to call at British Columbia ports on account of the stringent laws incorporated in the Chinese exclusion act. The latest decisions in this territory permit the landing of Chinese while in transit between two American ports providing the vessel does not touch at foreign ports.

Prof. E. B. McElroy, superintendent of public instruction, says: The school population of Oregon is from 85,000 to 87,000 between the age of four and twenty years. Of this number 68,000 are enrolled in the schools with an average attendance of about 61,000. About 4,000 have been added the past year by immigration.

LATEST ELECTION NEWS.

A REPUBLICAN VICTORY.

CHICAGO, Nov. 8.—The Evening World says: Chairman Brice of the Democratic national committee, concedes Harrison's election. The Republicans carry California by from 5,000 to 10,000; Indiana by from 3,000 to 4,000; West Virginia still in doubt and will probably require official count to decide the result; Virginia Democratic.

The representation in the next congress will be very close. The indications are that the Republicans will have a small majority. In New York state Harrison's plurality is placed at 12,000. Hill's (Dem.) for governor, plurality will exceed this.

HARRISON'S MAJORITY.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—The Evening Post says: "Makes electoral vote stand, Harrison 233, Cleveland 169, giving West Virginia to the Democrats. Indications are that the Republicans have a majority in the legislature in West Virginia and Delaware, which will give the party two additional United States senators."

HARRISON'S ODDS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—New York state is conceded to be Republican 10,000.

Indiana is Republican 5,000; California will give a Republican majority of from 5,000 to 8,000.

The election of Harrison is undoubted and at last admitted by the chairman of the national Democratic committee.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8.—The complete vote of the city and state so far as counted give Beatty 99,779, Sears 102,327, Works 97,303, Sullivan 104,555. Fourth congressional district, Morrow, Rep., 11,854, Ferrell, Dem., 11,228. Fifth district, including San Francisco city count, Phelps, Rep., 25,056, Clunie, Dem., 25,758.

TWO LITTLE DISPATCHES.

OAKLAND, Cal., Nov. 8.—Geo. J. Ainsworth, Democrat, formerly of Portland and son of Capt. J. C. Ainsworth has suffered defeat at the hands of W. E. Dargie Republican, for state senator from the seventeenth district Alameda county.

BRUNA VISTA, Ga., Nov. 8.—A train on the Savannah & Western road, containing 125 passengers bound for the Macon fair, was wrecked near Ellaville yesterday morning. The killed are Charles Scoville, Dodd Tiaton, Henry Martin, George Davis and John Hannover. A dozen others were injured, among them conductor Singleton.

Salmon Cargo From Victoria.

A valuable cargo of British Columbia salmon left Victoria a few days ago for London by the British bark Norcross, which carried 43,000 cases, valued at \$258,000. She also had a large lot of naval stores, valued at \$42,000. Cargoes valued at \$300,000 are not often shipped from Victoria, or from any other port on the Pacific coast. To the best of our recollection, this is the most valuable cargo ever cleared from Victoria. Two vessels have preceded the Norcross this season for England with British Columbia canned salmon. It is possible that another may follow, though we believe the remainder of the catch has been forwarded either over the Canadian Pacific railway direct to Canada, or by way of San Francisco. It is known that most of the one million cases packed on the coast this year have gone forward to markets of consumption. There are some consignments in our columns here which will be cleared out this month. As a whole the season has been a profitable one, and the supply will be sufficient for the world's wants until next April, when a new season will open.—S. F. Bulletin, 5.
